A Note: This is the Fourth Saturday!

From the Baltimore Beltway (RT 695): Take Exit 7, Route 295 (Baltimore-Washington Parkway) south towards Washington approx. 18 miles to Route 193 (Greenbelt Road), and exit. When on the off-ramp, stay to the right and merge right onto Southway (see below).

From the Washington Beltway (RT 495): Take Exit 22 north, towards Baltimore. Stay in the right lane and take the first exit onto Route 193 (Greenbelt Road). When on the off-ramp, bear to the right and take Greenbelt road west, towards College Park. Stay in the right lane and immediately after passing over the Parkway, make a right (at the light) onto Southway (see below).

Once on Southway: Go straight to the second (2nd) STOP sign. Make a left onto Crescent road. Go to STOP sign and make a right into the parking lot behind the Greenbelt Library. Once in parking lot, look to right. The large, white building is the Greenbelt Community Center. Enter building using doors near fenced tot lot. The multi-purpose room is on the second floor. There is an elevator to the left of the entrance.

Gray.....all-new kit, even the instructions feel thicker!....27-piece 4.6 liter, 32-valve Ford V-8....Halibrand wheels mounted on Goodyear GS-C Eagle tires (225/45R-17 front, 335/35R-20 rear!)....beautiful multi-piece late model chassis, with IFS and rack and pinion steering, and disc brakes all around....platform-style interior, w/2-piece front bench seat, 1-piece rear seat....fuel cell and battery box for trunk....electric fan for radiator....duval windshield....optional roof....decals consist of multi-color flames for either side, dash gauge decal, and 3 plates-'32VICKIE' CA, 'PHANTOM' NJ, and a vintage 1932 GA plate. #26 "Cheerios" Taurus/#5 "Hellogg's" Monte Carlo

[Revell-Monogram #1316/#1317]

These two offerings from the gang over at Revell-Monogram share the same chassis and interior, but obviously carry different bodies, both being Superspeedway versions of the *Ford Taurus* and the *Chevrolet Monte Carlo*.

My 6-year-old son, each taking him about an hour, easily assembled both. Built in Snap-fit, and screw-together style, combined with simplified assemblies, and a low parts count (28), a good-looking shelf model is possible in a short amount of time.

Bodies/decals: Both have good proportions and the right "look" of their full-size counterpart. Engraving includes roof and cowl flaps, and hood outline. Bodies are pre-painted, with numbers and major sponsors. Contingency decals are separate, and on a nice, thin, clear self-adhesive sheet.

Chassis: Two-piece, exhibiting good detail, given its simplified construction. The exhaust system snaps to the frame and rear suspension. The front suspension is a one-piece affair, attached by two screws to the floorpan. Radiator is included, even though an engine is not.

Interior: An easy to assemble four-piece roll cage, shifter, driver's seat, steering wheel, and right and left vent hoses are included.

Wheels/Tires: Black rims with open slots, which mount onto very nicely done tampo-printed Goodyear Eagle tires. These units attach to the chassis by way of metal axles.

Glass: One piece, with strap, and vent details molded in (Note: Use a small touch of glue here, to keep the glass in

Overall, two nice offerings from the gang at Revell-Monogram models that build into good shelf models in no time at all. Look for more on this line.

<u>I 750 Edsel Pacer 2 door hardtop</u>
[AMT kit #30032HD, 1/25th 136 parts molded in gray, clear, red, and plated].

A comedy of errors, or a good idea at the wrong time? The Edsel was both, proof that what seems sound today may not be so tomorrow. "Its aim was right," said one historian, "but the target moved." Hoping to sell 100,000 of its first year '58 models, Edsel Division built only 63,110. From there it was down hill. Fewer than 45,000 were sold in '59 and only 3000 token 1960s were produced; the make was cancelled at the end of November 1959. The line comprised of Ranger and Pacer series utilized the 118-inch wheelbase of the 57-58 Ford. Meanwhile, the Corsair and Citation were on the Mercury's 124-inch wheelbase. Body shells were similarly shared. Wagons rode on a 116-inch wheelbase.

Two V-8's were offered, both new for the '58 Ford-Edsel series big block family. The lower series carried the 361 ci with 303 bhp and the higher series had the 410 ci 345 bhp

The most unique styling was the "horse collar" vertical grille and narrow horizontal taillights, which one cynic termed "in grown toenails". Unique to the Edsel were the "teletouch Drive" automatic transmission controlled via buttons in the steering wheel hub and a rotating drum speedometer.

AMT has produced the Pacer 2-door hardtop, of which Edsel sold only 6,139 copies for the price of \$2800. I built my model right from the box. I didn't like the white walls; they seem a little small for '58.

All the parts go together nicely, but there is a problem getting the parts off the trees. The attachment points are 'way to thick, you have to be very careful taking small parts off the tree, as some of the runners are as thick as the parts! I would think that after all the years AMT has been making model kits that they would learn not to put the part on the runner at the top of the part. The horse collar grill has a large attachment point right on the top, as do the taillight frames. I had to use Bare metal foil to repair the large area on the grill. Cutting the wheel covers off is a trip too, as if you aren't careful talking the spinners off the tree you will be trying to repair them for a good while. This is about the worse attachments for parts that I have ever seen.

