SNEAKIN' A PEEK!

The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a more detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! How about this, gang? To better identify possible kit reviews, at the end of the item on the kit, the words 'Available' or 'Not Available' will appear. Obviously, any kit which is available may be reserved by a club member with a simple call to the Editor. Conversely, a kit which is 'Not Available' was either already reserved by someone, or was something new inserted by yours truly, and paid for with my hard-earned moolah! (Ed. - #26 'Cheerios' Taurus (Revell-Monogram #2553): Molded in White....reissue of excellent 'Exide' Taurus, with Cheerios graphics.
- "Dupont" Monte Carlo (Revell-Monogram #85-1702, 1/32nd Snaptite): Molded in Red....Reissue of earlier Monte Carlo, including chrome wheels...peel and stick vinyl 'Dupont' markings. (Available)
- Vette Agin (Revell-Monogram #85-2536): Molded in white...modified reissue of '53 Corvette....custom front fender vents and molded-in sidepipes....platform-style interior w/new seats, and drop-in door panels....Goodyear ZR40-series tires with 5-spoke Torque Thrust-style mags....choice of stock fuelinjected or 2 4-barrel V-8 engine. (Available)
- '66 Pontiac GTO (Revell-Monogram #85-2537): Molded in white....very nice tri-power 389 V-8....Rally I wheels w/open slots....platform-style interior, w/separate chrome console, 4-speed shifter, and wood wheel....open hood scoop....nice, crisp body molding....decals include Pontiac floor mats, black and white stripes, redlines for tires, all emblems, and (3) sets of plates.
- '57 Corvette Deluxe kit (Revell-Monogram #85-6669): Molded in Red....reissue of the '57 'Vette kit w/3 paint tubs-aluminum, satin black, and tan, along with a paintbrush, and a tube of Ambroid cement. (Available)
- 'Highway Scenes' '37 Ford w/Drive-in diorama (Revell-Monogram #85-7800): Molded in white...reissue of '37 Ford...heavy cardboard Drive-in included....again, same excellent period decals as in earlier issues. (Available)
- 'Highway Scenes' '69 Talladega w/Diner diorama (Revell-Monogram #85-7803): Molded in white....unchanged reissue of '69 Talladega....heavy cardboard Diner included....same excellent period decals as in earlier issues. (Available)
- '41 Plymouth (AMT #6184): Molded in Lt. Gray....choice of stock, flathead 6-cylinder, or a street rod V-8....choice of stock wheels, mounting on new Firestone tires, or custom wheels mounting on Goodyear GSC tires....10-piece front suspension, 5-piece rear (not counting the metal axles)....upper/lower radiator hoses.....two styles of bumpers-stock, and smooth....separate ribbed running board surface....decals consist of double white pinstripes for wheelwells, and 3 sets of (undersize) license plates-'HV721' PA, 'MY-041' DC, and '26-551' AR, all vintage. (Available)
- "Kellogg's" Monte Carlo (AMT/ERTL #6297): Molded in Lt. Gray...apparent reissue of earlier Monte Carlo, still including incorrect chrome wheels....up to date "Kellogg's" graphics, including associate sponsors. (Available)
- 'Kodak Film' Monte Carlo (AMT #6299): Molded in Lt. Gray....apparent reissue of earlier Monte Carlo, still including incorrect chrome wheels....'Kodak' graphics are at least up to date. (Available)

