"Essex Wire" 427 Cobra

(Monogram #2944; 1/24 scale; one version; 99 pieces; white, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

The legendary 427 Cobra. Supposedly able to accelerate from 0-100 and stop in only 12 seconds. Its designer, Carroll Shelby had but one goal in mind-merely to create the outright fastest car on the planet. Few would doubt his success. Racing Cobras such as the Essex Wire Cobra won the Manufacturer's championship

for three consecutive years.

This kit is based almost entirely upon Monograms earlier 427 Cobra SC kit. It contains the exact same chassis, the same awesome 7-liter, 427 cubic inch, 425 hp. big block, and the same basic body. There are but two subtle differences that set this car apart from the earlier issue- Monogram has tooled up the unique cut-down windscreen as well as relocating the rear view mirror. And saving the best for last, Monogram has tooled up a new, very nice set of Goodyear Sports Car Special tires! I have it on good authority from the sports car racing builders out there (Yeah, I'm talking about you, Brad!) that these tires are real nice and accurate. The last and somewhat obvious difference is the obvious addition of new decals to replicate the "Essex Wire" car.

In comparing the 427 Cobras and the new Vipers, both of which are quite obviously built by Mr. Shelby, the similarities are obvious. Engines of over 7-liters, horsepower of 400+, monstrous wheels and tires, and wheelbases of under 100 inches. One other thing is quite obvious-if Carroll Shelby's chili is half as good as his cars, I gotta get me some (at least I can afford the chili)!



1972 Chevrolet Corvette LT-1 Convertible

(AMT/ERTL #6080; 1/25 scale; one version; 107 pieces; light blue, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

Ahhh, the LT-1. The small block that pushed tachometers to their limits. And what better wrapper for the LT-1 than the car that pushed the limits of mass-marketable automotive design-the Corvette roadster. The 1972 roadster was extra-special in that it was the last Corvette roadster to feature a chromed front bumper (1973 saw the introduction of the endura nose).

This new AMT kit is an obvious descendant from their well done 1970 LT-1/ZR-1 coupe. I won't dwell on those areas that remain unchanged, I'll concentrate on the new features.

Looking at the engine we find the same 19-piece LT-1 assembly as in the '70 coupe. Gone from the instruction sheet are all references to the ZR-1 engine details (unshrouded distributor and ignition coil) although they are still included on the parts tree. Good. The instructions still tell you to incorrectly paint the intake and exhaust manifolds Chevy Red. The intake should be painted an aluminum color, and the exhaust manifolds should be a rusted or bare steel color.

Chassis, suspension, and exhaust components remain unchanged from the '70 kit. This means that contest modelers will have to fabricate a scale 2 1/2" exhaust system to be accurate. The kit exhaust is noticeably smaller that it should be for an LT-1 or even a ZR-1.

While the interior bucket, dash, and steering wheel remain unchanged, the seats have been upgraded to the '72 pattern. As has been AMT's practice lately, each seat was made from a different master. The wrinkles of the supple leather are different on each seat. Cheers to AMT for that. The interior door panels are still '70 patterns, though. But, the difference from '70 to '72 wasn't that great and this minor oversight shouldn't offend most people. The dash still uses a decal to represent the radio. Good.

The body is where the major changes were made. Yes, they lopped off the roof. But, they also relocated the rear deck vents, added the anchors for the top mounting cleats, and scribed the panel lines for the soft top storage compartment. The top of the windshield frame is also modified with new scribing and sun visors. The back corners of the fender gills are still not shaped right, but the beautiful new luggage rack draws your attention right away. The new soft up-top and optional hardtop look great. The well done plated rally wheels are still here but, the open ZR-1 rally wheels have been blocked off. Bad. Okay, what's with the "Good" and "Bad" comments? Well they're associated with the ZR-1 details from the '70 kit. You can build a '72 ZR-1 with this kit and a set of open Corvette rally wheels from Replicas and Miniatures Company of Maryland. Their open rallys are far superior to what was in the '70 kit anyway. Just use these wheels, the unshrouded distributor, and the ignition coil. Then just skip the radio decal and you've got a '72 ZR-1.

The decal sheet features a "No Parking except for Bob" sign, Chevrolet and Corvette street signs, a '72 'Vette owner's manual, and a set of Diplomatic license plates. The North Carolina license plates are dated 1975(?!). Sadly, the LT-1 hood strips no longer end in the correct sharp points as they did in the '70 kit.

