(Not Available)
- #9 'Cartoon Network' Ford Taurus (Revell-Monogram #2563): Molded in white....Reissue of excellent Taurus, this time w/Cartoon Network's colorful, imaginative graphics. (Not Available)
- 'Mad Magazine' Firebird funny car (Revell-Monogram #7657): Molded in white...Reissue of excellent Firebird funny car tool, with "What-me worry?", "Spy vs. Spy", and Alfred E. Newmann graphics. (Available)
- #15 "Wrangler" Thunderbird (Revell-Monogram #3150): Molded in white....Reissue of earlier 'SquareBird' kit, with "Wrangler" graphics. (Not Available)
- #28 "Hardee's" Monte Carlo (Revell-Monogram #3153): Molded in White....Reissue of earlier notchback Monte Carlos, with "Hardee's" graphics. (Not Available)
- '57 Chevy Cameo (AMT/ERTL #63408): Molded in Lt. Gray....Modified Reissue of '55 Cameo, with corrected side windows....283 2-barrel V-8....blackwall Firestone Supreme tires....tub-style interior....2-piece exhaust....separate steering box....8-piece pickup box....window visor, separate chrome exterior emblems....'31 24' GA, '0816' GA, 'CAMEO' NV plates. (Available)
- '66 El Camino (Revell-Monogram #85-7648): Molded in White....nice fat block 396 cu. In. V-8....platform-style interior w/separate console....separate steering shaft....2-piece exhaust....heater hoses, upper/lower radiator hoses....separate chrome rocker trim, upper grille bar....separate chrome wipers, door handles, 3-piece tail lights! (chrome base, red lens, & clear lens)!....'BPL 548' MN, 'TVV 622' TX plates, emblems, gauges, wheel hubcap centers....flip-top box w/road on bottom. (Not Available)

VETTE AGIN

[Revell-Monogram #85-2536; 1/24 scale; 67 pieces; white, chrome, clear, transparent red, (4) Goodyear Eagle ZR40 directional vinyl tires]

Just a few years ago, renowned automotive artist, *Thom Taylor* designed an exciting update for the first edition of America's only two-seater. His redesign of the 1953 Corvette, christened, Vette Agin, was that of a rounded, svelte, agile, low-riding, corner-burner. This year, Revell-Monogram has rendered the Vette Agin in plastic as the second kit of a series based on Mr. Taylor's designs.

Oddly, the Vette Agin features a paint scheme that is unrelated to Mr. Taylor's design. The same is true of the first kit in this series, Thom Taylor's Alternomad. No reason for these variances has been cited. Other deviations from the original Vette Agin design include, a shortened hood, alteration of the stylized Corvette logo on the nose, lower positioning of the side vents, raised ride height, and replacement of the well-integrated, rounded air intake opening with an out-of-place angular rendition. One design alteration that actually improves on the original design is the replacement of the raised taillight pods with flush-mounted lenses. This really cleans up the look of the rear end of the car and provides front-to-rear profile symmetry missing from the original concept.

This kit is clearly based on the tooling for Monogram's 1957 Corvette (some optional and interior parts of that kit are included.) The chassis and drive train components are unchanged from the previous incarnation. New parts include the body, interior, wheels and tires. Being that this kit is based on the 1957 kit has caused some concern that the tooling for the 1957 body has been altered forever into the Vette AGIN body. That would be a shame.

Unfortunately, the body is ill proportioned. Its height is that of the bodies it was based on, however its width has been expanded considerably. Placing a Monogram 1957 Corvette body nose-to-nose with it shows that the stock vehicle's body is much narrower. The extra girth gives the Vette Agin an uncomplimentary, bloated appearance. The body may have been widened to fit over the wider tires. The Goodyear Eagle ZR40's are about twice the width of the stock 1957 kit's tires. Regardless, the expanded front end is reminiscent of some pudgy-faced cartoon characters of the 1930's. This isn't the look that the designer intended.

Even with the new interior and body, building the Vette Agin is a familiar exercise. If you've ever assembled Monogram's 1957 Corvette kit, then you know what to expect of the Vette Agin. The chassis and engine assemble just as they always have in the 1957 Corvette kit. The interior, while it looks very different, assembles in the same manner as in the previous kit. The body is simpler to assemble with fewer parts. The front and rear fascias fit well as do the flushmounted headlight and taillight lenses. The chopped windshield fits well, too, but it is lacking any form of positive locating assistance. You have to position it by eye.

