20th Anniversary Pontiac-Oakland Club Grand National Convention by: Tim Sickle

The 20th Anniversary Pontiac-Oakland National convention was recently held under beautiful skies in Gaithersburg, Maryland. This was the first time a national convention was held on the east coast, and from all indications, it was quite successful. In talks with one of the show promoters, 300 cars were preregistered before the show even started on Thursday, July 8. Final figures were unavailable at press time but take your humble editor's word for it, they had quite a turnout! I knew I would have a good time when, in walking across the hotel parking lot, I was very nearly run down by a restored original 1970 GTO Judge resplendent in its Orbit Orange paint job, rumbling from its twin tailpipes (Ed. Note: In 1970, Pontiac nicknamed this car "The Humbler" and I can see why!).

It made no difference where your tastes ran, they had something for everybody. Starting with some original, restored Oaklands from the 30's, you could find fuel injected Bonnevilles, Tri Power Bonnevilles, 2 + 2's, Tempests, Grand Prixs. However, the emphasis seemed to be on Pontiac muscle with many fine examples of it in attendance with every year GTO, and Firebird represented. GTOs present included the "first musclecar" '64 vintage, the lithe '65-67's, the sleek '68-'72's, and even included the "option status" GTOs of 1973 and 1974. Everywhere you looked, all you could see were GTOs so clean, you could eat off of any part of them, lots of chrome and first and foremost, that most magical

of all GTO options, Tri Power!

The Firebirds were well represented as well. Anything from the first generation 1967 Firebirds, from Overhead cam 6s to 400s, 350 HOs, to the first Trans Am ('69). The second generation ('70-'81) was well represented also. '70-'73 Trans Ams equipped with anything from the stock 400 to the rip-snorting 455HO and 455SD could be easily found. The third generation was also even represented with a 1991 1LE Trans Am (supposedly one of only 17

produced!) and a 1991 Formula.

Painting Lights and Markers by: Chris Breeze

Most newer kits come with lights and markers in appropriate colors, already molded in clear red and amber. However, many of the older kits, and re-issued ones display a real lack of quality in this area. So a few simple steps will help your lights look more realistic.

Chrome Headlights:

Many older kits came with the headlights and bumpers molded together, then universally chromed. Headlights are not chrome, nor do they look chrome. You can easily change their appearance by taking flat white paint and "washing" it over the chrome lens area. using a little paint thinner will make the white flow easier and show off some of the chrome from the underside of the paint. If nothing else, this will add a contrasting look to the lenses

These same old front ends had molded turn signals in them as well. Either base coat them in white and then overcoat with amber, or use the amber straight up. Never leave these untouched


or the models will look like promos or toys.


Also, if you have to paint chrome tail lights or marker lights, several methods may be utilized. You can base coat the light with a darker hue of red or orange, then overcoat with TESTOR'S Turn Signal Amber or Stop Light Red. This will give the appearance of the lights being off. If you simply apply the amber or red paint over the chrome without the basecoat, it will appear translucent as if the light is on.

Clear Lenses:

If you have red tail light lenses and want to change their appearance, several methods may be employed. Painting the rear of the lens with white will brighten them, painting them with solid red will darken them. Chrome foil may be used on the car body or paint the area behind he tail light flat white. I would suggest the latter if you are painting the car a dark color.

Turn signals and marker lights are often overlooked by model builders. Since most marker lights are molded into he body, you should either foil them or paint them flat white and overcoat them with the amber or red. Do not use chrome silver paint and try to topcoat it, or you will end up with a grubby looking mess.

Tri-Axle Gravel Trailer (AMT # 8628, Retail cost \$18.00)

This is a long-awaited re-issue of a very popular trailer that now commands a price of about \$80.00 in the original box. I was eagerly anticipating delivery on this AMT classic and had actually never seen it in its original form. I must confess to some disappointment at what finally arrived. Not that the kit was unsatisfactory to the point that I would pass it up, however there were quite a few shortcomings and some major defects in this kit.

