Sneakin' a Peek!

This column appears as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a more detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! How about this, gang? To better identify possible kit reviews, at the end of the item on the kit, the words 'Available' or 'Not Available' will appear. Obviously, a club member may reserve any kit that is available with a simple call to the Editor. Conversely, a kit which is 'Not Available' was either already reserved by someone, or was something new inserted by yours truly, and paid for with my hard-earned moolah! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order):

- □ 2001 Corvette Z06 (Revell #85-2588) Molded in white....reissue of earlier hardtop with minimal changes...newly-tooled Z06 wheels (in chrome, so they'll need to be stripped)....body correctly features screening in grille area, and screened-in vents at rear wheels for brake cooling, 'Z06' emblems on front fenders...interior-wise, 'Z06' emblem is featured on headrests....decals include 'Z06' emblems for both the front fenders and headrests, red inserts for the seats, dash, and door panels, a Z06 plate, along with a 'FIVE 15' IL plate, a few underhood markings, wheel centers, and crossed flag logos for the front and rear bumpers. (Not Available).
- □ Corvette C5-R LeMans 2000 racer (Revell #85-2354): Molded in white....reissue of earlier Goodwrench Corvette (WITHOUT the nice tires or glass), sadly, making it inaccurate for this application (compare the box art with the box contents)....packaging was scary, with everything banded together, and the decals wrapped at the bottom of it all, causing them to wrinkle (they did have a piece of paper to protect them from being scratched)....Keep yer eyes peeled for a corrected body for this kit, which will include a lift-off hood, to show off that honkin' V-8 engine! (Not Available).

[Note to all concerned: It has been brought to my attention of late that there is a potential problem with regard to the review articles published in this newsletter. Let me give you a little background on this subject. The model manufacturers (AMT/ERTL, Revell-Monogram, and Lindberg) all attempt to send our club current releases in exchange for our critiques on what we liked and didn't like about them. If you will recall, I have stood up at recent club meetings to enlist the aid of the members in attendance to get kit reviews. At present, Ron Hamilton has done more than his fair share of reviews. Tribute to a Legend – Ed "Big Daddy" Roth Hipster Big Daddy Roth a mighty man

"Whosoever wouldst be a man must be a non-conformist." This being true, Ed
"Big Daddy" Roth was a mighty man indeed. This elder statesman of all that's baroque modern, this Picasso of low-brow

art, this king of custom culture and the T-shirt recently passed from this life, but he leaves behind millions of followers and kindred souls in "all great things American." Give Archimedes a lever and a place to stand, and he'll move the earth. Give Big Daddy Roth some fiberglass, a few tools and a garage, and he'll build sculptures on wheels that rival any museum masterpieces of industrial art. Ed's rod and custom creations and his work in auto mechanics and design are in a class all by themselves. The Beatnik Bandit, The Outlaw and The Mysterion are true chariots of the gods. And whenever a hipster expresses himself in a personalized T-shirt, he's living in the house that Roth built, since Big Daddy practically pioneered and certainly mass-popularized wearable art in the 1950s and '60s, a fad that's lasted for more than 40 years. For decades now, Big Daddy created new cartoon characters each and every month, his quintessential creation being Rat Fink, the ultimate, everyman, low-rent rodent. Ed also created our Light Crust Doughboys' logo art on the top of his truck hood in a hotel parking lot near downtown Dallas, a gift to musicians and music he believed in. In the Big Daddy tradition of cool monikers, Ed nicknamed me "The Smilin' Cowboy." Someone once said there are only four things truly American: baseball, hot dogs, Mickey Mouse and Elvis ... Of course, this is not exactly right, because it leaves out a lot of neat things including Rat Fink and Big Daddy.

Vintage Roadster

(1966 Road Racer Transkit, Kit No. 001; \$65.00)

First of all, the packaging in this kit is nothing short of incredible! Everything is either bagged or wrapped in bubble wrap to protect it. The model manufacturers could learn from these guys!

The white resin is beautiful, and nearly flash-free. This transkit is meant for use with *Accurate Miniatures Grand Sport Coupe kit*, numbers 5000 and 5001. The kit will allow the builder to replicate either the *Roger Penske* or *George Wintersteen* cars. According to the instructions, neither raced with the small block provided in the kit. Consequently, a complete big block is provided.