- 1968 El Camino SS396 (AMT #8017): Molded in Lt. Gray....nice, apparently new multi-piece fat block V-8....separate chassis w/multi-piece front and rear suspensions...5-piece separate cargo bed....molded-in vinyl roof....Chevy Rally wheels w/open slots...backing plates have some drum detail on 'em!....platform-style interior, w/console and chrome 'Horseshoe' shifter...radiator, heater, and A/C hoses present...clear headlight lenses, clear red tail light lenses...license plates (undersize)-'3 9 6' GA, '3 4441' WY, and '62 9972' IN plates (all vintage).
- '70 Monte Carlo SS454 (AMT #8060): Molded in Lt. Gray....454 big block V-8....platform-style interior, separate chassis and floorpan....Chevy Rally wheels w/open slots....dual exhausts....separate fender skirts....multi-piece front and rear suspensions....(3) sets of license plates-'70 SS' OH, 'SSMC' OR, and '70 STOCK' CO (vintage, still somewhat undersize).
- Hard Hat Hauler (AMT #8248): Molded in Lt. Gray....triple-blown 426 Hemi V-8....2-piece plastic tires-"Good 'N' Rich" slicks out back, and "Fire 'N Brimstones" skinnies out front mount slotted mags, w/optional smooth discs....9-piece fork lift....chrome helmet 'roof' and mag wheels, despite box art car. (Available)
- 1957 Bel Air (AMT =8315): Molded in Lt. Gray....(5) Wide Whitewall tires, one mounting a steel rim for the trunk, the others mounting hubcaps w/separate knockoffs...choice of carbureted or fuel injected 283....9-piece front suspension, 8-piece rear suspension....6-piece exhaust system....chassis separate from floor pan...platform-style interior....separate inner fender panels, air ducting beneath hood....opening hood and trunk, separate fender skirts....separate chrome door handles, wipers, antenna, outside mirror, bullets, scripts, and Vees....hood subassembly is 8 pieces by itself!!....clear head and parking light lenses...decals include 'Chevrolet' scripts, displacement and underhood decals, jacking instructions, and (undersize) vintage plates-'TAILFIN' WA, and 'ICON' MA. (Available)
- 1957 Chevy Bel Air 'Pro Shop' Series (AMT/ERTL #8455): Molded in White....seemingly the same kit as AMT #8315, with exception of added parts consisting of a photoetch set, chrome foil (seemingly missing in this kit), ignition wiring, and rubber heater and radiator hoses....several underhood decals, along with two sets of plates-'ULTIMATE' CA, and '57 CHEV' IND, both '57 vintage.

[Note to all concerned]: It has been brought to my attention of late that there is a potential problem with regard to the review articles published in this newsletter. Let me give you a little background on this subject. The model manufacturers (AMT/ERTL, Revell-Monogram, and Lindberg) all attempt to send our club current releases in exchange for our critiques on what we liked and didn't like about them. That means that we need to get written reviews published in the newsletter in a reasonable time frame to accomplish this. If you will recall, I have stood up at recent club meetings to enlist the aid of the members in attendance to get kit reviews. At present, Ron Hamilton has done more than his fair share of reviews. In the past, Lyle Willits also did his share of reviews, as well as yer Fearless Editor. If anyone wishes to see reviews written by someone else (or take a crack at it themselves), they need to contact me, in order to determine which kits are available for review. I don't have the time to chase anyone down and browbeat them for a review. Rest assured though, if you take a review sample, I will be your worst nightmare if I don't get a review within a reasonable time (right, Leonard?). You may also rest assured that if you take a kit for a review, and do not return it within a reasonable time, that you will not receive another!]

1968 EL CAMINO SS396

(AMT/ERTL #8017; 1/25th scale; new tool; 97 pieces; Lt. Gray, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

When AMT/ERTL made the announcement that they would be releasing a new tool of the 1968 Chevrolet El Camino SS396, I was, to say the least, very excited at the prospect of building the model immediately upon its release.

First of all, when I saw the box art model depicted on AMT/ERTL's newly redesigned boxes, much like the '70 Monte Carlo, it was Ugg-Lee! I'm sorry that I cannot put my opinion any other way. The model appears to have been rushed together, and the detail painting appears sub-par. The saving grace about the box is the fact that they at least chose to use actual photos of the model.

When you open the box, you will notice AMT/ERTL's normal light gray plastic, with gray and chrome parts separately bagged. Unfortunately, the glass and tires are not.

The 20-piece *engine* is an excellent depiction of Chevrolet's 396 V-8 with a Turbo 400 automatic transmission attached. The engraving is clean, and texture is excellent. Judging from the use of the Holley 780 cfm carb, open element air cleaner, and chrome valve covers, it appears to me to be the 375 hp version of this engine. The engine includes an A/C compressor, power steering pump, and alternator with upper bracket. A few aftermarket items will bring this unit to life. The only drawbacks I have found with the engine are that the fuel pump is molded to the block, and the transmission pan will have a seam down the middle, as it is not a separate piece. Aside from these minor problems, this unit is excellent.

