



1971-72(?) Pontiac GTO

(Doyusha #7359; 1/24th or 1/25th scale; less than 50 pieces; White, clear, chrome, vinyl tires)

The Pontiac GTO. The Goat. The Great Onc. There weren't many late model GTO kits made (the last being the 1972 MPC kit). The 1973 and 1974 were totally forgotten by the "Little Three" (and by many full size Goat owners as well!). Well, another GTO kit surfaces, this time from the Japanese firm Doyusha. Part of their "Nostalgic Heroes" series, Unfortunately, the best thing about this kit is the box art (and there is even a problem with that!). The box art first of all identifies this car as a 1964 GTO (we were 'way ahead of our time with this car!), while in reality it appears to be a 1971 model. After inspecting the front grille area, this car appears to be a 1971 as the grilles were mounted nearly flush in 1971, while they were decidedly recessed for 1972. The upper left corner of the box has an Indian chief with the letters "GTO" above his head nearly encircled by a band with the letters "USA" on it. And very prominent on the cover is what appears to be a white 1971 GTO Judge with the green stripes on it along with "Judge" emblems properly placed on the front fenders. Curiously, the stripes disappear on the box sides on the display model.

Body: The hood is molded shut, and the kit includes some chrome outside rear view mirrors (with separate chrome faces, no less!), and a Judge-style rear wing. The headlights are molded in chrome rather than clear. There are no tail lights as they are molded to the rear bumper. My original feeling was that this kit was 1/24th scale, but upon comparison to a 1972 MPC GTO kit, it appears to be closer to 1/25th scale. The body proportions are not bad with the exception of the front window, which appears to have

just a bit too much curvature than appears correct.

Interior: Might as well be non-existent! In their zeal to motivate this kit, they have shrunken the legroom (literally!) to something like 3/8"! Talk about a definite lack of legroom!

Engine: Non-existent. If you want to talk motor (as in electric!),

well you do get one 'o those!

Chassis: Non-existent. The fact that this kit is motorized should tell

you what to expect for a chassis.

The wheels & tires are again marginal. The wheels appear to be Pontiac Rally II's with open slots and, it appears, a "PMD" engraved on the center cap. The tires are wide Goodyear Rally GT's (with blank sidewalls on one side).

Decal sheet: If you bought this kit for the Judge stripes as shown on the box art (as I did!), then I've got some bad news for you-there are no decals at all in this kit! Seems to me that constitutes fraud (even though the build-up on the side of the box has no decals either).

The glass is one piece, lightly tinted, and scratch-free.

The instruction sheet is pretty much useless, this being a Japanese kit. It is one small sheet with very simplified steps (suits the kit well!), with minimal English translations that are short and to the point. There also appears to be a color chart of sorts in the lower right corner but, there again, this is an educated guess on my part as my Japanese is real rough!

In summation, what do we have here? A kit with an electric motor which means a seriously compromised chassis (as well as the interior in this case!), no decals, and they couldn't even get the box art right! Anyone buying this kit (like me!) has to be a diehard GTO fan, as this thing will take some serious work to become a passable GTO. Review sample bought by yours truly with his own hard-earned money.

Sneakin' a Peek!

This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes!

* '65 Shelby GT-350R (Monogram #2969): Molded in White(!)....nice racing 5-spoke mags....correct blank-off panels in C-pillar....correct interior without rear seat (actually covered)....gauge panel mounting to dash....roll cage w/integral fire extinguisher....headers w/chrome exhaust dumps....proper racing Shelby front pan....seemingly correct air cleaner and monte carlo bar included....rear window properly contoured....'Cobra' valve covers, Shelby twin blue racing stripes.... overall, looks like a job well done, Monogram!

Martin GTX (Revell #7365): Molded in White(!)....reissue of * Sox & earlier GTX....proper 'Keystone' mags....console properly missing, 'Hurst' shifter and tach in place....complete exhaust system included though not referred to in instructions....hood scoop....decals include blue stripes, sponsor decals, window markings, 'Ronnie signature...excellent box art combining real car (on sides) and nice

drawing (on top).

* '55 Ford Pickup(Monogram #2971): Molded in Red....chrome 5-spoke mags mounting big 'n little Michelin rubber (in its' own little bag!)....5 liter fuel-injected V8 w/Cobra valve covers....Boyds-style steering wheel....dual exhausts w/catalytic converters!....clear gauge cover w/decal...nice scallop decals along with Illinois VENOM & Idaho E Z 4 ME plates.

* "My First Model" Ferrari Testarossa (Revell #6357): Molded in chrome Red....nice Ferrari 5-spoke wheels....nice engraving....separate drop-in door panels....good parts count....1piece body w/wipers, hood, and deck molded to it....very easy to read instructions....heretofore plastic wheels molded in rubber....stickers

for prancing horses, Illinois Ferrari plate.