The big block V-8 consists of 21 pieces. The engine block and transmission are molded as a single unit. The headers have been re-engineered to fit the big block as well as clear the front suspension. The Holley four-barrel carb must be seen to be believed. It even includes linkage! Other items of note include separate starter, coil, three-piece distributor, oil filter, starter motor, alternator, water pump, air cleaner base, and fan belt. Another nice touch is the addition of the rubber seal for the air cleaner base to seal against the hood and a small piece of screen!

The *chassis* from the original kit is utilized, with the modifications specified in the instructions, and the substitution of a new modified A-arms (*provided*).

American five-spoke rims and inserts are provided, although tires are not (they are sourced from the AM kit).

The *body* consists of an accurate roadster body, with most openings in it molded open, or easily opened with minimal work. Other separate parts include the hood, roll bar, headrest and headrest cushion, brake ducts, fuel cap, air/oil jacks, and rear inner fender panels. The hood is molded as a separate piece, and may be hinged. It features the mating hardware on its underside for the ram air system on the engine.

The *interior* is prefitted in the body. It includes door panels, a dashboard, and a steering wheel rim. This will make it easier if you intend on using *Model Car Garage's* excellent detail set. Check 'em out at http://www.modelcargarage.com/mcg main.cfm.

Two vacuformed windscreens are included, the second one being a spare, just in case you make a booboo.

The *decals* appear to be nicely in register, and include a blue stripe, 'Roger Penske Chevrolet' markings, number 10 and 12 roundels, driver/mechanic markings, two crossed flag markings, and Sunoco, Firestone, and Fram associate sponsor markings.

The seven-page instruction sheet includes a parts list, general comments, assembly instructions (including illustrations!), and finally, something you don't see very often, a recognition of several people instrumental in the production of this comprehensive kit. Master modeler Harold Bradford even includes his address and phone number for builders who may have questions and concerns!

Now, if the rumored 'accurized' C5-R reportedly on the way from this same source is even half as good ass this transkit is, you will definitely see quite a few of these kits on the contest tables in the near future (more likely than not, in Dale Earnhardt colors)! To quote Larry Greenberg, "Highly recommended!" (Sorry Larry!)

MIRAGE: The Paint that changes color

Dupli-Color Products has an amazing new lacquer paint out, it's the kissing cousin of Chromallusion by DUPONT. Mirage changes color as the light changes. It comes in a kit containing three *cans* (black primer, color coat, clear coat) in 11 oz cans, that's enough for at least three models. The price is around \$20.00 at auto supply stores. The primer goes on smooth and is ready for recoating in 20 minutes as are all the coats. The more color coats the deeper the color changes. In two days it's ready for rubbing out and polishing.

Mirage is available in three color combinations-*Purple/Green, Silver/Green*, and *Gold/Magenta*. These rattle cans are the ticket for those of us that are not Rembrandts with paint I used it and got "no runs, no drips" and only a little bit of orange peel which rubbed right out with a polishing kit.

Mirage is well worth its \$20.00 price tag if you want an outstanding paint job.

AMT Fireball 500 Reissue

My life is now complete. I have waited along time for the reissue of this kit. Though simple in its design as a model kit I am building this again only as a FUN kit from my childhood. Being somewhat limited in funds to buy rare old kits buying an mint original was out of the question for me and many, many others. So let's stroll down memory lane together. 1st a little history:

The car: built by the famous George Barris (or in his shop, anyway). This car had 2 different paint jobs during its career, one as a movie car, and one as a show car. There were also a few modifications to each. The car started its life as a 1966 Barracuda with a 273 Chrysler V8 small block (not a HEMI as in the kit) and was referred to as the "SSXR".

The movie car had 40 man-hours of painting to achieve a faded color scheme that went from white to gold to maroon. The fading started at the front wheel wells and continued to the center of the doors. After the movie was made they made the switch to repaint the car like on the current box art which is a lot simpler. White, abruptly fading to maroon just ahead of the leading edge of the doors. Also, the addition of hood pins, deletion of the protruding headrest, a more stylistic Fireball logo, and other graphics and logos that were standard on show vehicles of the time. The windscreens, now in a transparent yellow, fully wrap-around each cockpit opening. The early car had ribbed aluminum covers over the sidepipes, while the latest version has perforated, chromed heat shields. I found out this information after I built my car, so when I describe the building below, hang on because I have built it from my poor memory, and not facts. Hence, the reason my car is a mixed bag of each, and a few of my own preferences thrown in for good measure!

