suppose that even deranged Ford fans need understanding and support. Now that I think about it, they probably need even more than the rest of us. But seriously, you gotta give Rex a lot of credit for the way he handles all the Ford fan abuse heaped on him by this club.



Although Rex is a self-described passionate modeler, a good portion of

his day is taken up by working as a Tax Analyst for MCI in Washington, D.C. Tax Analyst, huh? Does that mean he's the guy that puts tacks on chairs for people to sit on? Sort of a bun pun, get it? Never mind, ya hadda be there!

Here's what Rex has to say-it's gotta be better than my poor jokes (Amen to that!)

MAMA: Do you spend a lot of money on the hobby?

Rex: No, not in relation to what other people spend on other hobbies, e.g. R/C cars, trains, etc.

MAMA: How long have you been building model cars?

Rex: 15+ years, or half my life (Ed. Note: whichever comes first?)

MAMA: What were the first model car kits you built?

Rex: Not sure, probably a snap kit of some kind.

MAMA: What sparked your interest in model cars?

Rex: My third real car was a 1972 Mustang Mach I. I began collecting and building Mustang kits of all years as well as some Matchbox and other diecasts. I also bought and built Cobras, GT-40's, and Panteras.

MAMA: How many built and unbuilt kits do you have in your collection?

Rex: I have 93 unbuilt and 21 built kits. Most are 1/24 & 1/25 scale, but I also have some 1/43 scale metal and resin kits, and some snap kits and large scale kits.

MAMA: What kind of work area do you have? Is it dedicated to model building?

Rex: A dining room table which is also occasionally used for eating. All my tools and paints are kept in Tupperware containers.

MAMA: Where do you do your painting?

Rex: I paint outside on my balcony. Obviously, I'm limited as to what days I can paint so I usually paint as many bodies as I can when the weather is nice.

MAMA: What kinds of paints do you use?

Rex: Usually, Testor's Model Master or Car Colors and sometimes Dupli-color for special projects.

MAMA: What kinds of special tools & equipment do you have?

Rex: Nothing unusual. I don't have an airbrush. I have a good selection of drill bits, files, tweezers, brushes

and flexi-grit sandpaper.

MAMA: Do you keep a big spare parts inventory for swapping?

REx: I have more parts than I could use on existing kits because of kits having multiple engine, wheel options, etc. I usually don't buy a kit just for the spare parts.

MAMA: Do you use cottage industry products?

Rex: Yes, but I have not used them very much. Most of the models I build are box stock. I try to build them as clear as possible and I don't feel you have to use "extras" to win contests. It's great to have all the different parts available, unlike when I first began building car models.

MAMA: Do you build other types of models?

Rex: I built all types of models as a child but I have narrowed my interests to Mustangs and other exotic Fords.

MAMA: Do you find that your modeling skills carry over from one type of modeling to another?

Rex: If I ever build a dicrama I will use my automobile skills to make a racing garage or other similar type of scene.

MAMA: What's your favorite type of model can to build?

Rex: As if you couldn't figure that one out by now.

MAMA: What's your favorite scale to build in?

Rex: 1/24 & 1/43. Larger scales take up a lot of room.

MAMA: What is your favorite model company?

Rex: Revell and Monogram are my favorites. They are more accurate than AMT/MPC/ERTL in my opinion.

MAMA: What older kits would you like to see reissued?

Rex: A '67 or '68 Mustang fastback and a '65 or '66 convertible. Also the UPC 1/16 scale GT-40.

MAMA: What new subjects would you like to see produced?

Rex: A Detomaso Pantera equipped with the 351 Cleveland engine. None of the current Japanese Pantera kits have a scale engine. Nothing else I build could be considered new.

MAMA: What do you like most about today's kits? The least?
Rex: I like the greater attention to detail by Povell

Y: I like the greater attention to detail by Revell, Monogram & Fujimi. I dislike rehashed reissues with no improvement from AMT/MPC/ERTL.

MAMA: What current projects are you working on? Future plans?