Because the frame and suspension are unmodified from previous issues, the ride height is much higher than that intended for the Vette AGIN. You'll have to do some serious lowering to get this car to sit properly. Centerline's 17-inch Starfire 5-spoke wheels are nicely rendered in this kit and should be showing up on many other custom and street rod models in the near future.

#9 "CARTOON NETWORK" TAURUS

[Revell-Monogram #85-2563; 1/24th scale; 92 pieces; white, clear, vinyl tires]

Well gang, here is the latest version of the highly successful (for Revell-Monogram) Ford Taurus stock car. It is obviously based on their earlier offerings, such as the #99 "Exide Batteries" and "Cheerios" Taurus (Tauri?). Let's take a quick look-see.

The 358 cu. in. engine is pretty much unchanged from earlier versions. The nice thing here (finally!) is the decided lack of chrome. Revell-Monogram finally realized they don't need to chrome anything, that it will be properly painted by the builders, without having to be stripped first.

The *chassis* appears to also parallel earlier issues (*T-Birds?*) with what I would describe as 'outriggers'-which widen the chassis to fit the wide Taurus body. There is also a piece at the rear bumper to fill in this area as well.

The *tires* are the same as in earlier issues, with no lettering molded to the sidewalls, with the exception of the number 'D5574'. These tires mount a set of *slotted wheels* with open slots.

The **body** of the car seems to be as close to a Taurus as RM could get it at the time of production. NASCAR (and the Chevy guys!) were still tweaking it (too fast for the Chevy drivers, not fast enough for the Ford drivers!). It has the usual NASCAR-mandated roof flaps, and rails. The hood and trunk pins are molded in, and the rear spoiler is also molded to the rear deck, as are the front and rear bumpers.

The *glass* is also separate, and exhibits the requisite rails and braces molded to it, in addition to being frosted on the rear for the black paint. Both quarter windows have NACA ducts molded in. The unique shape of the rear window seems to be spot-on.

The *decals* can honestly be referred to as colorful in this issue, due to the inclusion of cartoon characters such as *Magilla Gorilla, Huckleberry Hound*, and *Top Cat*, just to name a few! The yellow Goodyear tire markings are also included, as well as driver's seat belt, and airbrushed head and parking lights, which flank the grille decal included.

The box in the newer Revell-Monogram kits are noteworthy. This one has photos of the Cartoon Network Taurus at speed on the top, while the side and end caps are reserved for photos of the built-up model. The noteworthy feature has to do with the adoption of the Lindberg-style flip top box, which has a 'blacktop' base on the bottom, suitable for a diorama.

This kit will only tend to add to Revell-Monogram's bottom line as far as stock car model builders are concerned. A sad footnote to this story was the *recent release* of *driver Lake Speed* from driving chores for this car, to be replaced by young driver *Jerry Nadeau*, who, ironically enough was himself just released from the *Elliott-Marino "Firstplus" Taurus*! Guess that's the way it goes in the tough World of Winston Cup!

<u>'71 DUSTER 340</u>

[AMT/ERTL #8437; 1/25th scale; 120 pieces plus decals; Molded in Lt. Gray]

<u>'71 DUSTER 340 STREET MACHINE</u>

[AMT/ERTL #8334; 110 pieces plus decals; Molded in Lt. Gray] [New tools]

These two kits are essentially the same, but with subtle differences in engine assemblies, wheel and tire combinations, and decals. Consequently, we will examine them simultaneously.

AMT/ERTL has done it again, in that they have released a much-wanted kit of an overlooked musclecar. In examining these kits, while not perfect, they seem to represent the subject manner in fine fashion.

In both kits, the engine of choice is Chrysler's fabulous 340 cu. in. V-8. In the stock kit, there are two separate carburetor intake systems included, one being the single 4-barrel carburetor setup, which is accurate for this car, and the optional 3x2-barrel setup, which, while not a factory option on this vehicle, is a dealer-installed option. In the Street Machine kit, a fuel injection system replaces the carburetor setup, which mimics that used on the Dodge Viper. This setup features cylinder head-mounted ignition units, separate throttle bodies, and air cleaners. I have never seen this setup on any 340 V-8, but it gives the engine a high-tech look. In both kits, the engines are well engraved and detailed. An air conditioning system (compressor and plumbing) is included in the Replica Stock version, but not the Street Machine version.

