1992 NMCA Flowmaster Muffler Muscle Challenge

August 29, 1992 turned out to be a beautiful day to be outdoors with sunshine and temperatures in the 80's with a light breeze. To make the day a little more enjoyable, if you can spend the day at a combination car show, flea market, drag race, and model car contest, all the better!

Unfortunately, the turnout for this "national" meet at Maple Grove Dragaway in Reading, Pa. was not quite what I had expected. The model car show fared somewhat better though from the looks of it. The Junior classes seemed to be teeming with some nice

pieces. (Note: See related item in "Bits & Pieces"!).

The drag racing portion of the event provided some surprises as well as entertainment. Some of the cars in attendance were Rod Saboury's street-legal mid-8 second '57 'Vette with vanity plates reading "INTHE8S" (Ed. Note: This car is featured in last month's Hot Rod magazine's Top 10 Fastest street legal cars shootout), an unnamed blue '68 Camaro also running mid-8's (purportedly running a small block!), Barrie Poole's 11 second 68 Mustang Cobra Jet (the winner of the "Clash of the cubes"), as well as runner-up Bob Karakashian's potent 11 second Six Pack Superbee, and a handful of former Super Stock race cars including a '62 Dodge packing a 413(and sounding really radical!), a '63 Plymouth with a 426 wedge, a '63 lightweight Galaxie with a 427, a '62 Super Duty Catalina packing a dual quad. 421, a '64 Thunderbolt with the 427, and a '64 GTO packing a 455 with vintage 421 engine pieces on it. These guys were runnin' anywhere from 10.90 to about 11.23.All in all, they put on quite a show.

Meanwhile, out on the show field were not one but three L-79 Chevy II's, a '66 427 cu. in., 425 hp. Impala (complete down to and including the B.F. Goodrich blackwall tires with stickers still on 'em!), a '69 Torino Cobra, a few AMX's (one of these a tubbed-out, custom-painted beauty!), and not one, but two 1970 Mercury Cyclone Spoilers which were identical down to their stripes! They were both bright orange with black interiors and stripes. These cars were rare enough in their day that if you saw one at a show, you were doing something, but to see twins at the same show, wild! The nice thing about the car show was that they had classes for both modified musclecars as well as classes for late model muscle and EFI (Electronic Fuel Injection) cars. Several Buick Grand Nationals, 5.0 Mustangs and 1 or 2 Formula Firebirds were seen dukin' it out (Ed. Note: 1 5.0 Mustang was runnin' low 12's). Mucho entertainment!

To sum up, there were bright spots within this sparsely-attended meet. I hope that the powers-that-be can "pump up" attendance to make a "2nd Annual...." a reality whether it be through more publicity, or a date change simply because this meet is within driving distance of the Baltimore, Washington area and the reasonable admission (\$8.00 per day) gave you free run of the grounds (including the pits!) to get those final photos you so desperately need to complete your latest Musclecar project!









1959 Cadillac Eldorado

(Monogram #2957; 1/25 scale; one version; 157 pieces; Pink, white, black, clear, clear red, chrome, vinyl tires, aluminum mylar sheet)

Long ago in a galaxy far, far away, we learned from the pages of Scale Auto Enthusiast that the forthcoming Caddy kit from Monogram would be the most detailed American-made model car kit in American history. Armed with that knowledge (Ed. Note: A little knowledge can be dangerous, Lyle!), I was still unprepared for what I discovered in the box. For the first hour, I stared at the excellent instruction sheet discovering things heretofore unheard of in a car kit. Could there really be a chrome mylar vanity mirror that attaches to the right-side sun visor?!? Is there really a complete A/C system consisting of a compressor, condenser, freon tank, and plastic hoses with fittings?!? Do you really assemble the oil filter from THREE PIECES?!? I'll begin at

the beginning (Ed. Note: As good a place as any, Lyle!).

Body: Is "perfect" too strong a word? This pink work of art has no mold lines or flaws of any kind-simply wash and paint! The hood, of course, is separate with nice underside detail. The detail on the two separate hood hinged is incredible (No, they don't actually work). A separate chromed windshield frame and cowl panel is added to the body. Then, there are separate, chromed vent window frames with separate vent window "glass"! There are four separate chrome "spears" to be added to the fins, but they should NOT be either separate or chromed (I'll address this little problem a little later). A hard cover convertible boot is provided along with an up-top molded in white with bow detail evident on the inside. The front and rear grilles/bumpers are chrome works of art. Four clear headlight lenses and four parking light lenses are provided. Eight separate pieces comprise the rear bumper (i.e. clear back-up lights, clear red reflectors, chrome emblems, license plate frame, and a license plate printed on the mylar sheet. Lets not forget the separate, chromed door handles(1), windshield wipers and two-piece outside mirrors. Several die-cut shapes are provided on the mylar sheet for the body chrome. I have never had much luck with these stick-on mylar pieces in other kits and I'll bet most modelers will use Bare Metal foil, as usual.

