Stay in the right lane and immediately after passing over the Parkway, make a right (at the light) onto Southway (see below).

Once on Southway: Go straight to the second (2nd) STOP sign. Make a left onto Crescent road. Go to STOP sign and make a right into the parking lot behind the Greenbelt Library. Once in parking lot, look to right. The large, white building is the Greenbelt Community Center. Enter building using doors near fenced tot lot. The multi-purpose room is on the second floor. There is an elevator to the left of the entrance.

SNEAKIN' A PEEK!

This column appears as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a more detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! How about this, gang? To better identify possible kit reviews, at the end of the item on the kit, the words 'Available' or 'Not Available' will appear. Obviously, a club member may reserve any kit that is available with a simple call to the Editor. Conversely, a kit which is 'Not Available' was either already reserved by someone, or was something new inserted by yours truly, and paid for with my hard-earned moolah! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order):

- □ 70 ½ **Z28 Camaro** (AMT/ERTL #30086): Molded in Lt. Gray....21-piece 350 cu. in. small block featuring chrome air cleaner and valve covers....styled steel five spoke Rally wheels, mounting incorrect Firestone rubber....platform-style chassis with separate front subframe....eight-piece front suspension, nine-piece rear suspension....contrary to instructions, the exhaust system is NOT plated, and consists of four pieces....drop-in door panels, separate console, two-piece (each) bucket seats, and the package shelf is molded to the rear seat....AMT/ERTL kitted the split bumper version of the Camaro, and also included the front airdam, and the larger one-piece rear spoiler....decals include black striping only, and three sets of license plates '70 ½' IL, 'ZOOM 28' NY, and 'SRV 097' TX (Not Available).
- Goodwrench' Corvette C5-R ProFinish racer (Revell #1648): Molded in Black and Silver....Simplified 13-piece engine/trans assembly....beautiful pre-stenciled big 'n bigger Goodyear donuts which mount BBS style rims....front and rear windows are already pre-painted with black trim where necessary....body is already tampo-printed in the proper 'Goodwrench' colors....curiously, the hood does not open to display the excellent (albeit simplified) small block V-8....the decals are nothing short of incredible! They include several areas of carbon fiber, dash markings, and some additional exterior markings to be added by the builder. Although I have yet to build it, it is my understanding from someone who did that it is not only a very well-done kit (especially for it being as simplified as it is), and that it goes together very well (Not Available).

[Note to all concerned: It has been brought to my attention of late that there is a potential problem with regard to the review articles published in this newsletter. Let me give you a little background on this subject. The model manufacturers (AMT/ERTL, Revell-Monogram, and Lindberg) all attempt to send our club current releases in exchange for our critiques on what we liked and didn't like about them. That means that we need to get written reviews published in the newsletter in a reasonable time frame to accomplish this. If you will recall, I have stood up at recent club meetings to enlist the aid of the members in attendance to get kit reviews. At present, Ron Hamilton has done more than his fair share of reviews. In the past, Lyle Willits also did his share of reviews, as well as yer Fearless Editor. If anyone wishes to see reviews written by someone else (or take a crack at it him or herself), they need to contact me, in order to determine which kits are available for review. I don't have the time to chase anyone down and browbeat him or her for a review. Rest assured though, if you take a review sample, I will be your worst nightmare if I don't get a review within a reasonable time (right, Leonard?). You may also rest assured that if you take a kit for a review, and do not return a review of it within a reasonable time, that you will not receive another!]

Dale Earnhardt 1951-2001

Since I don't receive too much input from the 'peanut gallery', then you will have to give me my time on the soapbox for a *small tribute* to a *Roundy-Rounder*. No, I take that back. Not just a roundy-rounder. *THE roundy-rounder*, Dale Earnhardt.

For those of you who have been living on another planet, Dale Earnhardt, the driver of the black #3 'Goodwrench' Monte Carlo, was killed in a seemingly tame last-lap mishap at the season-opening Daytona 500. His accident paled in comparison to the earlier 19-car pile-up in which Tony Stewart's 'Home Depot' Grand Prix nearly became airborne.