Rex: I'm working on a 1970 Trans Am Boss 302, 1967 Shelby GT 500, 1969 Mach I, a Pantera, a replica of my 1972 Mach I with working lights and GT-40 MKII's. These should keep me busy for a few years.

MAMA: Do you subscribe to any model car magazines?

Rex: Scale Wheels, Scale Auto Enthusiast, Car Modeler and several Mustang magazines.

MAMA: What other hobbies are you involved in? Rex: Keeping my Mach I looking & running good. MAMA: Do you have any tips, suggestions or advice to anyone just starting into car modeling?

Rex: Take your time. Keep it simple at first. Build to please yourself. Try to improve with each kit. Use magazines & books for reference.

MAMA: What do you like most about MAMA? The least? Suggestions for improvement?

Rex: I like the friendly atmosphere. It's a long drive but well worth it. Love those brownies!

"Mello Yello" Lumina Stock Car

(Monogram # 2921; 1/24; one version; 94 pieces; black, clear, satin chrome, vinyl tires)

Well guys (an' gals!), a few months ago your fearless(?!?) editor gave you his impressions on one of Monogram's latest efforts, the "Ierex" T-Bird stock car Plus. With the accessories provided with the "plus" option as well as minor updates here and there (not to mention a new body!) they were a cut above Monogram's excellent original stock cars. Well, Monogram has upped the ante again (in



Monogram has upped the ante again (in a biiggg way!) with the "Mello Yello" Lumina stock car from the soon-to-be-released movie "Days of Thunder" starring Tom Cruise. At first glance, with the possible exception of the wheels and tires, the whole kit appears to be new! Read on for my observations.

begin with, this kit be offered will (at initially?) in 3 different versions-The "Hardee's" car (molded in dayglo orange), the "City Chevrolet" car (molded in yellow) and obviously, the "Mello Yello" car (molded in black). This kit well and is free of flash. This car is definitely a Superspeedway car, complete with roof rails, rocker panel passenger side door glass!(YaY!) The body consists pieces (not counting windows) - the body itself, hood, rear bumper. There is a large notch molded onto the body in mounting the front bumper. The word "Lumina" is nicely engraved below the lower intake in the front air dam. The hood exhibits such a good fit, it may actually have to be narrowed slightly to fit properly after painting (as it should be)!

The engine (with the exception of the carburetor) appears to be all new as well. All new pieces include the oil pan, headers (non-180°!) as well as exhaust dumps out both sides of the car, new satin chrome Pontiac heads (Ed. note: How do I know this? Easy! The word "Pontiac" is molded right on them!), Hendricks motorsports valve covers (with heat shields still attached), and upper and lower radiator hoses! How about a molded plastic "spider" that looks suspiciously like a distributor with wires? Rather than include a length of fine wire (as in their "High Performance Series"), Monogram chose to mold the plug wires and

distributor as one piece. The jury is still out on this one.

The interior definitely shows updates. Again as in Bird, the front window braces mount to the roll cage rather than being molded to the window. The driver's seat is also similar in the T-Bird. The roll cage is all NOW incorporating molded-in padding (as well as weld marks if you get out magnifying glass to see them!). The shifter is also new, having the same molded-in padding present (to protect the driver's leg in the event of an accident). There are molded corrugated hoses present to provide fresh air from the NACA ducts. Oh, did I forget to mention these? The quarter windows contain molded-in NACA ducts which connect to the aforementioned ducts in the interior. The front window has the retaining clips molded in while the rear has the window straps molded in. The glass is all frosted on the back side to show where it will be painted black. As noted earlier, the passenger side window is also included!