The wheel and tire combination is the Chevy Rallye wheel along with G70-15 Goodyear Polyglas bias-ply blackwall tires. The wheels are excellent in that all they need is a little detail paint to bring them out. The wheel back detail is excellent, due to the fact that the drum brake detail is molded in. Even though the tires are not correct, they do look good, and they beg for red a or whitewall detail. If you do not have access to a bow compass to apply this feature, see Norm Veber (Replicas & Miniatures Co. Of MD) for a set of his resin tires with the stripe of your choice.

The *interior* builds up from the floorboard with separate 2-piece bucket seats, with accurate upholstery detail, a center console with the '*stirrup*' *shifter*, a well-detailed dashboard with brake and emergency brake pedal suspended from it, the 3-spoke custom steering wheel, 2 well-engraved door/side panels, and the structural brace across the rear. The only problems I found with the interior assembly are the abundance of feed tabs on the floor, which would be easily covered with flocking, and no turn signal or tilt wheel stalks (*these could be made from plastic rod*).

The 6-piece bed assembly incorporates the rear cab panel and fuel tank. This is very good for the builder, in that it allows a good coat of paint on the floor and sides prior to assembly, for a better appearance.

There is a *separate frame assembly*, which seems to be the new standard from AMT/ERTL, and it is handled very well, as the others were. The bed assembly and interior mount positively to the chassis by way of pins and holes on both assemblies. There is a 4-piece dual exhaust system, an 11-piece rear axle assembly, and a 7-piece front suspension system. Even though the front suspension is non-posable, these assemblies are very well detailed, and go together easily with careful assembly.

The *body's* proportions seem to be right on the money, and the detail is very good. All the emblems are crisp, and in the right place. The bumpers and glass fit very well, again using holes and pins. The body features vinyl roof detail molded to it, with a very light grain detail. In my opinion, the seams seem a little thick, and need to be lowered to look accurate. A few minor foibles present on the body are as follows:

- molded in door handles
- positive locators for the door mirrors
- sink marks on roof sail panels and front fenders
- bad chrome-clear coat reaction

These items are minor, and most modelers should be able to resolve them during assembly if they so choose. *Underhood detail* consists of the heater hoses, A/C plumbing, windshield washer jar, battery, power brake booster and reservoir, and radiator hoses.

I have taken the time to compare this kit with the original '69 El Camino, and the '69 SS396 Chevelle, and can honestly say that this kit is superlative in every way. It looks very good, and I highly recommend it. By the way, I believe that my model will turn out a lot better than that box art model.

<u> 1998 CAMARO Z28/1998 FIREBIRD RAM AIR</u>

(Revell-Monogram #2538 and # 2539 respectively; Modified reissues, 90 pieces, plus decals for each car)

It has been a few years since Revell-Monogram has marketed the current year *GM Pony 'sister' cars*, the *Chevy Camaro* and the *Pontiac Firebird*, even though their competitors from Dyersville have offered kits of each car on an annual basis, until now (no 1998's from AMT/ERTL as of this writing). I decided to review the two kits together, as they share many of the same parts, much like their full-size counterparts.

The parts common to each car include the engine, chassis, and basic interior assemblies. The unique parts to these cars are the bodies *(obviously!)*, wheels, and interior parts, such as the seats, door panels, dashboards, and steering wheels.

As in past issues of these cars, there exists a very well-engraved pan chassis. However, on the real cars, the chassis is primer gray with the body color fogged on the edges where the quarter panels are painted, due to their construction process. And there are no chrome exhausts on either car, even though the Firebird has polished pipes. These kits are pretty true to their full-size counterparts, in that they are crisply engraved. and very well detailed, but there are a few problems in Paradise.

The LS-1 engine assemblies for both cars are crisply engraved, and once assembled, will yield a convincing replica, just exercise care in painting. These engines are aluminum, and with the exception of the oil pan, rocker covers, intake manifold and accessories, which are satin black, the block, heads, and transmission should be painted with a non-buffing metalizer aluminum paint with a black wash to bring out the details.

