

\* 1969 Firebird 400 (AMT #6123): Molded in Lt. Gray....includes both 400 cu. in. engine and OHC 6 cylinder....also includes both 400 style and T/A style hoods.....excellent instructions w/color combinations...... minimal decals include T/A striping...T/A spoiler...single exhaust system for 6-cylinder included, stock, unscooped hood not included.

# 1959 Chevrolet Impala Convertible

(Monogram #2437; 138 pieces; Metallic blue, white, clear, clear red,

tires w/whitewall inserts, chrome, self-adhesive seat pattern vinyl inserts)

After writing kit reviews for the newsletter for over four years, finally a kit comes along that I am actually qualified to review! Having owned and restored a 1960 Impala for almost four years, I am intimately familiar with this vehicle. But this is a '59!Well, '59 and '60 Impalas were identical from the roof to the dash to the wheel covers with only the sheet metal being different. These were HUGE cars, almost capable of carrying a Geo Storm in the trunk. You could stand inside of the front fenders to change the spark plugs if you wanted to.

As expected, this kit is extremely well detailed and is equal in every respect to the '59 Cadillac kit introduced last year. Compared to the Caddy kit, there are a few less parts, mostly under the hood, because the real

Chevy had fewer parts.

The Body: Although the color of the plastic approximates "Harbor Blue", this kit is obviously aimed at adult modelers and will surely be painted. The proportions and level of engraving is excellent. Separate chromed side spears are provided and fit into indentations in the body. The alternate body color can be brush painted into the chrome spear prior to assembly. The separate pieces that attach to the body would take up most of the page. To name a few: chromed windshield and "glass", separate vent window frames, sun visors, fender ornaments, wipers, door handles, Foxcraft (dealer-installed) fender skirts, etc. etc. Two sets of bumpers are provided; one set standard and one set with front bumper guards and rear continental kit. The "eyebrow" air vents mount into the front fenders with the upper chrome trim attaching to the hood, as on the real car (Larry will be happy to know that there is no "ghost line" around the hood emblem as on the '59 Caddy). The body is not perfect, however. There are slight sink marks along the top surface of the rear fins. Mold release lines are under the fins and will require careful sanding. At best, it will be a tedious task to correctly apply metal foil to the edges of the fins.

The Chassis: Not counting the wheel assemblies, the chassis is comprised of twenty separate pieces. All the "normal" components are provided in addition to a separate rear control arm, stabilizer bar, steering gearbox and shaft. The chassis pan itself has an amazing level of engraving. Not found on the real car however is the Monogram trademark behind the front wheel opening which can be easily sanded away! Simple backing plates hold "no name" tires with separate whitewall inserts. The tires are slightly smaller than those found in the '59 Caddy kit. Ironically, the B.F. Goodrich Silvertown tires (from the Caddy kit) are the correct, factory equipment tires for the Impala. Monogram must have felt that they were too large. Anyway, the kit-supplied tires look good. Standard Impala wheel covers are provided with four separate, factoryoptional spinners which mount to the centers of the wheel covers. If you intend to use the spinners with the fender skirts, test-fit everything

Engine/Underhood Area: The 348 tri-carb engine is built up from 25 pieces including both radiator hoses, power steering pump, two-piece air cleaner, etc. The radiator wall receives the radiator, fan shroud, and battery. A washer fluid tank, master cylinder, wiper motor, and ignition coil are separate items which mount to the firewall. A pedal assembly attaches to the interior side of the firewall. Two chromed (?) hood hinges are provided that allow the hood to swing open.

Interior: The main components of the platform-style interior are molded in white plastic with excellent engraved detail. After the two-piece front seat and rear seat are painted, vinyl "peel and stick" decals are applied with printed seat patterns in either red or aqua. These seat patterns really enhance the interior and are a great idea although they somewhat limit the color choices for the model. The dash assembles from three pieces, the lower portions being chromed with all of the correct engraving. The steering column has integral turn signal and shift levers.

The instruction sheet indicates that all interior pieces be painted one color. Although this is correct, the majority of '59 and '60 Impalas had two-tone interiors i.e. red/white, black/white, beige/brown, blue/dark blue, etc. A nicely engraved, realistic convertible boot is provided in addition to a white "up" top.

Monogram does not provide a list of factory colors as often found in

ERTL kits so I'll provide them-free of charge (Whatta Guy!):

Gothic Gold Classic Cream Satin Beige Cameo Coral Snowcrest White Grecian Gray Roman Red

Frost Blue Harbor Blue Crown Sapphire Highland Green Aspen Green Tuxedo Black



What did you expect-an actual color matrix chart?!? Seriously, I do have tons of reference material which I will lend to MAMA members.

