

'98 MEETING SCHEDULE

From the Baltimore Beltway (RT 695): Take Exit 7, Route 295 (Baltimore-Washington Parkway) south towards Washington approx. 18 miles to Route 193 (Greenbelt Road), and exit. When on the off-ramp, stay to the right and merge right onto Southway (see below).

From the Washington Beltway (RT 495): Take Exit 22 north, towards Baltimore. Stay in the right lane and take the first exit onto Route 193 (Greenbelt Road). When on the off-ramp, bear to the right and take Greenbelt road west, towards College Park. Stay in the right lane and immediately after passing over the Parkway, make a right (at the light) onto Southway (see below).

Once on Southway: Go straight to the second (2nd) STOP sign. Make a left onto Crescent road. Go to STOP sign and make a right into the parking lot behind the Greenbelt Library. Once in parking lot, look to right. The large, white building is the Greenbelt Community Center. Enter building using doors near fenced tot lot. The multi-purpose room is on the second floor. There is an elevator to the left of the entrance.

SNEAKIN' A PEEK!

This column appears as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a more detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order)

- 1962 Impala SS convertible(AMT/ERTL #8209): Molded in Lt. Gray....modified reissue of Bel Air, utilizing same 409 set-up....optional crossram manifold, air cleaners, and finned valve covers....stock hubcaps (w/separate knockoffs) and optional 5-spoke mags....platform-style interior, with bucket seats and console....2-piece exhaust system....'62 SS' OH, 'SOFTOP' WA, and 'CONVERT' GA plates (still seemingly undersized), along with a model box of the Impala SS included as decals.
- Chevrolet Monte Carlo (AMT/ERTL #8271): Molded in Lt. Gray....One of the first kits utilizing AMT's new box art....platform-style interior, w/2-piece buckets, console, w/automatic shifter, and even hydraulics for trunk (which 'advanced' modelers are instructed to cut out)....very detailed instructions on suspension set-up, with (5) different posing possibilities....very nice separate frame ala the '67 Impala....4-piece exhaust system....nice 19-piece big block....upper & lower radiator hoses, heater hoses, and A/C hoses are included, making for a nice underhood view!....clear headlight lenses....'MYMONTE' OH, 'LOW RDR' OR plates, along with a model box of the Monte Carlo and (3) Monte Carlo scripts included as decals.
- #43 "STP" Pontiac (Revell-Monogram #85-2493): Molded in white....reissue of earlier Grand Prix tool w/updated "STP" graphics (without Bobby Hamilton's name on the door!)
 - "Pennzoil" Top Fuel dragster (Revell-Monogram #85-7650): Molded in white....modified reissue of earlier top fuel dragster tool, w/updates, such as cycle-style front tires, and rear side skirts....colorful "Pennzoil" graphics.

- "Highway Scenes" '57 Nomad (Revell-Monogram #85-7801): Molded in white....reissue of the Nomad, which cannot be built stock....(4) GT Radial tires mounting Centerline-style wheels....choice of carburetion-fuel injection, 2-4 barrel tunnel ram, and 2-4 barrel crossram (not mentioned in the instructions, but present on the tree)....multi-piece cardboard gas station w/pumps....great decals include Route 66 signs. (4) sets of period license plates, a road map, and some assorted old ads.
- "Highway Scenes" '60 Corvette (Revell-Monogram #85-7802): Molded in white....reissue of the Corvette, which again cannot be built stock....(4) generic (no-name) tires mounting baby moons on chrome wheels....cardboard 'Coral Court' motel included....same excellent decals as in the '57 Nomad above.

1962 CHEVROLET IMPALA SS CONVERTIBLE

(AMT/ERTL #8209; 1/25th scale-modified reissue; 121 pieces)

It's obvious that the marketing people at AMT/ERTL have been listening to the modeling community in that they saw fit to release this kit, which is based on one of their better offerings, the 1962 Chevrolet Bel Air 2-door hardtop. In reviewing this kit, I made a comparison between this one and one of the last issues of the Bel Air. The common parts of both cars are identical in this kit, i.e., the engine, chassis, and suspension, the grille, and bumpers. The new parts in this kit consist of the new convertible body with separate rear light cove, windshield with sunvisors, and a completely redone bucket seat interior, and this will be the basis of my review.

The *engine* is the 409 V-8 with twin 4-barrel carbs from the Bel Air kit. The twenty-six piece unit builds into two versions. One stock, and the other featuring a crossram manifold, finned valve covers and velocity stacks.

The *wheels and tires* consist of the SS wheel covers with the spinners, which are very well done, along with AMT's old Firestone Supreme tires without whitewalls. The optional wheels are a well-done set of American Torque Thrust mags from the Bel Air kit.

