SNEAKIN' A PEEK!

This column appears as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a more detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! How about this, gang? To better identify possible kit reviews, at the end of the item on the kit, the words 'Available' or 'Not Available' will appear. Obviously, a club member may reserve any kit that is available with a simple call to the Editor. Conversely, a kit which is 'Not Available' was either already reserved by someone, or was something new inserted by yours truly, and paid for with my hard-earned moolah! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order):

- 1960 Ford Starliner (AMT/ERTL #30044): Molded in Lt. Gray....24-piece 352cu. in. V-8, including a nice two-piece carb w/fuel line....Firestone blackwall tires, steel rims w/dog dish hubcaps....brake detail on backing plates....separate chassis and floor pan....front and rear suspensions are eight-piece each....two-piece dual exhaust system....platform-style interior....pedals all suspended from dashboard....two-piece gas tank....separate heater hoses....separate door handles, windshield wipers, mirrors, fender ornaments....clear headlight lenses, clear red tail light lenses....1960 Ford Starliner color matrix chart....decals include underhood markings, and two sets of license plates (both vintage) (Not Available).
- Smart Car (Revell ProFinish #1347): Molded in technicolor (including red, green, yellow, and blue)!...opening doors, two-piece bucket seats, 'miniscule' tires, and hubcaps....separate windshield wipers....self-adhesive markings include several 'smart' labels and logos, and speedometer, and ancillary gauges (Available).
- Volkswagen New Beetle Complete (Revell #2155): Molded in Blue....Curbside, meaning no engine detail....dashboard consists of separate instrument hood, steering column and wheel, passenger's side handgrip, and gauge face decal....one-piece bucket seats, with rear seat molded to interior pan, but featuring separate headrests....separate side panels....clear headlight lenses and buckets, clear parking light lenses, and taillights....separate rear view mirrors (two pieces per side)....separate outside door handles, antenna, and windshield wiper....glass unit one piece clear tub....decals include emblems, wheel centers, tail and rear lights, speaker grilles, and [plates (European and Domestic) (Available).
- '64 Chevy Impala Lowrider 2 'N 1 (Revell #2574): Molded in white....nice 23-piece 327 cu. In. small block V-8, w/optional manifold and carb setup, as well as a stock and a custom air cleaner....multi-piece front and rear suspensions, which have three different ride height settings....separate frame and floorboard....dual exhausts are one piece per side....stock wheel and tire combo (w/SS hubcaps), or gold-tone wire wheels and low profile lowrider tires, w/whitewalls added as decals...platform-style interior w/bucket seats (two pieces each), separate console, dash (w/pedals suspended from it), and separate side panels....separate trunk floor (stock and lowrider!), for opening trunk....upper and lower radiator hoses, and steering box included....three-piece tie rod!!....upper chrome grille bar separate, to mount on leading edge of hood....nice graphics, which include, along with the 'Grim Reaper' lowrider graphics, all body emblems, speedometer, underhood markings, wheel centers, stock and lowrider whitewalls, and two sets of plates, one stock '64, the other a lowrider plate 'REAPER' (Not Available)
- '39 Chevy Sedan Delivery Lowrider (Revell #2592): Molded in white...reissue of earlier version of kit, but with lowrider special items: gold-plated rims, lowered suspension, sunvisor, two different hood emblems, and lowrider graphics, consisting of several pinstripes and curly-Q's, two different wheel centers, and a California lowrider plate -