Le Sabertooth 5000 (Lindberg #72412): Molded in Red....again, consistent in 1/20th scale....'Pro Bedrock' w/w/scoop protruding from 'hood'....genuine 'dinosaurskin' seats....custom 'bone' equipped with a radio (picks up, what else-Rock and Roll)....also includes paint and detail brush.

The Flintmobile

(Lindberg #72411; 1/20th scale; 22 pieces; molded in Bedrock Gray); Bonus; Three Acrylic paint pots (Tan, Brown & Brown) plus a chinese paint brush and two stick-on Bedrock license tags, printed in Stone-age Blue with Prehistoric Yellow lettering, 'YABADO' & YABADO 1'.

The first thing I noticed about this kit is that it's the movie car, rather than the cartoon car. The cartoon car had much larger wheels and the dash was closer to the front. I assume the movie folks had to make room for humans. Also, most of the time, Fred drove a 2-seater. AMT made a 1/25th scale Flintstone car but I can't remember whether or not it was a 2 or 4seater.

The second thing I noticed was the placement of the ejector pin marks. There are over 80 of them on the entire kit. Only a few will show upon assembly and they are so light that they can hardly be noticed. None exist on the smooth part of the top. I looked very hard for flash, but it doesn't seem to exist on this kit. The mold lines are very light and easily removed. To me this indicates very good planning and quality from Lindberg.

This is a snap kit and it goes together quickly and easily. The two log sides are two pieces and make up the body(?) and top supports. The wheels are 4-piece "Goodrocks" (I would have expected Firestones!). The front and rear wheels, 2 log crossmembers, toe board and the genuine Dinoskin top must be positioned on the passenger side of the body, then the driver's side snaps on and the front and rear seats hold the whole thing together. This assembly may be difficult for anyone with only two hands. All that's left is to pop in the dash and slide the steering wheel through the hole.

After the kit is assembled, it appears to be correctly proportioned compared to the movie car. The engraving is crisp and the dash is accented with a radio and two gauges or controls of some sort. The assembly is quick and simple. I only got two loud 'snaps' and it seemed that more force was necessary to snap the remainder of the connections together.

The instruction sheet is good. The parts are identified by name and number. The paint colors are indicated by a chart on the back page. I believe that this could have been done differently and should include a bit more explanation. Especially considering the fact that this kit could conceivably be the first model kit for many young Flintstones fans this summer.

I unsnapped and glued the wheels and sides together and filled all the seams. After a bit of sanding, I airbrushed the 'stone' parts with Flo-Quil Cement then a shade with Grimy Black and then a wash with Testor's Flat Black. For the 'wood' parts, I mixed Flo-Quil Roof Brown, Daylight Orange, and Reefer White until I came up with a color close to the box art. After spraying that, I gave all the wood a wash with Grumbacher Burnt Sienna artist water color. This really made the plastic look like wood. For the roof, I cut an index card with pinking shears, using it as a mask to paint a green triangle pattern. This was followed by a shot of Dullcoat on everything, and I glued the whole thing together.

My overall impression of the kit? It's cool! And very well done. I still don't like 1/20th scale But I will get the "Le Sabertooth 5000". Thanks to Lindberg for the review sample.

on their purchases.





ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING THE NATIONAL MODEL CAR BUILDER'S MUSEUM

The announcement that the GSL International Model Car Championship is ending its fifteen year run has generated some questions concerning the future of the National Model Car Builders' Museum. While those questions are understandable, there is no reason for concern.

The closure of the GSL tradition will permit a more vigorous pursuit of the viability and expansion of the Museum. It is essential that the Museum survive as the place where the events, people, models and memorabilia of our hobby can survive for future generations. Museum Trustees (Mike Barlow, Mark Benton, Bill Helm and Richard Howell), headed by Museum founder Mark S. Gustavson, meet monthly to discuss the plan activities for the Museum. Those meetings will increase in the future.

Significant efforts are underway to secure tax-deductible status with the IRS (so that donors can deduct the value of their contributions). Moreover, the Museum will commence publishing a quarterly newsletter by the third quarter of 1994 which will pass along details of current displays, plans for the future, particular needs of the Museum and other related information. That newsletter will be available by subscription, and it will be sent free of charge to all groups and individuals who contribute a minimum financial donation each year (all donors are already noted on plaques hanging on the walls of the Museum). Also, all media will receive a courtesy copy of that publication. Moreover, the Museum will shortly start to sell items to raise money: the old Putty Thrower ARDUN engine kits (SASE for information), a 20 slide set, and a 30 minute (VHS) video. Other products are on the horizon and will be announced in the future. Furthermore, Mark S. Gustavson will be traveling to key shows and events around the country to display key historical models that are on display in the Museum.

For those who want to see the Museum first hand, tours are always available with advance notice (admission donation -- minimum, \$5.00 -- is charged). In sum, the Museum is healthy, its support is vigorous, and it will survive.
