'71 Charger Street Machine

[AMT/Ertl/RC kit # 30054; 108 parts, 9 chrome, 10 clear, 1 clear red]

Someone said if you look at the box art just right, it looks like a '69 Judge instead of a Charger. It's a shame that this kit wasn't done as a stock Hemi Charger, because the street machine doesn't interest me at all.

The *engine* is built off the 383/440 block and auto transmission; the only changes being cylinder heads, valve covers, chrome dual four-barrel intake, and oval air cleaner. They didn't bother to change the exhaust manifolds. The 383/440 and hemi exhaust manifolds were completely different. They did include two Carter AFB carbs each in 2 pieces. The *air conditioning system* is still in here, but seems out of place in a hemi car. In fact, air conditioning was not available with the Hemi or the 440/6-pack in the '71 Charger.

If the box art car looks like it's *dragging ass*, it's because the rear leaf springs have lowering blocks on them. The only other change is in the exhaust system. They gave us new tail pipes with fluted tips that need to be chrome plated.

Tires are the *Goodyear GS-Cs* we've seen before, and the mags look ghastly. Give them to someone who builds import models.

The *interior* is unchanged and there are no extra parts for it either.

The *hood* has been changed to the air grabber hood cut out, and there is a *two-piece air grabber assembly*. The scoop looks a little thick for the scale.

The only *decals* that are factory correct are the *grille emblem* and the *Superbee* for the hood. Blacking out the hood and the pin stripe around it are up to the modeler. Be sure to leave a circle in the black out for the body color for the bee emblem. The hood in my kit seems to be riddled with sink marks from the under hood framing. Watch out for a sink mark in the center of the roof as well.

If you were disappointed with the "Millennium edition" '69 Plymouth (Roadrunner), use it for parts for this '71 Charger. The Dana 60 rear axle and springs should fit and would be more appropriate for a Hemi car. It also has the correct exhaust manifolds and a complete Hemi manual trans as well.

'65 Chevelle Station Wagon

[AMT/ERTL kit no. 31219, Re-issue in BUYER'S CHOICE series]

This straight-up re-issue of the venerable '65 Chevelle 4 door wagon has been long awaited by us "wagon fans." Thankfully, this time around it is molded in neutral gray plastic. The box tells us that you can select any one of four building options, "Crew car," stock, or "custom drag." Kudos to AMT/ERTL for bagging *EVERYTHING* separately, including the glass, chrome and tires. The instructions offer three color choices in step five. Somehow, I think Chevy made more color choices available.

Body: Essentially, you're looking at a stock Chevelle wagon body with minor modifications as options. These mods include a hood scoop, various unattractive bumper replacement "pans" and the ugliest roof rack since Sears stopped selling the Ex-Cargo. As stated above, the body is nicely molded in gray plastic with virtually no flash evident. The mold lines are very manageable and all the emblems, although lightly molded, are crisp. The hood is a separate piece and has a cutout for the optional hood scoop. I'd suggest filling the cut-out with melted sprue prior to painting as I'm sure this will come back to haunt you once the paint is rubbed out. The body is attached to the chassis with molded in "pins" which don't appear to be beefy enough to hold the bumpers, much less anything else. (In the earliest releases it was screwed to the chassis) The chrome is about average for AMT. Along with the stock grille and bumper (with separate clear headlight lenses), there is a chromed vintage custom tube grille option. The engine compartment is adequate considering the age of this tooling. You get a separate radiator, battery, overflow tank and firewall. In addition to separate clear headlight lenses, there are clear red taillight lenses and a red "bubblegum machine" for the roof. The window glass is molded in one piece.

<u>Interior:</u> Unfortunately the vintage tub style interior has the front bench seat molded as one piece The rear seat (molded open), dashboard, steering column, steering wheel, floorshifter, and rear tailgate panel are separate items. The detail on the dashboard is nicely done. Options include a driver's side shoulder harness and tachometer (chrome).

<u>Engine</u>: The engine is the standard Chevy small-block 327 V-8 with a four-speed transmission. You can choose parts to build it one of three ways. The stock engine has a four-barrel carb and painted valve covers. The custom option has a dual-4bbl setup with individual air cleaners and finned chromed timing cover. The drag version has a blower and "bug catcher" in chrome. Also, headers are included. Surprisingly, no chrome valve covers are offered. Once again, due to the age of the tooling, there is a huge hole in the engine block for the metal axle to pass through.

<u>Chassis:</u> The plate chassis has the dual exhaust molded in. You have the choice of two ride heights when passing the metal axles through to attach the wheels. That's pretty much it for the chassis. At least the spare well is correctly molded vertically.

<u>Wheels and Tires:</u> The wheels are all one piece and pretty basic. There are separate two-piece rims for the drag slicks. The chrome tree has stock wheelcovers and well-done Cragar S/S mags. Included for your building pleasure are ten tires. You get one set of four Firestone bias-ply tires with limited sidewall detail. Also, a set of four Goodyear PolySteel Radials with decent sidewall markings but some tread that looks like it belongs on a 4X4. Finally, two very nice Goodyear Blue Streak Dragway Special slicks.

<u>Decals:</u> The small decal sheet features various vintage performance logos and nothing else. There are no license plate decals.

<u>Various and sundry bits:</u> Other items included are the "wooden" push bumper and maintenance ramps found in the last issue of the kit.

All in all, aside from any issues that arise because of the age of the tooling, I'm very pleased that AMT/ERTL has included this kit in their *BUYER'S CHOICE* program Considering the Robber-Baron prices seen for these kits recently, this kit is well worth the price.

Ferrari's least-expensive model is the 360 Modena, which goes for \$145,000, and the car has a three-year waiting list, with some car owners and dealers advertising these cars for \$200,000 or more. 