Chassis: Not counting wheels and tires, the chassis is comprised of 20 parts. Left and right exhaust systems with integral mufflers and resonators are provided and, yes, each and every clamp and pipe hanger is molded on! Air-Ride bags and shocks are supplied for all four corners. A Monogram-style simplified front suspension holds separate upper A-arms and a stabilizer bar. The rear axle comprises two pieces and mounts to a control yoke. (Ok In front of God and everybody, I don't know what a "control yoke" is!). Obviously there is a driveshaft and also a steering box. Simple backing plates hold gorgeous B.F. Goodrich Silvertown tires with separate whitewall inserts, although the white inserts appear to be just a wee bit too narrow. These tires will surely appear on many 50's era Street Rods. The chromed Eldorado wheel covers, unique to this Caddy series, must

be viewed with a magnifying glass to be appreciated. The detail is incredible, especially after adding he Caddy center emblems from the mylar sheet (You younger guys can probably use your Factory

Stock eyeballs for this task).

Engine: The engine consists of 36 separate parts! Yes, I said 36! Just to highlight the "unusual" items, there is a threepiece, three belt pullet system, a three-piece oil filter and bracket, a three-piece air compressor, a two-piece cruise control unit, a two-piece air cleaner for the stock three deuce carb setup, and upper and lower hoses. Of course, all the "normal" sepa-

rate engine pieces are there as well.

Engine Compartment: In addition to the assembled engine, the following items are present underhood: radiator, frame and shroud, condenser, freon tank, A/C hoses, assembled dual horns, battery, two-piece washer bottle, separate wiper motor, air tank, firewall accessory assembly, master cylinder, heater blower motor......Wheeeeww!! The only items not provided by Monogram are plug wires and carb linkage but even if you added them, who th' hell would notice?!?

Interior: This sub-assembly is a model unto itself. The detailing is exceptional. The interior builds up Revell-style from the floor pan, which features engraved floor mats, carpet seams and a high-beam foot button and gas pedal. A separate brake pedal mounts to the floor. Above is a highly detailed dash, separate steering column with thin shifter and signal lever and a two-piece steering wheel (separate chromed horn ring). The gauges are very finely and accurately engraved but should be very challenging to detail. The separate door/side panels are simply the best I've ever seen. Separate chromed bezels holding clear red lenses are added to the door panels (These red interior lights on the doors lit when the doors were opened to be seen, hopefully, by oncoming drivers in the dark). The rear seat bottom is molded to the floor pan but the back rest is separate, then a chromed top bar with speaker grille is added. The modeler has an option of front scats; either a two-piece bench scat, or (2) twopiece buckets. Separate sun visors are added to the windshield frame in addition to a mirror.

Problems: There are three, but they are minor.

1. Monogram chose to put their copyright in the center of the gas tank but it can be sanded off without

damaging surrounding detail.

2. The windshield frame and cowl are one, chromed unit but should be body color between the cowl louvers and the lower frame. With careful masking, this should be

easily achieved.

3. The spears on the sides of the fins were stamped themselves-they were not separate into the fins pieces. They were always body color simply because they were part of the car-not an add-on. These should be de-chromed and carefully molded in prior to painting. In the real world, there are a few chrome spear "covers". These were aftermarket add-ons and were not factory equipment. Larry Boothe informed me that these add-ons could be purchased from the J.C. Whitney catalog in the early 60's.

A decade ago, Monogram set the standard for NASCAR models. '59 Cadillac kit completely blows away the previous standards for Replica Stock modeling. Kirk Bell and the gang at Scale Auto Enthusiast can save themselves much time and effort by eliminating the Kit of the Year Survey. Why, you ask? Quite simply, this is the Kit of the Year! No survey is necessary!

* "The Christie" American Steam Fire Engine (AMT #8121): Molded in red and black....2 pages of instructions....intricate, large decal sheet...excellent

box art (huge box!).

* "The General" Steam Locomotive (AMT #8124): Molded in red and black....3 pages of instructions....again, excellent box art (and large box!).
