Mack Truck: DM-800 with Rex Cement Mixer Mfr: MPC

Scale: 1/25th

Cost: Determined by Market

This kit is one of the finer obsolete kits on the market today, if you can still locate one. They are available in very limited quantities, and prices range from \$75.00 to over \$150.00. The kit was produced by MPC when it was part of the General Mills Fun Group in Mount Clemens, Michigan. It was one of the only truck and trailer kits produced by MPC in its short life, and is certainly a noteworthy legacy of the now-defunct company. AMT recently reissued the three-axle trailer which was also an early MPC kit, which incidentally had been designed as a companion to the Mack DM-800 road tractor.

This truck has an unusual design, with a set back axle (mounted to the

rear of the engine) and high-mounted springs which gives enormous ground clearance. Combined with a strange hood configuration of both a split hood and tilt front fenders, this gave the driver easy access to the entire engine compartment, but gave the truck a "geeky" look. Nevertheless, the DM-800 was a very powerful construction vehicle and is replicated quite well in this kit.

The kit was molded in red, white, chrome, clear, and black parts, many of which are not matched to each other, causing the builder to have to paint everything in order for it to look right, whereas lot of kits today can be built with little or no painting. Clear parts were molded clean and distortion-free. The engine (47 parts) is a highly-detailed V-8 turbodiesel with single stack exhaust. Most of todays kits have large, inline sixes, so this was a pleasant change of pace. The chassis (132 parts) was elongated to accommodate the detailed cement mixer (59 parts) which included a very large drum, hopper, four chutes, ladders, water tank, etc. This is the larger of the two mixers available on th obsolete market, the other being the rarer Kenworth Challenge Mixer, which is quite small by comparison. The mixer has the power transfer for the hydraulic pumps, hydraulic lines, oil storage, and the controls, much of which are chrome.


The cab of the truck was the unusual shape Mack designed for the DM-600 and DM-800. From head on, the truck looks lopsided as the windshield is not in line with the hood or chassis. It was also highly detailed (7 major parts) and a nice interior (26 parts) with tandem seats, large heater, and numerous power take-off levers. The cab came with an optional air conditioner, chrome air cleaner, mirrors, cab lights, marker lights, all the


Tires were oversized Goodyears molded in one piece soft vinyl, rather fat to carry the anticipated heavy loads. The rims were five spokers, molded in chrome (Yuk), so they eventually got painted. No Concrete company in the world would order chrome wheels for a cement truck.

Final touches include: a two-tone green paint scheme, with the frame, wheels, front fenders, and cement accessories in dark green, with the cab and rear fenders and main cement drum in "Jade" green, which looks like a seafoam green in my humble opinion. The truck was custom lettered with dry transfer lettering on clear decal film. The original kit decals were so old and cracked as to be unusable. I would not have used them anyway since they were a weird red, white, and blue scheme that reeked of Bicentennial Americana and was too dumb to even consider. I also swapped out the rear fenders which extended far beyond the rear axle and gave the truck a "heavy" look to the rear quarter. Finally, water lines and hoses were added for realism. Otherwise, the thing went together well, everything fit as planned by MPC and it was well worth the huge price I paid for it. My first DM-800 cost \$125.00, the second I purchased from the same man...) was only \$75.00....go figure. Now if General Foods would only include these things in cereal boxes, I would be very grateful! Note: I would not suggest this kit for a beginner!

... the kids don't get to go to the beach this year because it falls


on the same day as the Big model show.
