Condolences

Prolific artist and builder Jairus Watson passed away on May 19th in Salem Oregon. Known for his illustrations, he was also a writer. contributor to magazines like Scale Auto Enthusiast, Model Cars and Slot Cars *Magazine* where he was also the editor.

His box art graced kits from AMT, Galaxie, Revell and Trumpeter.

He designed art for several die-cast series by Jonny Lightning. His illustrations can be seen as instruction sheets and articles on creating latches and hinges for model cars.

He built many slot cars for customers around the world, often with incredible detail and sourcing vintage components. He won Best of Show at GSL in 1986.

Auto designer *William Porter* has died at home on April 23 at the age of 93.

In his 39 years as a designer with GM, Porter

oversaw the Buick design studio as well as Pontiac, retiring from the company in 1996.

The celebrated General Motors draftsman penned some of the most iconic muscle cars that will ply the Woodward Dream Cruise this summer including the 1968 Pontiac GTO, 1970-73 Pontiac Firebird and Trans Am. and 1971 Bonneville The academically-trained artist and industrial designer is credited with the long, muscular styling that helped define a Golden

CA Chopper


What we have here is the 1/25th scale Harley Panhead included in the latest issue of the Revell '29 Model A pickup (listed as a level 5 build). The "California Street Chopper" alone is probably a level 23 if you're in your 70s. It's built up from one chrome tree of **SMALL** parts and two vinyl tires.

The instructions show drawings of parts and assembly steps but it is *VERY* helpful is one is familiar with a 1:1 Harley.

An entire chrome motorcycle is hardly realistic, so I painted the appropriate parts and added a few things. Headlight is a spotlight from a '48 Ford kit. I made exhaust the pipes from plastic tubing with a

Molotow coating. Thought briefly about trying to plumb and wire it. Nope!—Lyle Willits

While the following story does not directly relate to a recall (for the first time in a long time, there were no significant horror stories here?!), it **IS** a 'GMC' product, and is a sad state of affairs, related to competence in one's chosen profession.

A car transport moving a load of brand-new Cadillac EVs hit a bit of a snag on I-94. *Metro Detroit News* shared a video on social media of a load of Cadillacs, including some 2026 Cadillac Vistiq crossovers, getting stuck under an overpass.

Based on the video, it's hard to tell the extent of the damage. Whatever it was, it was enough to damage some of the roofs of these Cadillac EVs. At least one Cadillac Lyriq electric crossover is visible on the lower level of the car carrier, and there are multiple Vistiq units in transit.

The video shows a confused-looking man wearing a safety vest inspecting the damage to the cars. At one point, he throws up his hands, likely wondering what he's supposed to do to remedy this problem.

Luckily, some of the com-

menters on the media social post have some advice. Several people suggested simply letting the air out of the tires. which would surely give the car transport the clearance it needs to break free. Others suggested he just driving, keep Cadillac roofs be

damned. Others pointed out that this is an oddly common occurrence with the low overpasses on I-94 in Michigan.

This is an unfortunate start for these particular examples of the Cadillac Vistiq. It's 'GMC's' newest EV (with prices ranging from \$79,000 to \$98,000+), offering an EV option with three-row seating at a more affordable price point than the Cadillac Escalade IQ. It's also the first three-row model to use GM's BEV3 platform. The Vistiq comes standard with a dual-motor electric power-

train similar to the one in the Cadillac Lyriq-V, producing 615 horsepower and 650 pound-feet of torque. The range is estimated at up to 305 miles on a full charge.

While these Vistiqs weren't so lucky, the production Cadillac Vistiq has been in production since February



Chevette Insanity! If we have \$33,000 to spend on a practical and economical Chevy, we could buy a loaded Trailblazer, a modest Equinox, or...a pristine 1987 Chevette CS hatchback. That's how much the new owner of this example paid at the Mecum Kissimmee auction. First, a quick recap on the Chevette. It was introduced for the 1976 model year, replacing the Vega and riding on the T platform co-developed with Opel and Isuzu. Offered as a three or five-door hatchback, it was one of 'GMC's' last attempts at a rearwheel-drive subcompact economy car. The Chevette doesn't have a great reputation today, but it was America's best-selling small car for 1979 and 1980. It was discontinued in 1987 and replaced by the Chevy Sprint, which became the Geo Metro. This Chevette that crossed the auction block is special because of its inexplicably low odometer reading: *only 47 miles*. We wish we could say it was special for some other reason, like a famous owner or

weird modification, but it's just a Chevette. It does come from the final model year of 1987, has a manual transmission, and is in the CS trim, but the valuation of over \$30k is still a head-scratcher. The original window sticker is shown in the cargo area in the photo gallery, but the final sticker price is illegible. Promotional paperwork shows a starting price of \$4,995 and boasts some of the Chevette's virtues, like reclining front bucket seats, folding rear seats, a glove box (with door!), and a pushbutton AM radio. The collector's market for the Chevette is difficult