Overall, this is a very well done kit. The chrome plating is perfect. The only down point s the door panels. No big deal. I, for one, am really hoping for the next iteration of this kit to be a base model small block with a correct small block hood and finned wheel covers.

Some random kudos to AMT for their recent habit of thanking the owners of the full size cars that were used in making the kits. These thank you's are appearing on the instruction sheets. Also on the instruction sheets (as well as on the boxes) lately are toll-free assistance numbers.

Dodge Viper RT/10

(AMT #6808; 1/25 scale; one version; 122pieces; light gray, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

Dodge Viper. Chrysler Corporation's latest sex symbol. From concept to showroom in only three years (if we believe Mr. Iacocca), courtesy of the Viper design team headed by none other than Carroll Shelby, the man responsible for the original pavement-ripping 427 Shelby Cobras and Mustangs. A 488 cu. in., 400 hp. V10-powered 2-seater, land-based missle built for the sole purpose of unseating he Chevrolet Corvette ZR-1 as "King of the Hill". Do you think Chevy is worried about this upstart? Rumor is that there is a twelve cylinder Corvette (ZR-12) currently being flogged at GM proving grounds. You be the judge. At any rate, if you haven't placed your order for this latest snake from ol' Shel, then forget it. The first year's production run of 200 are already sold at a cool \$50,000 apiece. However, interested parties can own the AMT version for about \$49,990 less. Interested? Read on.

The body is molded nearly flash-free in six pieces (and herein lies the first small problem)-the hood, passenger compartment, front bumper, rear bumper, valence, and separate roll bar. Yes, AMT molded the roll bar (don't let Chrysler hear you call it that!) separately, meaning that there will be a seam evident unless you fill it prior to painting.

The 25-piece V10 engine with its unique red intake set-up is very nicely done. Once built and painted in accordance with the instructions, it looks very realistic. I can forsee this engine's use in quite a few different projects (a V10-powered Hiboy?!?) as

soon as this kit is readily available.

The chassis is incredible! It is comprised of about 37 pieces (!) which include poseable steering, four-wheel independent suspension with coil-over shocks, and four-wheel disc brakes. Detail engraving includes a Viper logo on the center section of the differential (which is unfortunately covered once assembled)!

The wheels and tires are yet another piece of work from the boys at AMT! The wheels are beautiful, satin-finish big and bigger Viper rims with the Viper logo legible in the center cap. They mount into beautiful big and bigger Michelin XGT Z tires sizes P275/40ZR 17 (front) and P335/35 ZR 17 (rear) replete with directional tread markings as these puppies are uni-directional.

The interior builds up on the chassis and consists of 10 pieces and it looks like a snug fit! The seats are done from two different molds (the wrinkles are in different places!). The dashboard exhibits reasonable detail. The pedal assembly mounts

to the firewall.

The glass is a good news/bad news situation. The good news is that AMT molded the windshield and the frame as a unit. They also included nicely textured sunvisors as an integral part of this unit. Also included on this clear tree is the Vipers unique clear back-up lenses. The bad news is that for some reason AMT chose to mold the headlight and parking light covers in a darker, clear plastic similar to the Dodge Stealth.

The instructions are a work of art unto themselves! They are not only done in typical 90's AMT fashion-step by step, with part identification and painting instructions, they even include a drawing of the dashboard which identifies the various gauges found therein. This is apparently such a milestone car, that AMT

has included a supplemental instruction sheet which details the engine build-up and wheel/tire assembly. To top this all off, the rear of this supplemental sheet includes all the specifications of this beast for all you specification freaks out there. For example, did you know that the Vipers firing order is 1, 10-9, 4-3, 6-5, 8-7, 2 (unequal firing 90 degree and 54 degree intervals)? Or that it has a 22 gallon fuel tank? An 11 quart crankcase capacity?

The decals are quite minimal, and are limited to your choice of a red or white "Viper" windshield band, Michigan non-vanity plates, and "Viper RT/10" plates.

The parts count in this kit is incredible. The level of engraving is also very good. This kit will be a veritable gold mine of parts for kitbash projects (engine, wheels, tires, chassis components, etc.). In my humble opinion, this kit is well worth the money AMT charges for it and is probably still a bargain at twice the price!