Both versions feature the same *chassis and suspension setups*. AMT/ERTL has done an excellent job with these assemblies, which feature a separate front subframe with king pins, transmission mount, simplified front suspension/lower crossmember unit which is well-engraved, and fits together very well. A separate anti-sway bar completes the unit. When detail painted, the unit looks quite good, but it lacks the operating steering that the Revell-Monogram Pro Modeler Charger has. The front subframe mounts to the chassis floorpan/lower interior floor, which is customary AMT/ERTL practice in

their latest kits. The rear axle/suspension mounts to the floorboard, and it consists of the standard 8 ³/₄ rear axle, leaf springs, shock mounts, drive shaft, and shock absorbers. The chassis assembly is completed with the addition of a 6-piece exhaust system. Again, properly painted, it looks quite good.

The *interior* builds up from the floorboard with a pair of 2-piece bucket seats, dashboard with a separate steering column and wheel, shifter, rear seat package tray, interior side panels, and steering box/shaft. On the Replica Stock version, the A/C vent unit is also included. While the interior is accurate and very well detailed, a *floor console* and *the "Tuff" steering wheel* would have been more representative of the method in which the majority of these cars were equipped. I have also seen the box art car for the Replica Stock version of this car in person, and it was equipped this way.

Upon installing the *windows* into the body, the windshield and rear window go in quite easily with locating tabs, but the side windows contain no such provision, consequently, care must be exercised in their installation. A possible solution to this dilemma could be the addition of a strip of styrene to the headliner as a locating point.

The wheel and tire combination for the Replica Stock car consist of the venerable Chrysler Rally wheels, and Goodyear Polyglas bias ply tires, which are accurate for this car. The inner wheels feature very nice drum detail. The Street Machine includes Viper GTS-style aluminum wheels and Goodyear Eagle F1 tires. They look quite good, and along with the disc brake detail will find their way onto many a 'high tech' street machine.

Upon examining the *body*, AMT/ERTL has done a credible job with this car. The body shape appears to be accurate, even though the side windows are a little "round". Once the rear quarter windows are installed, the body takes on a much better appearance. The fit of the interior and chassis unit is quite good. The bumpers feature a tab, which attaches to a slot, which aids in alignment. Curiously, the rear spoiler holes in the trunk lid are open, while the hood scoop holes are not-Go Figure! If memory serves, very few Dusters were equipped with the rear spoiler, while the *hood scoops* were only available on the "*Twister*" *version*, and not the 340 from the factory. I am quite sure that some folks did buy the scoops and install them on their vehicles, as they did enhance the image of the car.

Underhood detail consists of a clear windshield washer jar, battery, master cylinder, windshield wiper motor, and vacuum tank. The Replica Stock version also includes an *A/C compressor and hoses*.

Each version of the car has a set of *decals* to fit the cars personality. The Replica Stock version provides the *longitudinal stripe* in either *black or white*, along with *the "340 Wedge" hood decal*, which was only available in the flat black hood/upper fenders/doors treatment. The *strobe stripes* used with the hood scoops are accurate for the "*Twister*" *version* of the Duster only. The Street Machine decals consist of some nice looking *blue scallops* that if used, will restrict the color schemes available for the builder.

Overall, this is a pretty good kit. The only problems I have with the kit are the following:

- The door handles and wipers should have been separate pieces, instead of being molded to the body.
- The *spoiler holes* on the rear deck should have been *left closed*, giving the builder the option of building the car with or without the spoiler.
- A color chart should have been included in the instructions for Replica Stock builders

These are very good kits, which I heartily recommend to anyone enamored of these vehicles. With careful assembly, an exceptional model will result. I am quite sure that these kits will turn out to be very good sellers for AMT/ERTL.

- "Night-drivin' Caddy!" Seems as though Cadillac is upping the hi-tech ante. For the 2000 model year, they will be premiering an option for the redesigned DeVille called Night Vision. The device is a sensor installed behind the front grille that, according to Cadillac engineers should allow drivers to see objects up to five times farther than with low beam headlights and three times farther than with high beam headlights. It should also help drivers avoid glare from oncoming headlamps. Night Vision utilizes infrared technology, which detects the thermal energy of objects. A camera and a mirror project objects detected onto the windshield by way of a heads-up display (HUD) in the driver's peripheral field of vision. Raytheon Systems Co. and Delphi Delco Electronics Systems developed it. It could be utilized on other vehicles, but will initially be installed on the DeVille.




