"Maxwell House" T-Bird

(Monogram #2942; one version; 96 pieces; dark blue metallic,

chrome, clear, vinyl tires)

Well, gang, I've got good news and bad news. The good news is that we have another colorful Thunderbird Winston Cup car. The bad news is that anyone waiting for an accurate Winston Cup T-Bird is going to wait a while longer! Read on for the straight scoop!!

First off, this is not a "Stock Car Plus" kit, so you will not get all those neat little diorama items.

Most of the running gear (engine, transmission, chassis, wheels, etc.) appears to be lifted directly from the original "Melling" T-Bird! Geez! The chrome tree even includes the '83-'86 T-Bird grill and headlight doors not to mention the old 5-hole

wheels (Ed. Note: To my knowledge, most, if not all teams are currently using the 9-hole Bassett wheels)!

The kit is molded cleanly and is quite free of flash. The real focal point of this kit is obviously the body. It is molded in four pieces (body, front clip, hood and rear bumper). The car appears to be an intermediate or superspeedway car, having the roof rails and the rocker panel strip on the passenger side. The front clip has four screened-in openings; one at the driver's side headlight, two on the bumper and one large one below the bumper. The front and rear clips fit very nicely.

The glass is very nice as well, being frosted on the back side where it will be painted black. Monogram thoughtfully provides the passenger side door glass complete with a NACA duct molded in (Ed. Note: This passenger side door glass was missing from the earlier T-Bird kits of Alan Kulwicki and Davey Allison). However, there is no corrugated hose to attach to the duct to direct incoming fresh air. This kit has a new feature which has been eagerly awaited by many modelers-front window braces which are separate pieces mounting to the dash and upper roll bar, allowing the window to be molded without the braces and installed independently. The rear glass still has the braces molded on which is acceptable.

The driver's seat is also new, being of the type that more fully encloses the driver to better protect him in the event of an accident. There also appears to be some padding missing which was directly behind the driver's head on the roll cage in earlier issues of the T-Bird kit. The roll cage, however, still lacks any

of the padding present on the new Lumina cage.

The decals are composed of all of the requisite sponsor decals along with some of the striping used for the color separation. Monogram seems to have molded the car in the darker blue, forcing the modeler to either paint the lighter blue over top of it (Good Luck!) or prime the entire car and start from scratch.

I must admit to being more than a little disappointed with this kit. After hearing rumors of possible updates to the Buick and/or Pontiac stock cars and seeing the new Lumina, I was really hoping for some sorely needed updates to the T-Birds to "bring them up to speed" (no pun intended!). I fully expect that I will still buy these new T-Birds with the understanding that I will probably trash the outdated chassis and try to adapt the Lumina chassis. C'mon, Monogram! If its' worth doing, its' worth doing right! Maybe next year?

Sneakin' a Peek!

This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes!

* "Kodak" Racing Team Transporter (AMT #6802): Molded in white....Re-issue of "Kraco" & "Coor's" transporters..... large, colorful "Kodak" decals....drill press, tool box, air tank, fuel can, bench vise & air wrench....additional, small decals for your choice of truck cabs (AMT Kcnworth T600A?) * 1992 Firebird GTA (AMT #6158): Molded in gray....re-hash of 1991 GTA...."Bird parking only" sign....Georgia "Bird" tags w/underhood decals and yellow & blue graphics....same nice gatorbacks & BBS wheels.

* 1949 Ford Club Coupe (AMT #6805): Molded in gray....stock Firestones along with Gatorbacks....stock & optional "smoothie" hood...."Ford Parking only" sign, Colorado "So Low" plates...red & blue scallops & Goodguys decal also included....fender skirts.

* 1936 Ford 5-window (AMT #6924): Molded in gray....stock Firestones along with Big 'n Little Polyglas GT tires....Enkei custom wheels....3-deuce or 6-deuce option....nice engraving to build seemingly stock '36....optional custom parts (smooth hood sides, LaSalle grille)...." '36 Ford Parking only" sign, blue flames & Goodguys decal.

#1 "Whistler" Mustang

(Revell #7197; one version; 1/25; 106 pieces; red, clear, clear red, chrome, vinyl tire)

This Mustang is one of a trio of Trans Am Mustangs that were retooled from the "7-11", "Motorcraft" and "Folger's" Mustangs released in 1987. The other two cars in this set are of course, the #25 Rousch Racing Mustang driven by Dorsey Schroeder (1989 series Championship winner) and the #4 John Player Special driven by Robert Lappalainen. The subject of this review will be the #1 Whistler Mustang prepared by Rousch Racing and driven by Dorsey Schroeder.

To start off, the body is all new and commendably flash-

free. It is comprised of six basic pieces (compared to five in the GTO cars): Basic upper body (with rear hatch molded in!), lift-off front end, rear taillight panel/bumper, lower front airdam and lower body sides. Hood pins, dzus fasteners and rivet detail appear in various locations on the body. When Revell tooled up this nice, new body, basically they split it at about the point where the molding runs down the body sides. On this particular car, that is fantastic because that is the paint separation line. They also tooled up half a dozen body latches which install on the rear bumper, doors and front end. The onlypossible problem I see with the body is the mirror location on the GTO cars seems too low in comparison with the Trans Am cars. The glass is also very nice, all installing from the outside. Retaining straps are molded to the glass, while the driver's 1/4 window contains a NACA duct.

The interior is the same excellent interior as in the GTO Mustangs with some updates. These updates include an ignition system now molded to the transmission cover and a window net (which was missing from the GTO's). Very nice dashboard with

excellent engraving.

The Boss engine is nice and consists of 14 pieces (21 if you include the headers and exhaust dumps) and has a very nice transmission molded to the block (I believe it is a Hewland). This engine assembly mounts into the GTO chassis. This chassis exhibits excellent engraving and details such as hoses and clamps molded in and routed along the roll cage where appropriate to air jacks at each corner of the car. This chassis mounts nice big and bigger BBS wheels onto Goodyear Eagle racing tires (unfortunately, lacking brake detail).

The instructions are typical Revell-clear and complete, giving painting details, and drawings detailing accurate decal

placement.

The decals are thin, colorful and exhibit good registration.

The airbrushed headlight decals are beautiful!

To sum up, A very nicely detailed kit which accurately captures the "slab-sided" Whistler Mustang. On a scale of 1 to 3 (Revell/Monogram's skill level scale, that is!), I would give this kit a 2 (more challenging!). So, if you are remotely into Fords, as the saying goes, "just do it!"

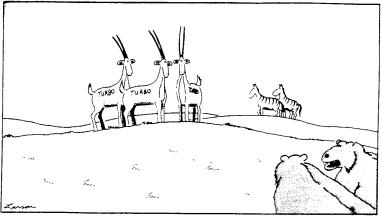

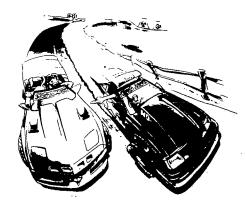
