Sneakin' a Peek!

This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order)

- '63 Ford Galaxie 500 XL (AMT #6003):Molded in Lt. Gray....really great having old box art back! (Ed. Note: upon arrival of this kit at my house, my son had to closely examine the box to figure out what type of model it was!)....chrome parts consist of 1 1/2 trees!....clear headlights for custom trim option....clear red tail lights w/separate chrome trim for centers....metal axles and hood hinge clip....some flash present, but amazingly minimal....(4) Firestone 'skinnies' w/stock hubcaps or chrome reverse wheels....accessories included-telephone, record player, TV, trophy, bongos, fire extinguisher, jackstand and disc brake.....disclaimer on bottom of box noting absence of putty, sandpaper, and upholstery.
- '64 Mercury Marauder (AMT #6022): Molded in Lt. Gray....again, really great to have old box art back!....nice chrome w/stock wheel covers and custom wheels w/separate knockoffs!....clear tree includes clear custom lenses and a clear bar grille for the rear end....clear red tail lights....(4) Firestone 'skinnies'....metal axles, screws, and hood hinge clip....NASCAR option including roll cage, window straps, hood hold-down straps, and open wheels....accessories included-record player, fire extinguisher, trophy, scissors jack, brake & backing plate, telephone ad surfboard!
- Chevy ZR2 pickup (Lindberg #72587, 1/20th scale): Molded in mint green....5-spoke aluminum wheels and custom 7-spoke aluminum wheels....Firestone off road tires....excellent Vortec V-6 (including upper & lower radiator hoses) with no less than 17(!) underhood decals between engine and inner fenders/header panel....ZR1-style rear rolled pan w/red tail lights along with custom fillers for stock tail lights....separate fender flairs....posable wheels....decals include "CHEVROLET" tail gate band, "ZR2 4X4", "S10 ZR2" plates, S10 markings, and Chevrolet bowties.
- '50 Chevy 3100 Snapfast Plus (AMT #6665): Molded in Schoolbus Yellow....incredibly well-packaged!....(4) Firestone 'skinnies'....steel rims w/trim rings molded in and separate, chrome dog dish hubcaps....chrome grille, bumper, and headlights...."3100" decals, '50-CHEVY' TN plate, yellow scallops.
- #16 "Family Channel" T-Bird (Monogram #2465): Molded in white (!)....beautiful, new T-Bird body w/roof flaps....rims are finally molded in body color (white)!....molded plug wires similar to the Lumina, very nice new air cleaner, valve covers, and headers just to name a few new parts on the engine....nice, new roll cage and dashboard....new radiator w/electric fan....molded upper & lower engine hosesand olil cooler lines....rear spolier molded to body ala the Monte Carlo...passenger's side window, 1/4 windows, and driver's side NACA duct present (roof rail molded to rear window)....roof

cam included....<u>very</u> colorful decals including wheel hub spiders, wheel decals, screened-in grille openings, and driver's seat belt(!)....*Thanks, Monogram!*

1967 Camaro Z28

(AMT/ERTL #6638; 1/25th; 103 pieces; 2 versions; Lt. Gray, clear, chrome, 6 vinyl tires)

In September, 1966, the first Camaro was introduced to the public and like the Ford Mustang that created the market, the Camaro became legendary. The Camaro could be ordered with any available engine, including the 396 as of December, 1966. From the introduction date, a separate Camaro called the "SS350" could be ordered which delivered a new small block engine measuring 350 cubic inches and rated at 295 horsepower. The new 350 engine was a Camaro exclusive in 1967 and from this humble beginning, it has gone on to power almost everything on



the highway or race track. The Camaro order sheet listed 81 factory options and an additional 41 dealer-installed accessories. One of the quietly promoted options was listed as code Z-28 which provided a 302 cubic inch engine (a

combination of a 327 block with a 283 crankshaft), no external badging or engine identification, and the now-famous twin "bandaid" stripes on the hood and trunk, although it could also be ordered as a "stripe-delete" car. A total of only 602 1967 Z28's were produced (not actually called Z28's then) and as of this year, 115 are still known to exist.

Exactly 28 years after the real car's introduction, a model kit of the 1967 Z28 has arrived. This is a modified reissue of the 1968 Z28 kit first issued in 1982 by Matchbox/AMT. For those wanting to build a street machine version, the optional parts are graciously provided in this kit which is a welcome return to an old tradition instead of "wait 6 months, give 'em one extra tree and get 10 more bucks!" second kit!

Body: Including "glass" and chrome pieces, the body consists of 13 parts. The body is accurately proportioned and has small amounts of flash; it is, after all, a thirteen-year old mold. AMT did an excellent job in backdating the '68 body to '67 specs. The side marker lights are correctly eliminated. The gas cap on the rear panel has been correctly re-engraved. The vent windows are separate pieces on the "glass" tree which are added to the painted and finished body. The lower-case, block letter "camaro" scripts on the fenders are very small. They are small on the real car and when scaled down properly, they almost disappear. AMT did not take the easy way out by using the '68 tail lights. The new '67 tail lights are very accurately engraved but present a real challenge to correctly detail paint them. Again, this is not AMT's fault, it is simply the result of reducing the real item 25 times. The chrome trim moldings along the lower body is an accurate '67 trim option included in the "RS" package but also available on any '67 Camaro as a trim option. On the model, this area can be foiled from the upper curved molding to the lower straight molding just under the door line leaving the very bottom of the rocker panel body colored. OR....sand off the upper curved molding and only chrome the straight single bar under the door for standard trim. (Remember, there were 81 factory options!). If you go with the first RS-style chrome option, foil the wheelwell molding. For the second "single bar" chrome option, do not chrome the wheelwells. Confused yet? For the first time in model kit history, the long-awaited

standard '67 grille has been tooled. Once it is detail painted, it really comes to life, and looks correct if you can live with the chromed, promo-style headlights (if you can't, drill them out and use the clear lenses from a Revell '69 Camaro kit.). The engravers missed the mark on the emblem in the center of the grille. It appears too wide and also stands about two scale inches off of the grille bars. Prior to painting the grille, the emblem could be carefully carved away and replaced with a small, thin sheet plastic piece glued directly to the grille bar surface (or wait for the photoetched detail sets that I am sure will be forthcoming). The eggcrate grille should be painted flat black while the concave surround is flat metallic dark gray. Polly-S "Graphite" works perfectly in this application. Chromed bumpers, outside mirror, and one-piece front and rear glass with runners complete the body.