To give our editor a break (Ed. Note: Who, me?), I did not mention every part or detail in this kit. Unless you have been living in the Biosphere for the past year, you must be familiar with the '59 Cadillac kit by now. This kit is equal in every way and firmly puts Monogram on the same shelf with the detailed imported kits. This, however, brings up a sore point-again. Why does this \$15.00 kit have exposed chrome and glass trees sliding around on the bottom of the box while the parts that are going to be painted are in a bag?!? For the money, Revellogram could toss them in

Otherwise, this kit is fantastic! (Ed. Note: Didja kinda get the idea

he liked it?)





An Aftermarket Report by Norman F. Veber

I know you are probably all thinking, "how can this guy report objectively on other aftermarket products when he is in the business himself?" Well....actually, you may have a point there, so I'll throw out a little disclaimer here to protect MAMA and other guilty parties:

WARNING: The following article may be overly biased, with lots of subjective malarkey thrown in by the author. The views and opinions expressed here may not be in line with those of MAMA or its members.

So with that said, proceed at your own risk. Reading any further may get you where it hurts most, your wallet.

Yes, the aftermarket company I am going to write about, Model Garage' in West Palm Beach, run by Bob Korunow, has some really neat stuff. You may. even want to get some of it. Having said that, this article may get me where it hurts most, my wallet, especially if you end up spending your model dollars at the Model Garage instead of at RMCM.

Just in case you haven't heard of Bob Korunow, allow me to refresh your memory. His Plum Crazy Plymouth Satellite won the Best Paint Award at

the Mecca of all model car contests, Salt Lake.

That "Best Paint" Award has rather overshadowed other outstanding aspects of this 1/24th scale Satellite, one being the nifty photo-etched parts Bob did for the model. And now you too can put these parts on that

recently released '71 Satellite kit from Monogram (Sorry, you'll have to provide your own spectacular paint job!). Among the parts in this set are the grille (beautifully thin, I might add), "Satellite", "Plymouth", two sizes of "440" scripts, door handles, door locks, nose badge and the hood grilles. Did I mention that there are two other scripts available so you can do a Roadrunner or a GTX?!? The rest of the parts in these two sets are the same as the Satellite.

These are only a few of the neat things in Bob's already extensive catalog of model car details. Send him an SASE for the Model Garage at 537

S. Sequoia Dr. #309, West Palm Beach, FL 33409.

Bob is an accomplished machinist so he has some turned aluminum parts. These include air cleaners, large, small, and dual carb. A recess is machined in the side to accept a strip of stainless steel mesh screen, which is also supplied with the air cleaners. The large and small air cleaners have a slightly coned top with a nice bead on the outer edge and a dimple in the center where the fastener goes. Wing nuts are not provided, but I just happen to know that RMCM has some very nice photo-etched ones in their line (I know, I know, more shameless promotion! So, what do you want, objective reporting?!?).

There are five pulley drive sets: a single or double belt set for Street Rod and stock engines, a blower set, a Pro Street blower set and NASCAR pulley drives for GM or Ford. The pulleys are turned aluminum, of course, and very nice. A new and innovative addition to these pulley drive sets is the belt material. No more balloons or "rubber bands". Model Garage uses "O-rings". The blower belts look especially good. They are flat, wide, and have thickness to them, just like the 1:1 belts. What a concept!

Do you like moon discs for that early 60's rod? Bob has a large set,

for 15" rims, and a set of "baby moons". Bob says these are 1/25th scale.

The next product offered by Model Garage is engine wiring. I have to be careful here, as I can't afford to have Dirk at Detail Master get on my case, so don't tell him that I mentioned that Bob offers spark plug wire in several colors and also has heater hose on the way. Dirk probably shouldn't know about some of the photo-etched details either, like door locks (a package of 9), or spring shackles (a set of 4, enough to raise 1 car).

Rounding out Bob's line of products are things like throttle springs (package of 5), NASCAR window net, underhood insulation material, stainless and brass wire mesh screen (3" X 2 1/2"-150 mesh), replacement polishing

cloth and seat belt material.

So, there you have it, another source for some really neat details to jazz up your next model project. Dirk, I guess this means that you and I are going to have to really get out there and "kick some butt" to stay one

step ahead of these upstarts.

I had the privilege of meeting and talking with Bob at the IPMS Nationals held in Atlanta, GA in July. At that time he handed me a handful of his products for our MAMA raffle. So, look for these parts on the raffle table at the next few meetings, as I will be putting the Model Garage detail parts out a few packs at a time. Using a little blatant plagiarism, I'll steal a line from Evan Hermel. Evan....er, I mean....Norm says, check



1962 Chevrolet Bel Air 409

(AMT/ERTL #8716; 1/25th scale; 109 pieces; gray, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

"She's real fine, my 409" (Federal law mandates that all reviews of

this kit or the real car start with these Beach Boy lyrics.) Fortunately, this long-awaited kit is also real fine. Throughout, the engraving on all

of the components is just plain impressive.

