Do you find that special skills from your other

modeling are adaptable to car modeling?

Darian: There really isn't any difference in the two, except that one has wheels and the other has feet. I just try to make 'em look as real as I can.

MAMA: What's your favorite type of model car to build?

Darian: My favorite type to build is probably Street
Machines with some Customs mixed in.

MAMA: What's your favorite scale to build in?

Darian: My favorite scale is 1/25 and sometimes I'll build a 1/16 or 1/12 scale, but only if I'm in the mood.

MAMA: Which is your favorite model company?