- 'OLDIE'....same excellent tunnelram-equipped big block available as before, down to and including the optional sunroof which can be cut out, if desired. (Available).
- '71 Cuda Street Machine (Revell #2984): Molded in white....reissue of earlier 'Cuda kit, with a pop art style box art....same Hemi, finned oval chrome air cleaner, same wheels, etc....very little necessary to return this one to stock....in fact, decals include both black and white 'HEMI billboards for side of car, in addition to two 'CUDA' plates and two California 'CUDA' plates, a 'HEMI' windshield band, and a set of red/yellow/orange stripes to run the length of the car (Available)
- '68 GTO Street Machine (Revell #2985): Molded in white....again, as in the case of the '71 'Cuda, a straight reissue of the earlier kit....pop art-style box....'68 body, with entire '69 interior....5-spoke mag wheels....tunnelram-equipped Pontiac V-8....curiously, full exhaust system AND sidepipes are included (and mounted?!)....decals include stylized flame decals for areas around front and rear wheelwells, '400 cu. In.' designations for hood, a 'GTO' windshield band, and three sets of plates one 'GOAT' set, one California 'GOAT' set, and one 'GR-RRR!' set (Available).
- ** '80 Ford Bronco (Revell #7682): Molded in white....reissue of earlier Ford Bronco kit....15-piece small block Ford V-8....stock or custom wheel option....skid plate included....separate fender flares, and rear cap....pedals suspended from dashboard....two bucket seats are two pieces each, and rear seat is also a two-piece item....tub-style interior....clear head, turn signal, and taillight lenses.....three-piece spare tire/mount, two-piece gas can....separate, multi-piece roof rack with skis, and chrome outside mirrors....decals include nice, colorful graphics for side of vehicle, two sets of plates 'Ford' logos, and Colorado plates, two different windshield bands, and 'Fred's Landscaping', and 'Alpine Ski Lodge and Resort' logos for doors (Available).
- Li'l Coffin (Monogram Classic #0094): Molded in color...reissue of original kit (down to and including the instructions)....again, as in the Predicta, a Hemi V-8, this time equipped w/six carbs....separate whitewall inserts....skeleton for display purposes (in the instructions, he asks us to visit them at their website!)....decals include 'Li'l Coffin' logos, and several sets of vintage speed decals (Available).
- Predicta (Monogram Classic #0095): Molded in color...reissue of original kit (down to and including the instructions)....multi-piece Hemi V-8, complete w/fuel injection...multi-piece chassis (still simplified) w/posable front wheels....separate whitewall inserts....upper radiator hose....clear headlight lenses...hinged hood....decals include a few vintage speed decals, four 'Predicta' logos (one set larger than the other), and two 'by Starbird' decals (Available).
- '61 Chevy Impala "Joker's Wild" 1/64th scale Lowrider (Revell #86-3323): Purple car with panelized pinstriping, with opening trunk, and gold-toned wheels and trim...posable suspension....white interior with lavender seat inserts.
- '71 Buick Riviera "Ruby Lipz" 1/64th scale Lowrider (Revell #86-3324): Candy Apple Red car, with gold curly-Q pinstriping, gold-toned wheels and trim, and a lady's head on the hood....red and black interior.
- '59 Chevy Impala "Tribal Aguave" Lowrider (Revell #86-3328): Teal car with green pinstriping on the sides, hood, and trunk....chrome wheels and trim, opening trunk, and posable suspension....white interior with blue seat inserts.

[Note to all concerned]: It has been brought to my attention of late that there is a potential problem with regard to the review articles published in this newsletter. Let me give you a little background on this subject. The model manufacturers (AMT/ERTL, Revell-Monogram, and Lindberg) all attempt to send our club current releases in exchange for our critiques on what we liked and didn't like about them. That means that we need to get written reviews published in the newsletter in a reasonable time frame to accomplish this. If you will recall, I have stood up at recent club meetings to enlist the aid of the members in attendance to get kit reviews. At present, Ron Hamilton has done more than his fair share of reviews. In the past, Lyle Willits also did his share of reviews, as well as yer Fearless Editor. If anyone wishes to see reviews written by someone else (or take a crack at it him or herself), they need to contact me, in order to determine which kits are available for review. I don't have the time to chase anyone down and browbeat him or her for a review. Rest assured though, if you take a review sample, I will be your worst nightmare if I don't get a review within a reasonable time (right, Leonard?). You may also rest assured that if you take a kit for a review, and do not return a review of it within a reasonable time, that you will not receive another!]