The kit was molded in Grey only, with 12 very nice hollow rubber tires and clear red for lenses (no orange marker lights as one would expect for a trailer). There were 86 major parts not counting the tail light lenses, which makes this a rather simplistic kit.

Features include rolling axles, air lines, hydraulic lines,

opening tail gate and the hopper can be in either full up or full down position. The molding is very nice with virtually no flash. One good feature which might be debatable is the fact that the wheels were unusually free of chrome. Most AMT kits come with chromed wheels, and in most cases I paint them, especially on utility trailers or fleet trucks. But it is far easier to paint over chrome, than trying to match chrome over plain plastic. So this is certainly a debatable proposition. One of the best features, which was a surprise, since it is not noted on the kit box, is the extra part if you desire to build a regular dump body rather than a trailer. It comes with a complete modification set including an over-cab protector, an extended exhaust stack, frame rails, and the hopper is marked inside for modifying it for the short version. On the short side of this kit, there were some rather obvious failures. The trailer was double-walled, but the tailgate wasn't, which made for a rather unpleasant appearance in the back side of the mold. This had to be covered with sheet styrene to match the hopper. Also, the inside of the trailer support struts that support the trailer when it isn't attached to the cab were devoid of an inside cover or crossmember. Both of these areas needed correction. The "legs" could only be assembled in either the up or down position. The hydraulic fluid reservoir had no bottom to it and was not designed to be mounted on the trailer frame but rather an accompanying tractor. The rear of the trailer was designed to have a pin hitch for tandem trailers as well as rings for emergency chains. Only after these items were added did I realize that they inhibited the trailers full upward tilt (not that it mattered much, since it will remain down in my collection, but it is these stupid design flaws that try one's patience). The most obvious defect was the fact that the trailer has a nasty twist in it. It is somewhat more than slight, about 1/8", but it is obvious when sighting down the trailer's length.

Scratch-built items added to the trailer include a slide chute for sand. This was designed to be operated by compressed air cylinders on either side of the chute. It is movable, so it may be opened or closed. Also, a tarp frame (as required by most states now) and a cargo of sand will be added over a styrofoam

Overall, the kit is a pleasant addition to my ever-increasing collection of trucks, and somewhat overpriced for the number of parts, the occasional lack of detail and poor design, but I am still very glad AMT has decided to re-issue it. I have another on

order.

Sneakin' a Peek!

This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes!

* Batskiboat (AMT #6615): Molded in black....Snapfast Plus kit....Box art changed to Cartoon-style (for the kids?).... ...minimal piece count (less than 20 pieces)....typically good AMT instructions w/painting suggestions and building tips.

* Snapfast "Purolator" Lumina (AMT #8722): Molded in White/Black....uncharacteristically fuzzy decals....(red) checkerboard provided, leaving builder to paint front half of car proper color....nearly flash-free....usually good instructions....colorful box art using photos of actual car.

* Snapfast "Motorcraft" T-Bird (AMT #8730): Molded in Red/black....nice, crisp Motorcraft markings....remainder

similar to "Purolator" Lumina above.

Snapfast Viper (AMT #6456): Molded in RT/10Red/Black....deeply windshield tinted and headlight "Big covers....separate roll bar (similar to Brother")....big and bigger open-backed Michelin XGTZ tires....strange extra plastic "rim" evident between spokes of big and bigger Viper wheels....separate mirrors.

Snapfast Ford F-150 XLT (AMT #8739): Molded in Lt. Blue/black....tailgate trim decal, Ohio plates, nice "strobe" stripes....very nicely done F150 body w/all trim and emblems....odd-looking front bumper...rear step bumper and hard tonneau cover....Ford 10-hole mags....plastic opentires w/nice backed Firestone sidewall detail....instructions include painting instructions "big brother").

* "Philips 66" T-Bird (AMT #8754): Molded in Lt. Gray.....
..again, great box art using photos of actual car...colorful

decals....remainder identical to earlier T-Birds.


