





This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order)

* Batmobile (Revell #6720, 1/25th scale, skill level 2): Molded in "Nightwatch (lusterless) Black"....chrome engine inserts (curbside)....basic body consists of 13 pieces, with several seams to attend to...3 "power plant" inserts install beneath open body work....gauge pod w/decal...basic front suspension....big & bigger tires (for Gotham's hot roddin' crimebuster!)....optional open or

closed upright rear fin and canopy...."Bat-decals" for wheel centers....lightly tinted clear parts.

* Batwing (Revell #6721, 1/32nd scale, skill level 2): Molded in "Nightwatch (lusterless) Black"....basic body is 10 pieces, with seams....several more inserts to install beneath open body work....instrument panel without decals....lightly tinted canopy....display base w/"Batman Forever" decal logo.

* Batboat (REvell #6722, 1/25th scale, skill level 2): Molded in "Nightwatch (lusterless) Black"....more inserts to install beneath open body work...instrument panel without decals....lightly tinted

canopy....display base w/"Batman Forever" decal logo.

* M.A.S.H. 4077th Medical Scene (Revell #4820, 1/35th scale, skill level 2): Molded in Olive Drab....diorama base w/roadbed, shoulders, and truck tire tracks....figures of Col. Klinger, Col. Potter, B.J., and patient included....acetate included for truck windows (template in instructions)....7 rubber tires.

* Harley-Davidson Springer Softail (Revell #7303, 1/8th scale Snaptite, skill level 2): Molded in red, gray, black, and chrome....nice decals include speedometer face, H-D tank logos & stripes, marker lights, and IL plate...rubber tires in two sizes....H-D stand for completed model....complete, step-by-step instructions w/painting suggestions, parts ID'ed by name.

(Note: In all cases with the Bat-vehicles above, the instructions all suggest a flat black wash for the chrome parts which install beneath the open body work for a more realistic appearance-thanks for the tip, Revell!)

Harley-Davidson Heritage Softail Classic

(Revell Snaptite 1/8th scale; 69 pieces; Black, Metallic gray, chrome, clear, clear red, clear amber, solid vinyl tires)

About a year ago, when this kit was first announced, I assumed that an 1/8th scale Harley snap kit for \$20 couldn't be much. But all of the model publications have hyped it as a highly-detailed kit, so I happily plunked down \$23 for this anxiously-awaited replica of the Great American Freedom Machine. I soon found that my assumption from a year ago was correct.

The large beautiful box contains a collection of inaccuracies, omissions, inconsistencies, and cost-cutting short cuts that render the kit almost useless. If it were built straight from the box, a very toy-like representation of a Harley would be the result. A great amount of time and aftermarket dollars are needed to turn this into a detailed model.

The first thing noticed upon inspecting the kit was the blatant inconsistencies. One chrome tree was bagged, the other is not. The clear red parts are in a bag, but the clear lenses, windscreen, and clear amber parts are not. The quality of the chrome ranges from beautiful to flaky chrome-plated dust particles-all on the same tree. Almost every part on the metallic gray trees should be chromed, but obviously, they are not. In fact, some of the gray plastic pieces are the opposing halves of the chrome-plated parts!

Most of the major components in the kit are molded as complete assemblies in two halves. This produces a major seam down the middle of almost everything on the model. This problem can be fixed, of course on paintable assemblies, but what about the chrome ones?

The solid vinyl tires have nicely-detailed tread and sidewall detail, but are molded crooked and are drastically sloped "downhill" across the tread. In other words, one sidewall has a much larger diameter than the other one. But that is OK because the model is meant to be displayed hovering in the air over the plastic display stand provided. Ya see, the kick stand is simply engraved in the up position on the frame so you can't stand the model up after you build it.

No wiring or cables of any kind are provided. Some of the chromed trim pieces on the real motorcycle are represented as silver-gray decals,

almost as if an afterthought.

DO NOT let the box art fool you. To turn this into a reasonably accurate model, you would have to send two large plastic trees to an aftermarket chrome service, obtain several types of 1/8th scale cables, and do a lot of scratchbuilding, molding, and sanding. You would then still be left with the weird tires.

Revell would have been better off producing an accurate, detailed glue kit in the \$45 range. They may have sold fewer kits, but at least they could be built. As is, this kit is a great disappointment.