'41 Ford Woody

[AMT/ERTL # 30052; 1/25th scale; 100+ pieces; molded in gray, chrome, clear, vinyl tires; 1 version - street rod only]

This is a good kit. The shame is, a few years ago this would have been an exciting kit, too. But it suffers the misfortune of existing in the shadow of Revell-Monogram's outstanding 1948 Ford Woody kit and comparisons between the two are inevitable. This kit just pales somewhat next to the '48 kit. It is engineered similarly to the '48 in the way the interior constructs, but throughout the kit, the parts tend to feature less detail than the '48. Also, the detail that is included tends not to appear as sharp or accurate as that on the '48. Where this kit shines, though, is in two areas. First is the fact that it's the only game in town for the '41 front end in 1/25 scale. Second is that it features some nice suspension parts for street rod models including a nice quick-change rear and good-looking "Hairpin" radius rods for its dropped front axle. These would look right at home on 50's and 60's style '32 and '34 Ford highboys.

The 1941 Ford body was the first in a series produced from 1941 through 1948. The 1941 edition featured what was arguably the least attractive front-end sheet metal design of the series. By narrowing its fenders and widening its body, Ford's engineers were able to offer the car-buying public seven inches more interior width than they did the year before. But they still lost significant ground in their sales war with Chevrolet.

The *body* features a separate hood, headlights, parking lamps, grille inserts (3), side view mirrors, taillight/license plates, spare tire with mount, and antenna. AMT/ERTL includes molded clear windows for the windshield, rear windows, and vent windows only. They provide a small sheet of clear plastic from which the builder is to cut the side windows. Templates for cutting the windows are provided in the instructions. Though a good rendering with Super Deluxe trim, the body could be improved. The rails and stiles have a heavy appearance. They look to be about 20% too thick. This extra thickness makes the window openings appear a bit small. The profile of the front fenders is a gently rising curve from the rear to the front whereas the prototype fenders feature a mild, graceful compound arc towards the front. The padded top rises straight up then rolls over abruptly rather than being a soft radius as on the prototype. The fender trim is weakly molded and has mold line cutting through it on both front fenders. And finally, AMT/ERTL chose to mold on overly thick door handles rather than make them separate chrome plated pieces.

The *14-piece interior* builds up stock. Following the directions, the interior builds up on the floor board platform with floor-to-ceiling side and rear panels. The dashboard and the windshield trim are all molded as one piece. Unfortunately, the backsides of the interior panels are waled like corduroy. The variations in plastic thickness from the waling cause an uneven surface on the front side that will be seen on the finished model. This condition will not be easy to correct without harming some of the interior panel detail. All interior door handles and armrests are molded in place. The accelerator pedal is molded to the floorboard while the clutch and brake pedals are separate parts. The dash appears quite accurate with narrow strip gauges and high-mounted radio controls. The roof ribbing is molded on the underside of the roof. The only drawback to this approach is that ejector pin marks are located where they will be visible on the ceiling of the finished model and will be very difficult to remove.

Following the directions and assembling the interior on the floor board, then mounting the floor board to the frame, and inserting the whole deal into the body leaves you no way to assure a good fit between the interior panel and the body. It seems that assembling the interior in the body, then adding the floorboard and frame to it will yield better results. Install the rear window and windshield in the body. Remove the mounting pins from the bottom edges of the interior side and rear panels. Install the side windows and vent windows in the interior side panels and glue the panels into the body. Then install the rear panel and dash panel. The install the floorboard, firewall, and steering column. Follow up by mounting the engine, splash aprons, and front shocks to the otherwise completed frame and the frame to the floorboard.

Speaking of the *frame*, it is a 14-piece arrangement that represents a stock frame with C-channel rails and an X-shaped cross member. The separate exhaust system depicts modern glass pack type mufflers with tubing that splits into twin outlets for each pipe. The rear axle is a nicely depicted quick-change unit and the dropped front axle is located by a well-done set of "Hairpin" radius rods.

For motivation, this kit uses a mildly detailed rendering of a larger than stock 296 cubic inch flat head Ford engine with modern speed equipment. The nondescript block/transmission/oil pan halves feature an attempt to depict the stock type oil drain in the center of the pan. A separate oil pan would have yielded superior results. The cylinder heads represent modern milled aluminum 24-bolt pieces with the water outlets at the front. The front cover matches the cylinder heads, doubles as the front engine mount, and has the full distributor detail molded on. The fuel injection intake system features a fuel rail which hovers above the manifold and an ill-fitting ram assembly that holds two throttle bodies adorned with aftermarket style air filters.

