



January 21st (Room Q305 & 307) February 18th March 18th April 22nd (Room Q305 & 307) May 20th June 17th







Although I am a fan of Boyd Coddington's vehicles, I bought this kit mostly to satisfy my curiosity. I wanted to see just how good (or bad) a six dollar kit could be.

This is a simplified kit, as the name implies, but surprisingly builds into a nice display model. Not counting the paint-drying time, it can be assembled in one to two hours. It has no engine or interior, so this may be the first "slammer" kit in the modern era of car modeling.

The body consists of ten pieces, molded in yellow. I gave the body a couple of light coats of Testor's Aluma Coupe Pearl Yellow (what else?) even though the yellow plastic had a nice, high gloss sheen for the younger builders. Chromed front and rear grilles are added to the assembled body along with four dark-tinted windows, which mount from the outside. Mirrors (with no chrome faces provided) are installed in addition to the two headlight buckets. Chrome "lenses" are provided and also dark-tinted lenses are

found on the "glass" tree but are not mentioned on the instruction sheet. For realism, I installed a couple of lenses from the old parts box, after applying Bare Metal foil to the inside of the light buckets. (Your number of spare, clear headlight lenses is directly proportional to the depth and

color of your carpeting).

Beautifully chromed suspension components assemble and mount in locator holes in the outside of the body. The one-off Goodyear tires with unique tread design on the real car are accurately duplicated in the kit. They mount on fantastic copies of the Boyd wheels along with four separate disc brakes with calipers. These wheels and tires really "make" this model and will surely be found on many other models.

Vinyl stickers represent the tail light and two thin black "openings" for the body vents. I substituted a strip of chrome foil painted with some

Tamiya clear red for the sticker.

Like most modelers, I had my doubts for a long time about these six dollar kits since they were announced over two years ago. But I think Testors has really hit on a neat idea here. These kits are simple enough for any youngster to assemble, resulting in a nice representation of a real car from the magazines instead of some neon plastic cartoon. At the same time, adult modelers can take a welcome break from scratchbuilding glove box door hinges and assemble a fun project that looks decent on their display shelf. There will probably be at least one "name" builder who will open the doors, hood, trunk, scratchbuild the chassis and interior, install a Mitsosucky engine and head off to Chicago. Regardless of age or building skills, the end result is an accurate display model of a famous car.

Buy one for your kid. Buy one for yourself. Hey, for six bucks, treat

it as an aftermarket wheel kit!

'53 Ford F-100 Pick-up



[AMT #6487: 1/25th scale: 200+ parts; Gray (Yes!), chrome (nice and bagged), clear (not bagged, minor scuffs), vinyl tires)

This kit is another welcome re-issue. While comparing it to kit #6606, which is vintage '85 (no tilt front end kit on my shelves), I see the following differences: The old kit is molded in blue, the slicks are gone as is the metal hood hinge clip (but not the firewall notch), five spoke mags replaced with chrome reverse with baby moons, decal sheet smaller and completely redone, six page instruction booklet replaced with a confusing, more cluttered one pager.

The latest version features stock, custom, and service (no slicks-no drag) versions with multiple(!!) options. It still has the stock flathead and custom Desoto engines as well. The multiple options include exhaust, tires, wheels, bumpers, grilles, rear fenders (Chevy), customizing pieces,

welding rig and tools.

The stock flathead consists of 18 pieces and is nicely detailed. The Desoto consists of 30 pieces and is the '50's Firedome Hemi with either eight two-barrels w/air cleaners or eight injectors (wonder if the service version gets the injectors?). Still no bottom radiator hose on either engine.

The wheel and tire combo consist of 30 pieces. The spare is a "treaded" Firestone. Tires are four Goodyear polyglas or five Firestone Supremes.

The chassis consists of 24+ (more depending on options) pieces. Front suspension is leaf spring and straight axle, rear is leaf spring with


optional space to jack it up. Exhaust options are stock single, duals with scavengers (just what I need for my '53 Merc high school re-creation!) or lakes pipes. As for the frame, the desired-to-be pieces separate pieces are not molded in.

The interior and cab are 13 minimum (plus options, options...) pieces. Dash detail is decent, along with bench seat, and separate brake and clutch pedal. The instruction sheet shows how to mount the rear view mirror backwards. The bed is 6+ pieces (again, even MORE options), with movable tail gate.

The decal sheet has "Loss Arc Welding" on it (gone are the drag and pinstripes), three sets of license plates (no comment-I am spoiled by photoetch), and some mild gray and black graphics. The sheet exhibits good registration.

As for the instruction sheet-All parts are numbered and named, but painting suggestions are missing. The sheet states that it is a reproduction of the 1963 version. The first side (engines, tires, basic chassis) is clear and not overloaded. The other side gave me a 1960-style building flashback, if its in the kit, it must go on the model. There are WAY too many options to even attempt this as a lark: two sets of bumpers, three different grilles, and more add-on doodads that surface to attach. If you can't tell by now, I really prefer the 1985 instruction sheet and think it would be MUCH less confusing to a new model builder.

Overall, I really like this kit. Flash and injection marks are minimal. Looking back at some of the kits I have built the last few years, I regret not having built several versions of this pick-up. I will certainly remedy that situation with this re-issue!
