



### '98 MEETING SCHEDULE

From the Baltimore Beltway (RT 695): Take Exit 7, Route 295 (Baltimore-Washington Parkway) south towards Washington approx. 18 miles to Route 193 (Greenbelt Road), and exit. When on the off-ramp, stay to the right and merge right onto Southway (see below).

From the Washington Beltway (RT 495): Take Exit 22 north, towards Baltimore. Stay in the right lane and take the first exit onto Route 193 (Greenbelt Road). When on the off-ramp, bear to the right and take Greenbelt road west, towards College Park. Stay in the right lane and immediately after passing over the Parkway, make a right (at the light) onto Southway (see below).

Once on Southway: Go straight to the second (2nd) STOP sign. Make a left onto Crescent road. Go to STOP sign and make a right into the parking lot behind the Greenbelt Library. Once in parking lot, look to right. The large, white building is the Greenbelt Community Center. Enter building using doors near fenced tot lot. The multi-purpose room is on the second floor. There is an elevator to the left of the entrance.

#### 'A FIRST LOOK'

### 1953 Ford Crestline Victoria 2-door hardtop

(Lindberg #72172); New release; 1/25th scale; List price; \$15.00

This kit is molded in white, with separate chrome, clear, and clear red sprues. The sprues, with the exception of the chrome, are individually bagged. I would suggest that it is more important to protect the chrome from abrasion instead of the white plastic parts. Also included are 'no-name' tires with whitewall inserts.

has the look of recent Lindberg comment regarding the part repeatedly that the castings look that they are not as crisp and finemanufacturers' offerings. That pretty good.

is made up of twenty-seven one of the most detailed engines and detail paint. There is nothing

else to add, unless you wish to upgrade the engine with some performance pieces. I'm sure that *Norm Veber* (a.k.a. Replicas & Miniatures Company of MD), will be checking this out to see exactly how well his *flathead* pieces will fit. The car depicted has an automatic transmission.

The *engine compartment* includes separate inner fenders. The two-piece, separate heater blower is nicely done.

The *chassis* is comprised of nineteen pieces. Although the castings appear a little heavy, it appears that it should build up nicely. There is no detail on the wheel backs as the kit includes wheel retainers to allow them to roll. This will disappoint the superdetailers out there.

The *interior* is platform-style (*thank you, Lindberg*), with separate side panels. I would have preferred to see separate, chromed interior door and window handles. There are no ejector pin marks in the carpeted floor. Total parts count is ten. The dashboard is nicely, although faintly engraved. Decals are provided.

The *body* appears to be well proportioned to me. I especially like the fuel filler detail, although it will be obscured when the license plate door is added. The molded on emblems are very faint, but this would appear to be in scale. Lindberg has included decals for the emblems as well.

The body includes separate, chromed door handles, hood ornament, and side spears. The nice touch is the casting of the side chrome with the sprue attachment points on the underside of the part. This will make these areas much less noticeable when installed. I think Lindberg should be applauded for this well thought out decision. I wish other members of the "Little Three" would take think like this into consideration when designing molds.

Other features are nicely done *dual exterior mirrors* and *spotlights*. Especially welcome are the interior handles for the spotlights (*nice touch, Lindberg!*). If you look very closely at the box art, you may see a *continental kit* peeking over the trunk. This is included in the kit. I cannot recall having seen this type before. The Continental kit is a non-functional (meaning no tire inside) add-on which does not require a rear bumper extension.

I'm very pleased with this kit as a whole. I can't wait to see what comes from the aftermarket manufacturers in response (Hey, where's the photoetch?!).

## AFTERMARKET REVIEW

Modelhaus: 1959 Dodge convertible; \$77.00 with open hood, convertible boot, and optional Dodge D-500 engine with transmission (\$5.00)

This kit accurately depicts the *Dodge Custom Royal Lancer convertible (Ed. Note: Say that three times fast!)* 

Included are the body, hood, convertible boot, chassis assembly, wheels, wheel backs, tires, and a tub-style interior with separate dash and steering wheel. The windshield is vacuformed clear plastic. There is also a firewall and radiator plate. The chrome pieces include front and rear bumpers and separate tail lights with clear red inserts.

This resin kit is available with either a convertible boot or an uptop. Also available is a promo style kit (boot or uptop), with the hood molded closed and an engine plate molded to the chassis. The prices do vary some between options and kits, so check the latest catalog.

My kit was cleanly molded with no pinholes. I did have to do some additional cleanup of mold lines left over from the original promo. The hoods required sanding to sit flush in the opening. Be careful to check the fit of the front grille before making any modifications to the hood or opening. The promo this kit was mastered from does exhibit some gap in the fit there, which is more pronounced when the hood is removed. There is less rigidity at the front of the fenders, so some warping and bowing may be evident.

The standard Johan-style front suspension torsion bars in my kit were cast so far off register (the halves don't match), that I elected to make my own from plastic stock. No axles were provided, so these were also made from stock.

The kit includes Modelhaus T-400 tires, which are from the Revell-Monogram 1959 Cadillac kits. These tires include whitewall inserts, and are quite nice. The four-bar Lancer wheel covers are very nicely done. It is hard to believe that these Lancers look much better detail-painted, but they really stand out! It's well worth the extra effort. You will have to drill out the axle holes on the chassis, so take some extra time there to get the 'right' look (For Ron Hamilton, that of course, means lower!).

The interior is a shallow, promo-style tub. There isn't a lot to work with, but it looks OK when done. The optional D-500 twin-carb engine is standard Johan stuff, so, I don't need to beat that dog. You will have to saw off part of the top of the transmission to get everything to fit (but, it's no great loss!). I must be possessed by demons, because I actually added plug wires to my engine. It does help some.

If you like 50's cars, this is a good addition to any collection that doesn't require a lot of work.