The well-detailed *chassis* consists of a chassis plate with a five-piece front suspension, and a six-piece rear suspension, again, from the Bel Air kit. This chassis assembly has found a home in many a '63 or '64 Impala kit, as its detail is far superior to the ones in these respective kits.

The *interior* is an all-new bucket seat unit upgraded to Impala SS standards with restyled door panels, front and rear seats, a center console, glove compartment, Impala steering wheel, and the Impala SS dashboard with the grab bar. The shape of the front seats seems a little too boxy and short to me, otherwise, the interior is very well done.

The *body* is a faithful rendition of the Impala SS convertible, with all trim and emblems crisply molded to it. The grille, front and rear bumpers, and the hood are the same as in the Bel Air kit. The rear tail lamp cove is a separate piece, and fits within the body quite well. Unfortunately, the front bumper and grille does not fit the body as well. The convertible boot exhibits a very nice texture, and fits the body very well.

Overall, this is a good kit. If I were the person who engineered this kit, I would have included a more positive attachment point for the front grille/bumper unit, and I would have used a better grade of chrome plating, in that the kit's chrome does not stand up well to a lot of handling.

1970 MONTE CARLO LOWRIDER

(AMT/ERTL #8271; All-new tool; 1/25th scale; 115 pieces)

As a modeler who has been building for over 35 years, one of the cars I built back in 1970 was an AMT Chevy Monte Carlo. I remember building it as a street machine, using the kit's parts, and painting it with Testor's Metallic Burgundy spray paint. Over the years, I had the '72 annual kit, which I ended up giving to a friend, because it was a replica of his car. As time went by, I got caught up in the frenzy of collecting old kits, as well as resin repops, one of them being a '72 Monte Carlo, which is still proudly displayed in my built up display.

I had to wonder why AMT/ERTL would release a lowrider version to re-introduce the '70 Monte Carlo to the market before the replica stock version. I admit that the lowrider movement is hot, and the Monte Carlo is a major player in that market, but I would rather have seen the replica stock version. But, guess what? This car can be raised to stock height because I did it, and it wasn't that hard to do, either. One day, I'll tell you how, but for now, let's look at this kit.

<u>Engine</u>: A nineteen-piece newly-tooled 454 V-8, with a Turbo 400 transmission. The engine is crisply engraved, and is a good representation of that engine as installed in the Monte Carlo. It includes a quadrajet carburetor, a correct, closed air cleaner, power steering pump and air conditioner with hoses. A few aftermarket parts, and proper painting will yield a convincing, accurate replica.

Chassis: Following the lead of the '67 Impala SS427, the chassis assembly has a separate detailed frame, which attaches to the floorboard. The floorboard has the carpet and floormat engravings on the top side, and the chassis engraving on the bottom side. The suspension setup is unique in that it could be set up to be lowered, or raised all around with detailed hydraulic suspension components in chrome, along with the front suspension components. Also in the instructions, there is a method in which you can display the car in a three-wheeled stance by splitting the raised and lowered front crossmember, A-arm assembly, and hydraulic components. The trunk are is also detailed, including a battery and hydraulic cylinder set-up. Again, the superdetailers among us can add plumbing, paint, and photoetched fittings to bring it right out, and as an added bonus, the instructions suggest the trunk lid be opened up, to allow these items to be displayed. It wouldn't surprise me that these items would find their way into many a lowrider model. Completing the chassis commentary, the fuel tank is molded to the floorboard, while the dual exhaust system is separate.

The <u>wheels and tires</u> consist of an all-new set of *Goodrich "Advantage T/A" tires* in a 13" size, along with a set of McLean-style wire wheels. The builder is tasked with adding his or her own whitewalls, and a wash to bring out the wire wheels as on the box art car.

The <u>interior</u> is a knockout in the sense that the vinyl grain on the seats, dash and door panels, will come out very nicely with a coat of paint. The entire interior is properly engraved, and correctly depicts the subject matter. The optional "Cushion grip" sport steering wheel and floor console with the 'stirrup shifter' is also included. Lowrider options include a hydraulic switch panel, but curiously, no chain steering wheel or tufted throne seats. Oh well, you can kitbash these items.

The <u>body</u> is drop-dead gorgeous! AMT/ERTL has captured the shape of the Monte Carlo in the proper proportions. However, all is not perfect. The Monte Carlo script on the roof sail panel is twice the size it should be, and the headlight bezels should have been separate chrome pieces, like the original kit. Other than that, AMT has done a commendable job on this car.

As you can most likely tell, I really like this kit. I sincerely hope that the one that I am building will be finished by the time you read this. It will not be lowered, but a proper representation of the replica stock car. Maybe I'll lower the replica stock kit when it comes out later this year. Oh yeah, by the way, look at that new box art (I was just getting used to the old box!)