There are plenty of parts to make it detailed. The chassis is separate from the floor pan. The front end has plenty of detail, even including the power steering assist cylinder and small hoses. The front wheels could be posed, as the spindles are not keyed in place, but the tie rods do not move. It looks like you could reverse the spindles to lower the front end. The car has single exhaust with the Ford logo on the muffler. There is plenty of room in the rear to lower the back of the car.

The engine has great detail. It has the power steering pump, upper and lower hoses and heater hoses. This is supposed to be a big block, but I think it looks a little small. They have even done it the right color, yellow with white rocker covers and air cleaner.

The other thorn in my side is the backup lights. The lights are molded in clear, and they say to paint them silver-Grrrrrrr !! Why didn't they plate them and make clear lenses? Again, Bare Metal foil to the rescue. I foiled them and trimmed out the lenses.

I was impressed with the interior, nice engraving. The instrument cluster is separate from the dash, makes painting two tone real easy. I used foil on the instruments, as they are not plated. It would have been nice if the horn rim was plated like they did on the '57 ford. For the modeler that reads the instructions (I read them after I am done, just so I know where the left over parts go) on step 5B don't put the radiator on the chassis as they show you, put the body on the chassis then put the radiator in from the top.

Going to the body now, the back panel is separate and does not fit well, just trim a little and glue tight. I didn't need filler, it sanded out smoothly enough. The side scallop is a bit too narrow at the front, but I can live with that. I am not sure but the taillights look a little small. AMT could have used a darker red for the taillights. I painted the backs of the lenses with Testor's stoplight red to make them darker. The chrome trim piece between the taillights is almost correct, except that the trunk lock should be below the trim, not on top. The front parking lights have clear lenses over them, for

some unknown reason there is an opening at the back of the parking light housing, allowing you to see all the way into the fender. I covered the back of the opening with a piece of Bare Metal foil.

All the parts are molded sharply, but the grill doesn't make it. Be careful, mask off the grill before painting, it will fill up with paint real fast. I didn't pay attention to that till too late, now the letters are just gold spots on my grill. They also forgot to scribe the chrome trim around the outer part of the grill shell. They did scribe the hood, so I just put Bare Metal foil around the edge, and trimmed as best I could. Model Car Garage is making a set of photo etched parts, and Bob Korunow says that it will include brass letters for the grill. I will retrofit this model with the photo-etched grill and use it on my next Edsel. Fellow MAMA member Tim Sickle pointed out (again!!) that the license plates are too small for 1/25th scale.

On the *instruction sheet* it has a "preferred" color combinations chart. This is great, but it doesn't show the colors. *Matt Guilfoyle* found a *website* where you can see all the color chips and color combinations, even tri-color combinations, and forwarded it to *Tim Sickle*, who, in turn, showed it to me. The site is called *Scale Auto Kingdom*, and is located at http://home.att.net/~cobradeuce/kingdom.htm. (Ed. Note: *Matt Guilfoyle* also found 'way more information than you could possibly ever want from a restoration website. It is known as "The Edsel Pages", and is located at http://home.ici.net/~edsel/edsel158.htm. Give it a look-see, you'll be amazed. I know I was!). Thanks Matt and Tim.

Well I guess there might be other things someone won't like about the car. I personally, on a scale of 1 to 10, give it a 9+. It builds up nicely, all the parts fit well, and it looks good when completed. *Hurry Bob, we need the photo etched parts, my grill is gone!*

- □ "Diamond in the Rough?!" That is the way a recent photo in <u>The Washington Times</u> refers to a new 2000 model GMC Jimmy. The truck will feature grille guards, side steps, and luxurious interior amenities, such as diamond-quilted perforated leather seats, and triple diamond-embroidered berber floor mats. Guess the price will be two to three times what it should be as well?!
- □ 'Bad Boy F-150!" Ford motor company plans to release a Harley-Davidson Special Edition F-150 pickup. This is in addition to his corporate jet, a Cessna Citation 525. But in all honesty, which one do you think he REALLY likes to fly, hmmm?
- "Smile, you're on candid camera!" Seems as though red light runners now must worry about getting their picture snapped, and getting a ticket in the mail! - ☐ Mint Explosion! <u>Danbury Mint</u> is still at it! What's up this time? How about a 1942 Chrysler Town & Country?! Details include the auxiliary seat which folds up and down, the unique 'barrel-back' doors, which open to reveal the mesh cargo pocket, and removable spare tire, sliding windows in the rear doors, operable antenna, and an opening hood to display the L-head, 120-hp 6-cylinder engine. This one will set you back only \$112, payable in four monthly installments of just \$28 (plus \$1.95 shipping and handling per installment). And if that one doesn't do it for ya, how

about a 1961 Ford Thunderbird Indy 500 Pace Car?! The hood opens to show off the 300 hp, 390 cu. In. V-8, both doors open to show off the interior (complete with folding bucket seats, and pivoting steering wheel!). They have even included the special pace car flags! This one costs only \$125, payable in four monthly installments of only \$31.25 (plus \$1.95 per month shipping and handling per month).