The really strange thing was that in this case, Dale was running blocker for his son Dale Jr., and his driver Mike Waltrip to duke it out for the win. Usually, Dale is very selfish, in that he would have been the one going for the win in this case. Instead, he unselfishly attempted to give his driver and his son a chance at winning the 'Superbowl of Auto Racing. That's the kind of man Dale had become.

Dale was seemingly the toughest guy in NASCAR today. He drove the wheels off of his car every time he strapped into it. Witness the seven championships he has to show for it. He earned the 'Intimidator' nametag for his aggressive driving style. Every competitor both simultaneously admired and feared him. The last thing anyone wanted to see in their mirrors on that last lap was that black #3 car.

He was a master of restrictor plate tracks, although he did not like restrictor plates, preferring to run flat out and wide open. People seemed to feel that Dale was so good at this type of racing, that he must actually be able to see the air as it flowed around his car, and manipulated it to his advantage. As long as Dale's cars had wheels on 'em, he wanted to be behind the wheel.

Now, before you think tat this is just the ramblings of an Earnhardt fan, you are wrong. I am a NASCAR fan. Even though I am not a big Earnhardt fan, I give Dale all the credit he is due. He was a great driver. He will be deeply missed by all in the racing community.

We can only hope that some good will come of Dale's tragic death in the form of safety enhancements, so that NASCAR stock car drivers can point to his tragic death and see something good come out of it. Dale, you will be in very good company, with names like *Neil Bonnett, Adam Petty, Tim Richmond*, and *Alan Kulwicki*, just to name a few. We will not soon forget you.

- Diecast Kool Kustom car Carrier!! Danbury Mint will be releasing a 1930's Custom Car Carrier. It features art deco styling which includes both front and rear fender skirts which are removable, a two-tone black over burgundy paint job (with twin orange pinstripes accenting the color divide), lotsa chrome, wide whitewalls with full polished wheel discs, a trick license plate door (which flips down to reveal the removable loading ramps), removable engine cover (to view the GMC six-cylinder engine), steerable wheels via the steering wheel, working winch (to load your model, natch!), and opening storage compartments on either side of the truck to store the wooden wheel chocks and rubber tiedown straps in order to transport your precious cargo. It lists for \$167, payable in five installments of \$33.40, plus \$8.00 shipping and handling. - More diecasts! Hopefully to be on the shelves as you read this is a new 1/64th scale set of cars which many of you drag racers most likely won't pass up. Willys! There are scheduled to be six cars in the set including Wild Bill Cody ('33), Bel Engine Services ('33), Bryson and Sons ('33), Mary Ann Harmon ('41), Willy Fast ('41), and Wee Willys ('41). Not your cup of tea? How about the Tri-Chevy set? It includes a '55 Bel Air convertible, '55 Nomad, '56 Bel Air convertible, '56 Nomad, '57 Bel Air convertible, and a '57 Nomad. How about the Rock and Rollers set? Scheduled to include a 427 Cobra ("Hey Little Cobra"), Fink's Speedwagon ("Surf City"), a Thunderbird ("Fun, Fun, Fun"), a Deuce Coupe ("Deuce Coupe"), and a '67 Pontiac GTO ("Little GTO"). And, for you outdoors types, a set entitled "Bassin' USA" which is set to include a custom bass boat and matching Chevy Silverado pickup truck. Due out in April of this year is the Hollywood on Wheels 3 set, which is scheduled to include Felicity Shagwell's '65 Corvette convertible, the Mystery Machine from the Scooby Doo cartoon series, the Mod Squad Woody, Supercar (from the old puppet TV show series), and, finally, Black Beauty from the Green Hornet!! Due out in June of this year is the set I'm sure you are all waiting for (I know I am!) the GTO set! It will include a '64, '65 convertible, '67, '69 Judge, '71 Judge, and a '72 GTO. By the way, these gems are all on the way from the gang at Playing Mantis (a.k.a. Johnny Lightning)!
- Dave Schultz remembered! Dave Schultz, who won a record SIX NHRA Pro Stock Bike championships, died February 11th after a battle with colon cancer at the age of 52. Schultz was the winningest rider in NHRA two-wheeled history, with his 45 wins earning him a class record, ranking him seventh overall in NHRA national event victories. He also holds the record for consecutive victories (8) by an NHRA professional competitor, set in 1994.

