

MAMA'S Boys

Since this is the first interview, I thought I'd put myself under the gun so that when I call you, you'll know something about who you are talking to and hopefully you'll feel a little more comfortable. I am a 27-year old Analyst/Technical Writer for a computer services company, Analytics, which is located in



Columbia, Md. I'm currently living in a miniscule Pasadena, Md. apartment with my wife Dawn, until we can buy a house (We're hoping to buy in July!).

MAMA: Is your spouse supportive of your hobby?

Tim: Oh yeah. She never begrudges me buying a model or tools or paints. She does get a little bothered when the unbuilt kits start stacking up too much in the apartment, so I try to keep most of them at my parents house.

MAMA: Do you spend a lot of money on the hobby (for kits, supplies, tools, parts, etc.?)

Tim: Not really. Although I think the kits have gotten to the point where They are bordering on being ridiculously expensive, and the paint is the same way. I mean after the Faux oil and gas crises of the seventies, prices came back down a bit, but plastic and other Petroleum-based products didn't. They just kept on going up.

MAMA: How long have you been building model cars?

Tim: I think I started when I was about eight or nine. I wasn't allowed, naturally, at that time to use sharp knives or paint.

MAMA: What was the first model car kit you built?

Tim: I don't really remember the first one. The earliest model I clearly remember was a red 1/32 scale '57 Chevy Bel Air. At that time I couldn't paint them but I could use a butter knife to cut parts from the sprue.

MAMA: What sparked your interest in model cars? How did you get started?


Tim: I don't know, I've always liked cars. As a kid that was the only way to get one. Now it's the only way to get all the ones I want.

MAMA: How many built and unbuilt kits do you have in your collection?

Tim: I'd guess about 135 to 140 total.

MAMA: What kind of work area do you have? Is it dedicated to car models?

Tim: I'm currently working on my dinner table, so it's not dedicated to modeling. I have a denim backed piece of pressboard that I put on the table and I work on the board. I also have a red roll-away tool chest that I



keep my tools and paints in. I just roll it over to the table and I'm in business.

MAMA: Where do you do your painting?

Tim: I have to stand outside on the front walk of my apartment building. Rarely, I'll paint at my parents' house.

MAMA: What kinds of paints do you use?

Tim: Model spray enamels, and Automotive touch-up paints. I hope to get my airbrush and compressor going again when I have a house.

MAMA: What kind of special tools and equipment do you have?

Tim: Nothing out of the ordinary. I use a piece of glass for cutting straight edges on masking tape. I also use liquid masking, the traditional bent coat hanger paint stands, an old ashtray for wetting decals, rubber bands, clamps, tweezers, etc.

MAMA: Do you keep a big spare parts inventory for swapping? Tim: I'm a pack rat like most modelers, so I keep every left over part.

MAMA: Do you use cottage industry products?

Tim: I'm just starting to get into them. I've only bought scale hoses, wiring and cables. I still have a Detail Master gift certificate from the contest back in February, I'm trying to decide what to get with it.

MAMA: Do you build other types of models? What kinds?

Tim: No, I tried things like ships, planes, military stuff and motorcycles when I was younger and didn't really get a kick out of them. Cars are it.

MAMA: What's your favorite type of model car to build?

Tim: I like street and bracket race cars and pickup trucks.

MAMA: What's your favorite scale to build in?

Tim: The "bi-scale" (1/24-1/25).

MAMA: Which is your favorite model company?


As far as the American kits, I lean towards ERTL these days. I really like the Fujimi and Tamiya the best for their quality. With their better casting, there's less tedious work to do.

MAMA: What older Rits would you like to see reissued?

Tim: I'd really like to get some '70-'77 Camaros.

Tim: Tamiya just released it-the '88 Countach Anniversary model.

MAMA: What other hobbies are you involved in?


I collect coins, keys, business cards, and I hope to neturn to bracket racing about two seasons after I get a house.

KIT REVIEWS


AMT/ERTL INDY CARS (Penske PC-17 #6880EO, 6881EO; March 88C #6713EO, 6751EO; and Lola T-8800 #6753EO, 6854EO) by Harold Bradford

This is a general overview of AMT's 3 new Indy car kits, Penske's PC-17, March's 880 and Lola's T8800. A more thorough review of the PC-17 will follow as soon as I can get one finished.

are the first new Indy cars from anyone in 10 years, last being AMT's PC-6's of 1979. They were certainly worth wait. I've test fitted all of them and found nothing doesn't fit as well as some of the best Japanese kits. The panels especially are right on the money. The Penske has side pod upper surfaces molded with the engine cover enabling display of the radiator and oil cooler detail. The body shapes on three cars look accurate according to my references, Engine/Transaxle assemblies, exhaust/turbocharger systems, intake plenum units, etc. are all different for each car. A lot of fine is included, plus a lot of separate parts. Even the pump and pop off valves are separate pieces. A seat and driver figure (you must use one or the other), pedal assembly, shifter, instrument panel and more are provided for the cockpit the windscreens are very well done also.


Instructions spell out part names and contain paint codes and some nice drawings on the back page. Decals are in perfect register. New tires have been done and are accurate with the Goodyear Eagle on both sides along with new 6 spoke wheels.

Again, AMT has done a great job on these, and if they are any indication, we're in for some very good things from them. I would especially like to thank John O'Neill who is not only out there but is also listening to us. Thanks!