> to track. Only a few have been auctioned on Bring a Trailer, sale with prices ranging from \$5,800 to \$21,000. have None been auctioned on Cars and Bids At \$33,000, this humble hatchback that just sold at Mecum Kissimmee 2025 may have broken the record for the most valuable Chevette ever sold. We can't help but wonder if the new owner will drive it or keep it as an in-



vestment...Barn Find SSR?! Produced from 2003 to 2006, the Chevy SSR sought to blend retroinspired styling with modern performance and a retractable hardtop pickup body. The end result was one of the most unconventional vehicles to come from 'GMC' in the last few decades, and despite its rather short-lived lifespan, the SSR's unique design and rarity have helped it gain cult status among collectors and Chevy fans alike. Unfortunately, it looks like this particular example may be too far gone—in fact, this may be the worst SSR we've ever seen. This SSR was spotted on social media, and is apparently located in Cleveland, Ohio. The vehicle in question appears to have been abandoned for years, showing severe signs of neglect and exposure to the elements. The once smooth and rich purple paint is now heavily faded, with large swaths of rust overtaking the body panels. Corrosion marks the hood and fenders, while entire panels appear to be falling off due to the damage. Even the cabin pillars are damaged and rusty, as is the rear bed. The headlights are fogged over, and the Chevy bowtie emblem is nearly worn away from sun exposure. The tires appear to be flat as well. Looking under-

Era of 1960s and 1970s American automobiles.

A resident of Whitmore Lake. Porter died at home on April 23rd at the age of 93. "I have always respected and admired Bill for his design track record but even more so for his personality and his design discretion and expertise," wrote Jon Albert, who worked alongside Porter as Buick interior chief designer in 1995. "I am extremely privileged to have worked with a guy who knew the history of design in general (not just auto design) and who possessed such a keen sense for good design as well as what makes sense for compelling styling."

In the early 70s, he directed the design of the GTO, Firebird, LeMans, Catalina and Bonneville coupes and sedans.

Porter's signature was the uniquely American design of Coke bottle-shaped cars with mile long scooped hoods and aggressive grilles. With fire-breathing V-8 engines under their hoods, these thoroughbreds became symbols of American individualism and the call of the open road.

"(My contribution to the '68 GTO) was the basic body theme, the monocoque shell form with

pressure bulges over the wheels," Porter said in an interview with High Performance Pontiac in 2000. But when it came to naming his favorite

ance Pontiac in 2000. But when it came to naming his favorite car, Porter singled out the second-gen 1970-73 Pontiac Firebird.

"I was absoluted the second-gen and t

"I was absolutely crazy about that car from day one and really threw myself into it," he said. "I put the best designers I had on it and we were consciously trying to create an important American sports car."

The 1960-70s Pontiacs were groundbreaking in foreshadowing today's "bumperless" integrated fascias—and also with their interior design.

"One of the design approaches pioneered in the '70-1/2 F-car and that's coming into the industry in a more widespread way now, is the integration of the interior and the exterior," Porter said in the 2000 interview. "When you open the door of the Firebird...there is a subliminal sense of the unity of the interior and exterior. That had never been done before that I

know of "

The designer's keen sense of art—he was a collector of Tiffany glass and Arts and Crafts furniture—extended to the famous Firebird "screaming chicken" hood graphic. The graphic almost didn't make it to pro-



duction after then-GM Vice President for Design Bill Mitchell went into a fury over its design.

"He called me up and I had to hold the phone away from my ear," remembered Porter. "That was the end of that! Then a couple of years later, (colleague) John Schinella talked him into taking another look at it. It finally saw the light of day on the '73 cars. Mitchell was a real hair-trigger."

Porter moved on from Pontiac to work on the Camaro before taking on Buick's chief design position, where he oversaw design development for the Park Avenue and Riviera.


In addition to his son, Porter is survived by his wife, Patsy Jane, his son Adam, two daughters, Sarah Wilding Porter and Lydia Porter Latocki; a brother, Thomas Hampton Porter; and three grand-children.