Both cars include Revell-Monogram's 16" Goodyear GS-C tires, but only the Z28 has an accurate tire and wheel combo, as the Firebird is equipped with 17" wheels and tires with the Ram Air package, therefore, the tires on the 'Bird appear a little short. The suspensions have very nicely-engraved detail, and even though the front suspension is not posable, it looks more than passable.

The interiors on both cars are well-engraved and accurate for their respective bodies.

When working with the body assemblies on both cars, you'll find that the front and rear bumpers are somewhat fiddly in their attachment.

Now, the Camaro will build into an accurate replica from the kit parts, but the Firebird is another story. There are no 'Trans Am' markings evident on this car, even though the body represents the Trans Am version. Revell-Monogram has always properly represented their Firebird models as either the Trans Am version, or the Formula version, but this model, as kitted, represents neither model properly. Does it look good? Yes, it does, but I do not care for the molded in T-top detail. I wish that they would have made the roof panels either solid or glass, in the fashion that AMT/ERTL does. For the most part, these are very nice kits, and should be good sellers. I wish that the Firebird was a Formula, then it would have been more accurate.

1966 PONTIAC GTO

(Revell-Monogram #85-2537; 114 pieces; white, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

The car is molded in white as a hardtop, rather than a coupe, as was their 1964 GTO. Consequently, you don't have a choice as to how it will be built without a lot of scratchbuilding, to add the coupe window frames (a convertible wouldn't be too hard to do, though!). The molding is very crisp, with some cleverly disguised mold lines, which may present somewhat of a challenge to get rid of. The hood scoop is molded open, as if it was a Ram Air car. However, a carburetor ram air pan is not included. The hood hinges are molded separately. The tail light cove is molded to the body, and the tail lights are specific for left and right sides. The outside door handles, windshield wipers, and driver's door mirror are separate, chrome pieces.

The interior is platform-style, meaning the interior sides are separate pieces. The console is a separate, chrome unit, with a chrome 4-speed shifter, with 'HURST' plainly legible on the shifter stalk. The car is also equipped with a wood steering wheel, which is chrome as well. Paint the rim, dull the spokes down a bit, and there you have it. The dashboard features cutouts for the gauges, which are on the decal from behind.

The chrome and mount onto a tires. Included on the decals, along with chassis is a nice including a separate



Rally I rims have open slots, nice set of Goodyear F70-15 decal sheet are both redline raised white letters. The multi-piece unit, down to and steering box and shaft.

The engine is a twenty-five piece tri-power unit. It has a separate coil, oil filter, power steering pump, starter, and chrome alternator bracket. The two-piece fan has a separate, chrome clutch.

The front and rear windows are not connected by runners, as they used to be. The front window also features nice, textured sunvisors molded to it. Also included are separate, clear head and parking light lenses, clear gauge face, vent windows, and interior dome light. Oh yeah, the tail lights are molded in clear

The decals are pretty nice. They include all of the GTO crests and scripts if the builder wishes to remove the molded on items. Also included are the redline stripes, white-letter sidewalls, a nice, thin double

pinstripe in either black or white, Pontiac floor mats, and three sets of license plates, one of these being personalized California 'TRI POWR' plates.

The gang at Revell-Monogram affirmed their support for Pontiac's GTO in their press release (including prominent sponsorship of the model contest at the GTOAA Nats in Atlanta), relating the fact that their '64 GTO was one of their best-selling kits, most likely due to the fact that it was the first of its' breed, and they fully expect this new '66 GTO to follow in its footsteps. I see no reason as to why it won't be as successful, if not moreso! My only question to the folks at Revell-Monogram is-what is next on the GTO horizon? Maybe a nice '65 hardtop, or even a convertible? Write to Ed Sexton, Revell-Monogram, 8601 Waukegan Road, Morton Grove, Illinois 60053-2211 and let 'em know exactly what you want-they listen!

It will have a half-mile track, and a 1.8 mile road course in the infield.