Chassis: Consisting of 14 pieces (excluding wheels), the chassis is fairly accurate and well-detailed considering the kits origin. The separate exhaust system has mufflers that are just too small to look realistic. The simplified front suspension includes separate spindles and a tie rod. The rear suspension is built using the axle with integral single-leaf springs, two shocks, and a traction bar. This puny little single-leaf suspension is correct for '67 Camaros and in the real world, a normal trip in your Camaro was just one long burnout. The tires in the kit are the AMT Firestone Wide Oval thin-lines now found in every ERTL kit. Brand new '67 rally wheels have been tooled for this kit and I applaud AMT for not reissuing the '68 versions. These new wheels are beautiful (ya payin' attention, Irv?).

Engine: Not counting the optional street machine parts, the stock engine consists of 20 pieces. Then, in addition, three air cleaners are provided. The chromed open element air cleaner is correct for the factory Z-28. A cowl induction air cleaner is provided for a Trans Am racing version. A standard, single-snorkel air cleaner instantly turns the engine into a factory 327 because in model form, this engine can be a 302, 327, or 350 with the correct decals. All of the engine parts are nicely detailed but the Chevrolet script valve covers should be chromed for the street Z28 version. These are molded in gray plastic but could be carefully "chromed" using Bare Metal foil. For a 327 or 350 they can be painted engine orange. Separate firewall, wiper motor, master cylinder, battery, radiator, and shroud are provided. No front fender braces are provided but they could easily be made from plastic rod or stolen from a Revell kit.

Interior: In a word, the interior is disappointing (that's 4 words, Lyle). An attempt was made to represent the upscale Custom Deluxe interior, but that attempt fell short. The two-piece bucket seats are very wide and are just 'way off base in overall shape. The seat patterns are almost correct but are missing the engraved strip that surrounds the seat inserts. The door/side panels, which are fairly intricate assemblies on the real car, are represented in the kit as very shallow engravings on the interior bucket sides. A strange attempt was made to depict the 3-gauge rectangular unit on the console by engraving 3 lumps with no rectangle at all. The dash is correctly, but lightly engraved. The steering wheel is accurate and nicely done. No rear view mirror is provided. Perhaps the team of Woddington-Powers will have to provide a resin solution to this poor interior problem!

<u>Decals:</u> "Band Aid" stripes in black and white, some street machine custom stripes for the fenders, a radiator fan shroud decal, and a "302" air cleaner decal in totally incorrect colors (Use a "302" decal from a Fred Cady sheet).

Instruction sheet: A modified reprint of the '68 Camaro sheet, it now provides step by step assembly instructions. Exterior and interior color listings are not included as with other recent AMT offerings, but then again, black words on white paper doesn't really provide much help with factory colors anyway!

With the exception of the interior, this is a very well done reissue and AMT did their homework to provide accurate '67 details. The replica stock conversion possibilities are almost limitless with kit bashing and aftermarket parts. Rumor has it that a complete photoetched detail set is forthcoming for this kit (I'm

starting the rumor right here!). The Modelhaus lists two RS hidden headlight grilles (SS and SS350). A stock SS hood and unique Yenko hood will be available from Scale Resin Detailers (Tim doesn't know that yet-I haven't given him the masters!). I believe that Replicas & Miniatures Company of MD has the resin '67 dog dish wheels and caps. A Dana, Nickey, or Baldwin car can be modeled by using SS parts and the 427 from the Revell kit with different carb set-ups. Who knows what else may be available soon? (Guess we all know what Lyle will be doin' for the next few years, eh?)

Anyway, if you're into Camaros or musclecars in general, overall this is a darn nice kit. Buy several if you get to the hobby shop before I do!



Lyle "I still wish I had my '67" Willits

1973 SD455 Trans Am Firebird

(AMT/ERTL #7301DO)

This is the latest offering in their 1/18th scale "American Muscle" diecast series. The window box has a "capsule history" of this significant low-production hot rod (only 252 built). The car comes in two "flavors"-Cameo white/blue graphics and Buccaneer Red/orange graphics and features opening doors and hood. The now (in)famous "screaming chicken" decal is prominent on the hood. It is equipped with the correct honeycomb wheels and 60-series Firestone wide oval tires. The car features a personalized "WINGS" Michigan plate. I love AMT/ERTL's sense of humor!

Headlight lenses are clear, with clear amber parking light lenses, and clear red tail light lenses. The tail light lenses also include the very thin chrome trim which separated them into 2 sections. Side marker lights are painted.

The chassis has the correct dual exhaust system, complete with transverse muffler. Chrome tail pipe tips make up the remainder of the system. The front wheels are steerable. The rear shocks are missing, and there are a few screw heads present, but overall, a nice job.

The interior is the higher line custom interior, done in black. The car is equipped with a four-speed, and the seat backs fold down. The dash features the engine-turned applique around the gauges, which are color reproductions. It also includes the 3-spoke Formula steering wheel.

All in all, a very nice replica for what I would expect the asking price to be about 25 bucks. Thanks to <u>AMT/ERTL</u> for the review sample.