And now on to the chassis. I may sound like a broken record but it too is all new (1990 spec). It is a front-steer chassis which includes a new front suspension, a new rear suspension (both including single shocks per wheel), as well as the tank, ecolant pump, belt and cover. The radiator and shroud also new pieces. As mentioned earlier, the wheels and tires appear to be one of the few parts in this kit unchanged.

conclusion, may I simply say that superlatives fail Monogram appears to have expended much effort to bring us this new Lumina! I can only hope thet now that they have a Lumina that they continue to use it in the mean future (Ex. Derrick Cope-winner at both Daytona & Dover, Darrell Waltrip, Greg Sacks & Dale Earnhardt). Quite possibly they could sneak Olds body in there somewhere? (That way, they would have every body style covered, in the same scale!). Monogram 15 trying to keep us modelers broke with all these neat new releases and I am no exception. If the crew at Monogram keep bringing kits as good as (or even better than?) these, then I will stay consistently broke trying to keep up. Thank you Jay Adams what's next?

Mercedes 300SL-24 Coupe

(Revell #7174; 1/24; one version; 109 pieces; white, gray, clear, chrome, vinyl times)

Many advances have been made within the last few years with respect to the level of detail possible in plastic kits and this kit shows it (this kit, as well as the BMW Z1 kit came into my hands with the help of our "German Correspondent" Oliver Daniel from Revell of Germany's line but both will be released here as well in a premium series).

The basic **body** is 7 pieces (body, front & rear bumpers, hood & separate underhood bracing & mirrors) and is very smooth and free of flash and sink marks. Vent openings on the front fenders and front bumper are open and are very nice!

The interior consists of 18 pieces. Door panels are separate drop-in items. The dashboard appears to have very nicely engraved instrument faces which are wasted but more on that later. Another slight problem area is the obvious lack of any engraved texture for the interior surfaces and carpeting.

The engine is the six cylinder which mounts into a chassis which has quite a few nicely detailed parts. The front suspension is a 1 piece unit, so poseable steering isn't possible (without some work!). The exhaust system alone is 7 pieces (not counting the exhaust manifolds on the engine)! The detail on the rear suspension pieces is also very nice.

Now to get back to the lack of engraved texture and why it won't be a problem—the decal sheet. Mine is even so slightly out of register, but is still very nicely done. It contains numerous different license plates, underhood decals, woodgrain dash and console decals, dash gauge decals, small exterior emblems and seat and door panel upholstery decals!

This, the latest redesigned version of the venerable SL from Mercedes has garnered more than it's fair share of attention with it's new "aero" styling. From all the articles that I have seen it appears that Revell has done a very good job in capturing the lines of this Teutonic "Wundercar". The lack of any engraved texture throughout the model (engine, chassis & interior) is the only real fault I can find and that alone doesn't dissuade me in the slightest from wanting to build this kit.

BMW Z1

(Revell # 7175; 1/24; one version; 104 pieces; white, gray, clear, chrome, vinyl tires)

The subject of this review is a fierce competitor of Mercedes Benz. I speak of course of BMW, and in particular, the Z1. This one is rather unique. In addition to an opening hood with an engine and opening trunk, it also has **two sets of doors**. (Ed. note: For those of you unfamiliar with "Furrin" cars, this particular roadster has doors which slide down into the lower portion of the body). Revell courteously provides one set of doors in the open position and one set in the closed position so as to allow the builder to choose. A nice convertible up-top is also provided.

Similarities between the Z1 & the 300SL abound. The Z1 also has an excellent **decal sheet** which includes numerous license plates, smaller emblems and logos, seat upholstery and door panel decals.

The **chassis** is a pan on which you build up the nicely detailed six cylinder engine (all 12 pieces of it) as well as the interior. From the looks of the instructions, poseable steering is possible. The dashboard is a nicely engraved unit made up of 5 pieces (dash top, gauge face, steering wheel, column and pedal assembly). To add to this, gauges are included on the decal sheetwhich would show up very well on this little drop-top sportster. The EMW 7 spoke wheels mount very nice Pirelli tires.

The box cover has a few very good detail shots of the actual car in both bright red and a very pretty dark green which should make it easier to build this machine.

To sum up, my closing remarks regarding the 300SL apply equally here. The lack of any engraved texture throughout the model (engine, chassis, interior) is the only minor flaw I can find in this otherwise excellent kit and that by itself wouldn't dissuade me from going out tomorrow and buying one to build. Revell, bring on the 850i!