Rolling stock consists of a nicely done set of 17-inch Halibrand wheels mounting wide and wider Goodyear Eagle GS-C tires in 255/45ZR-17 and 285/45ZR-17 sizes. The Halibrands feature valve stem detail and lug covers. They could really benefit from the addition of a set of knock-offs, too. Four chromed wheel backs with drum brake backing plate detail are included. Oddly another set of four un-plated wheel backs with different drum brake detail are included in the kit. Perhaps there's a stock version in the future?

The *decal sheet* isn't much. It offers a pair of 1941 California license plates, a possibly club plate with an unfamiliar symbol on it, and 14 simplistic wood grain decals for the body panels. Have you seen those commercials where the announcer asks, "Ever feel like some people have just stopped trying?" These wood grain decals are symbolic of them. They are simply black lines. No attempt at color was made. The molded in wood grain details on the body are far superior to the decals.

The *instruction sheet* is well drawn and easy to follow. AMT/ERTL has provided factory color information for the stock interior and suggests using flat colors to represent cloth, gloss colors to represent metal, and semi-gloss for anything else.

The inclusion of a surfboard, presumably for no reason other than that this kit represents a woody, is incongruous at best. This is not a 60's street rod style woody, evocative of the California beach scene. This is a 90's style street rod borne of the street rod nationals' scene.

Although there's no mention of the fact on the box, this is a street rod only kit. The instruction sheet correctly identifies it as such. If you want to build a stock 1941 Ford woody, you'll have to kit bash this kit with a Revell-Monogram 1948 Ford Woody or Convertible. That is, at least for now.

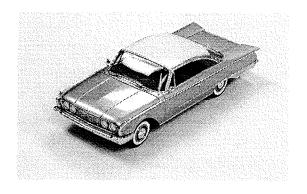
1960 Ford Starliner

[AMT/ERTL 1/25 scale kit #30044: 111 pieces; molded in gray, clear, and clear red, with Firestone vinyl tires, decals for the rocker covers, fan shroud, and two sets of license plates]

At first glance I was impressed. All parts are placed in plastic bags. I couldn't wait to open all the bags and check out all the goodies. The 60 Ford is one of my all-time favorite cars from the 60s, and AMT didn't let me down.

Instruction Sheet AMT included the factory paint and interior colors. This should help make that great looking Replica Stock model. Just a slight misprint though - it has the wrong year printed for the production run and factory price. I know, I checked this out in a book I have. The numbers are correct, but the year should be 1960.

Engine A nicely detailed 24-piece assembly, with decals. It has two piece carburetor with fuel line, separate fuel pump attached to the fuel filter and with the fuel line. A plated air filter is supplied, but it is to be painted gold along with the rocker covers. The transmission is 3-speed stick, and detail includes the throwout-bearing lever.



Chassis The chassis is separate from the floor pan and nicely detailed. The instruction sheet doesn't say anything about not gluing the spindles to allow for poseable front wheels. This is mentioned on the box. If you decide to pose your wheels, you will notice that there is no connection to the tie rods. They are molded to the lower A frames.

Wheels/Tires The kit has bare steel wheels with dog dish hubcaps. The caps are smooth, and thus missing the indentations around the outer edge. I am surprised that a top of the line car would not have the full wheel covers. The outer lip of the rims are a little too large, and when the front and back halves are glued together, the wheel is too wide for the Firestone tires. The tires are black walls, with no white wall insert. The tires from the 58 Edsel would have been a nice addition to this kit, as I think the size of the white wall would be correct for the Ford.

Interior The interior has separate door and side panel. The engraving is nicely done, no complaints here.

The pedals are attached to the under side of the dash. The parking brake pedal is a little too large, but a file fixes that quickly.