This is the fourth release of this kit. The first was kit #911, which was the most common with a smiling George Barris in the driver's seat. 'Happy Model Building' is handwritten in the upper left-hand corner, above his signature. The second is a retouched photo box with a car shown from the passenger side on a psychedelic/splattered background was kit #T240-225. The third was the least common with the other illustrated version that featured the car alone on a white background, no text, seen from a high, front 3/4 view of the drivers' side with a black border. This one played up the 'SSXR' designation over the 'Fireball 500'. Photos of the car were on the side.

Now the long awaited fourth reissue kit:

First impressions on the box art. I am not even going to go there. I was so disappointed over the box art model of the car. I guess I was just expecting a copy of one of the other boxes as in their classic reissues of some of the other past boxes. They just don't get it. The box art is just as much fun as the kit, especially on something like this. This one is not. This is a very simple kit to build and can be easily built in a couple of days, depending on what extreme your pain job and detail is. Painting detail goes a long way on this style of kit. The box art model has a few minor things I would like to point out since the model is based on the second paint job version. The door handles should not be silver. The white beading should be black around the windscreen and the transition from white to red is too gradual (mainly due to being painted with spray can).

Now to my version:

Of course the first thing I do when building a kit is to set The Arter rake. I always pick out my wheels, tires and the way a car will sit before starting the building process. Even though this is basically a stock building of a show car from memory, there are a few tweaks I am going to make. The tires in the reissue are not the original tires used in this kit (the second disappointment after the box art, this is killing me!) I just happen to have a set of Norman Veber's (a.k.a. Replicas & Miniatures) Firestone big and little early Indy car tires molded in black resin that I will use for this, which will look great with the addition of white lettering. I think Norman sells the original version tires if you are of that 'have to have everything the same as the early kits person'. To the 'Radir' wheels I added aluminum paint in the spoke area, to add depth. I also wanted to lower the front end a little, so I drilled a new set of holes above the current ones, and when I assembled the car, I cut the metal axle into two pieces and epoxied them in place, cutting off all excess metal because the engine block hole will now not align up.

I mainly added painting details to this kit. I did add some Detail Master wiring to the engine to add some color to the "Hemi" engine in the kit. I have been experimenting with the new Tamiya spray can paints, and I was so excited to build

this car ASAP I used their Red, Yellow and White. (OK, OK I now know there was no yellow used but, I was pulling this from my young impressionable mind from the 60's plus some drug years in the 70's so my memory is a little bleary) One thing I learned on this new paint you can not clear coat this paint for two weeks or it will crack! So don't look too close to my paint job. There are only a few things as far as building that can pose a problem. The hood is tight - you may need to sand the edges down so your paint job will not chip, and the windscreens are not interchangeable. Fit them carefully, so the correct one is attached to each side. Also notice there are nipples on the bottom of each windscreen that should be filed off. Don't confuse them with the alignment pins that secure the windscreen to the body. In hindsight when I build another one (and there will be another one because I had so much fun!), I would fill in the windscreen holes on the body and file off the mounting pins for a better look. I used chrome foil to run around the bottom of the windscreens to clean them up a little (looking at the real car this should be black). They included only one sideview mirror in the kit. The real car had two. Since I was going to part out a few of these kits anyway, I stole, er 'borrowed' one from my donor kit and added it to the other side. Other than that this kit went together with no hitches, and I had the time of my life remembering the good old days! Also included is a trailer with slots for ramps (but no ramps are included) I was surprised not to see anybody building one of these since I did mine. Don't save them - build them all! As I mentioned earlier, I plan to build a few more of these, since I now know about the paint jobs. Keep in mind that some things we build are just for fun as in others from the past that I have built with my current skills make a nice collection of the models we can reminisce from our past. I want to give credit to Thomas Voehringer on the Bonediggers Webster, who had already researched what little history exists on the car and past kits.