He was also the first rider to surpass 7.60 seconds and 180 mph, as well as managing to finish in the top five in Winston points for 14 consecutive seasons.

- Robin a Dead Duck! The Reliant Robin, an ungainly, three-wheeled car, wobbled into history recently as dwindling sales forced its makers to cease production. The last one rolled off the assembly line at Reliant Cars LTD sporting a metallic gold finish, with two-tone leather trim and a walnut dashboard. There are reportedly 44,000 of these cars still buzzing around on Britain's roads. The first one was produced 65 years ago, with its most famous owner being Princess Anne, who paid the 'princely' price of 5,500 pounds (or about \$8,000) in 1999 for a customized Robin van to use on her personal estate. Early versions had handlebars rather than a steering wheel. Word is that the company priced themselves out of the market, getting about \$14,500 for the Robin 65, the last model produced. The big attraction to these cars was that only a motorcycle license was necessary to operate one, and a motorcycle license was easier to obtain than a conventional driver's license. Tougher licensing rules had eliminated this advantage. In their heyday, the plant turned out about 300 cars a week, eventually dwindling to only 10. The car sports an 850 cc motorcycle engine, weighing in at only about 1100 pounds, and is able to eke out about 65 miles to the gallon. Comparisons to the Trabant were all too common. The car's styling was described as 'evoking the aerodynamic grace of an overturned bass boat.'
- "Vanquished' V12! Ford Motor company debuted the 12-cylinder Aston Martin Vanquish at the recently-held Geneva Motor Show. The Vanquish coupe has a 6-liter 12-cylinder, that generates 460 horsepower. Its 0 to 60 time is 4.7 seconds, and top speed of 196 mph. The six-speed transmission is operated with paddles on the steering wheel, much like Ferrari. The cost? Only \$229,000 large!
- Hot Barbecue, Hot Truck! Recently, four armed carjackers in Kansas City got more than they bargained for when they took not only a man's Chevy Tahoe, but the Bar-B-Q he had just left the restaurant with! After the robbers drove off, the man went back into the restaurant and called Onstar, who in turn, contacted the local police, and informed them where to find the culprits. Police arrived just as the four teenage suspects backed the Tahoe into the driveway, and they were arrested shortly after taking the Bar-B-Q into the house. Guess they had THEIR dinner ruined!
- Rolls Royce Fireball! No, it 's not a new high performance model, rather a description of what happened to it! US auto safety regulators said they are investigating *Rolls Royce* and *Bentley* cars because a \$360,000 Rolls Royce convertible exploded after a dealer employee fueled the vehicle for the first (and last!) time. An estimated 500 of the 2001 Corniche and similar Bentley Motor Cars Azure models are under investigation by NHTSA. It was reported that the Corniche was fueled with all the windows down, and it then blew up after traveling about 75 feet while the technician was closing the windows with a master switch, injuring both the technician and a passerby, as glass flew as far as 100 feet. The car was a total loss, according to the NHTSA report (another case of Government Intelligence at its finest!).
- 2002 Unimog SUV?!? Seems as though *Freightliner*, the commercial truck manufacturer owned by *Mercedes-Benz* had to issue a press release to set matters straight. The press release quantified the *Unimog* as a 'multipurpose vehicle' rather than an SUV. It is 10 feet in height, a full foot longer than a Ford Excursion, has a 52-gallon fuel tank (averaging about 10 miles per gallon), and tips the scales at 12,500 pounds! This thing would be ideal for carpooling though, because it can carry as much as 30 passengers, and 13,000 pounds of cargo!