Body bumpers and grill The body is very sturdy, nice thick plastic. On the inside they have the headliner, interior light and sun visors molded in. This causes a sink mark in the middle of the roof that should be filled in, you also may see the lines from the headliner, and just a little sanding took that out. There is also a slight sink on the top of the left fin. The front wheel openings look a little too high, and not rounded enough. The grille fits into the body from the rear of the grill opening. The chrome trim around the grille opening is not part of the grille, and will require the Bare Metal foil treatment. The chrome line around the edge of the hood is faint and after painting is hard to see. Just as in the Edsel, the taillights are not dark enough. I painted the back of mine with Testers stoplight red to darken them. In my mind, AMT could have used a darker red plastic.

Assembly Here is where I ran into a problem. The chassis fits nicely under the floor pan. The interior fits nicely in the body. The problem is when you put all three together, the wheels do not line up with the wheel openings and the firewall was forward of the cowl. There are two tabs on the floor pan that fit into slots in the rear bumper. I removed these and had to remove just over 1/16 of an inch from the back of the floor pan, bringing the rear cross member almost flush with the back

edge of floor. The back edge of side panel of the interior had to be trimmed to clear the back glass. By doing this the wheels lined up, and the firewall now sits back from the cowl edge. But now there is a small gap between the dash and the front glass. When you glue the front inner fenders to the body, you will have to slightly bend the frame, just before the floor, so the frame will attach to the under side of the inner fenders. After doing this my model sits level and looks good.

Overall I like the kit, with a little work it is a makes for a nice model.

Dajani is an arbitration and civil rights lawyer who got a citation (Surprise! Surprise!) thanks to one of the cameras, and claims motorists are deprived of their right to defend themselves. He is quoted as saying that the statute in effect creates a presumption of guilt, meaning the burden of

On a related note, a motorist this past week received a ticket for running a red light, even though the before and after photos show his car sitting at the intersection!! A local news station took up his case, and managed to get it declared null and void, after getting someone to actually look at the photo. Duh!
Indoor Speedway progresses! Remember the story I ran recently here about the <i>Pittsburg area developers</i> who are intent on building the <i>first 1-mile oval indoor speedway</i> ? Well, Findlay Township has approved the rezoning of 217 acres for the \$390 million facility adjacent to the Pittsburgh International Airport. The track would be housed in a 2.6 million square foot building. Oughta be interesting!
Build yer own Toyota-if you are rich! The Alliance of Automotive Insurers recently computed the price of rebuilding a 1999 Toyota Camry with parts supplied by the Car Company. The tab came to only (?!) \$101,355, compared with an original sticker of about \$23,000. Geez! Wonder what it would cost to rebuild a Lexus?!
Recyclable autos. The European Parliament recently passed an automotive recycling plan, which could conceivably cost the car manufacturers billions. This would include Ford, GM, Daimler Chrysler, as well as Toyota, Honda, and Nissan. Car companies will soon pay for disposal and recycling of any car they sell in Europe. The manufacturers would be responsible for the cost of collecting the vehicles, transporting them to recycling centers, separating the materials in the cars, and shredding the parts that won't be recycled. Not surprisingly, consumers will share in the effort, as auto prices will surely rise.
Caddy V8-6-4 Revisited?! The 'innovative' V8-6-4 engine developed by Cadillac in 1981 which was a major flop, could be resurrected as a good idea for increased fuel economy. GM's Powertrain Group leader Fritz Indra said he believes the time is ripe for cylinder deactivation technology. Mr. Indra said he believes that modern electronics can be the answer. Time will tell. The big difference here would be the lack of a 6-cylinder mode. The car would run in V-8 mode, until cruising speed is reached, where 4 cylinders would be deactivated, leaving four operating. The claim of fuel economy gains of 18 percent are being bandied about with this system.
Computer Caddy! Speaking of Cadillac, GM has confirmed that it will offer voice-activated personal computers, E-mail, navigation, Internet access, and an infrared port as options on its Seville and Deville sedans. An audio system will read E-mail to drivers while the vehicle is in motion, and an in-dash screen will display messages when the vehicle is stopped. No word on how much these services would cost.
Welcome back, Alfa Romeo?! Parent company Fiat recently announced it would use a new partnership with General Motors to bring Alfa back to the states. This could happen in 2003 with the next-generation Spider Roadster, followed a year later by the next-generation 156 sedan. The main question at this point is how the cars would be distributed in the US.