The Body: Molded in light gray, it is flash-free and appears to be very accurate. You have to look closely to find the only two mold release lines at the bottom of the rear roof pillars. Under the separate hood, the fenders are separated by a very accurate framework with hood latch plate, identical to the real thing. The underhood frame and latch are nicely but, of course, has that scribed cutout for a hole like almost every car kit (poopie, heck and darn!). A separate, chromed trim piece is added to the front of the hood with the word "CHEVROLET" correctli indented. Separate hood hinges are provided for an open hood display. The bumpers do not have that old chromed mold line-thanks, ERTL. The grille is deeply engraved and can be opened from the rear using a low speed Dremel (this works- I've done it already). Clear headlight and clear red tail light lenses are provided, along with a separate, perfectly chromed rear bumper (Duh!). The "glass" includes full side windows with engraved edge frame to be covered with foil. There is one glaring omission, though. The bright metal molding strip around the tail panel is missing. This, however, can be added with foil after the body is painted.

Regarding the body, a warning may be appropriate here. Because the roof pillars are very accurate (thin!), they may be bent or completely broken when the box is opened. I bought two kits and they were perfect but other MAMA members have reported 4 broken bodies so far. I suppose you could call the ERTL toll-free customer hotline and hope the replacement

body is not also broken or just fix the one you have. Life is cruel!

The Engine is comprised of 25 pieces. The T-10 transmission exhibits excellent engraving. The oil pan is separate, eliminating the need to fill seams. Upper and lower radiator hoses are present along with an intake manifold breather tube. The exhaust manifolds appear to be very accurate. Both large and small "409" decals are provided for the valve covers. The two-piece air cleaner is assembled using the dual snorkle bottom plate fitted to the carbs and the round top plate with engraved wing nut-just like the real McCoy! Optional speed goodies include a Mickey Thompson cross-ram manifold (although, I can't say I've actually seen one of these in the real world), finned Offy valve covers, and two small, nicely-done custom air cleaners.

The Chassis is nicely done and receives 17 suspension and exhaust pieces to complete the assembly. The front suspension is simplified but all the pieces are separate, allowing posable steering with minimal work. A circa 1958 metal axle slides inside the rear end housing. The factory steel wheels appear accurate and the slots can be easily opened using the same low speed Dremel. Separate, small '62 Chevy hubcaps are provided. Simple backing plates and standard-issue AMT Firestone tires complete the rolling stock. Opyional, body-color five-spoke mags are nicely dobne and can be painted to represent magnesiuum spokes and aluminum rims. A sparse firewall (the real one is also sparse!) receives a heater box and master cylinder. The two-piece radiator assembly holds a detailed battery with very detailed cable clamps included. The builder need only add the wires.

The Interior is outstanding in this kit, with engraved details that exceed any other ERTL offering. The interior builds up from the floor pan/rear package tray. Strangely, the floor pan includes an engraved "Go" pedal which is too long and a non-factory floor mat on the drivers side only. The separate door panels are impressive with details including mounting screws along the bottom and air vent grills (these are <u>not</u> speaker grills as almost every reviewer labelled them in the Revell '69 Camaro!). The dash panel is highly detailed right down to the individual heater control levers and includes integral brake, clutch and emergency brake pedals. The factory patterns are engraved on the pedal pads! The engraver missed the mark slightly on the horizontal speedometer, making the numbers too large, thereby skipping every other number, i.e. 10, 30, 50, etc. However, when detail painted and assembled in the car, this won't be

noticed. The steering wheel with engraved horn ring and chromed floor shifter are dead on the money. The bench seats are very well engraved although the "solid vinyl" sections at the ends of the seats should be wider (Nitpicking to the max!). The factory-installed Sun column-mounted tach is the correct shape but may benefit from the use of an aftermarket

The decal sheet includes race numbers, "409 H.P." hood markings, some early-era sponsor decals, and the aforementioned valve cover emblems. Also included are 1/32nd scale (?!?) license plates that read "BELAIR" (I guess the printer had a rough night!). Of particular interest is a Late Great Chevrolet Club window decal in 1/25th scale.

Other things you can do with this kit: (Settle down Ford fans, this is

a family-oriented publication!)

The assembled chassis, engine, and underhood items will fit right into an AMT '63 or '64 Impala. These components are also perfect for the Hasegawa '65 Impala and they fit. These kit components would be the natural choice to build a detailed Modelhaus '61 Impala. Maybe a certain Chevy freak club member will master a '62 Impala jardtop for another club member to resin cast. Maybe Andersen will do a two-door post sedan for cop car

The point is, this kit should sell very well on its own merits in addition all the kit-bashing possibilies. It was well worth the wait for this kit because it is actually "real fine."
