1966 Buick Riviera Lowrider

[AMT/ERTL #30084; 1/25th scale; new tool; 114 pieces, including 100 pieces for the car, and 14 for a lowrider bicycle]

A few months ago when AMT/ERTL announced the impending release of the 1969 Buick Riviera lowrider, I wondered to myself: Would it be a straight reissue of the 1966 annual kit? Or, would it be a modification of the 1969 Riviera recently issued in the "Buyer's Choice" series? Or, would it be a brand new tool from the ground up? Well, to my amazement, AMT decided to do this kit justice, and retool the kit in the style of their latest releases. As soon as I picked up the car, I compared it with the original 1966 Riviera annual kit. More on that later in the review.

For those of you not familiar with this car, here's a capsule history. In the late 50's, General Motors made the decision to enter the personal luxury field. At that time, the Ford Thunderbird was the only vehicle being marketed in that class, and it was a rousing success. The Riviera that was introduced in 1962 as a 1963 model was originally designed to be a Cadillac model known as the LaSalle. Fortunately for Buick, Cadillac decided they did not want to market this type of car. The design was modified and given to the Buick division, as they needed a flagship model to bring in more customers, and this car did just that.

The car, while not a huge seller, successfully brought more buyers into Buick showrooms. Other divisions with General Motors, including Cadillac, followed suit with competitive models when the decision was made that it would not be cost-effective for a single division to have its own body structure (save for Chevrolet's Chevy II, Corvair, and Corvette).

In the 1966 model year, the totally restyled Buick Riviera was joined by the Oldsmobile Toronado, which differed from the Riviera in that it was a front-wheel-drive car, with a completely flat passenger compartment floor.

The three cars, while resembling each other ever so slightly, had distinct personalities that catered to the people they were marketed to. The Eldorado was a sporty luxury car, while the Toronado with its bold, unusual styling, was reminiscent of the Cord automobile of the late 30's. The Riviera had a style all its own, which was an evolution of the breakthrough design of the first Riviera, and that, along with a rear-drive chassis made the car one of the most desirable cars in that era to apply the "Lowrider" style to it. The car has a heavy, yet sleek look to it. Make no mistake; this is one big, heavy car. The sharp edges of the bladed fenders, the "W" shape of the front and rear ends of the car, the slope of the windshield and rear window, as well as the sculpturing along the sides of the car were typical of the cars coming from Bill Mitchell's styling studio.

Upon comparing the kits, I came to the conclusion that AMT/ERTL made the right move in tooling up a new kit. Looking at the annual, it has only two advantages over the new kit:

- A 'Replica Stock' and two 'Custom' versions of the car, one mild, and the other a bit more elaborate, and
- More delicate engraving for the emblems, wipers, and door handles.

I came to the conclusion that this kit is designed to build one version (*Lowrider*). The only option the builder has with the parts in the kit is the suspension 'attitude'. While checking out the parts, I could not help myself, as the car is already up on its wheels, to allow me to check out its 'attitude' as a completed model. Let's look at this puppy!

<u>Engine</u>: An 18-piece replica of Buick's 425 cubic inch V-8, equipped with a Turbo 400 transmission. It is also equipped with unplated finned aluminum valve covers, dual 4-barrel carb setup, and a huge chrome air cleaner. This is the

optional engine setup offered by the factory when the car was new. This has to be the best depiction of a stock Buick 'Nailhead' V-8 ever put in a model kit. The engraving is crisp, and the detailing is right o the money. With proper painting and selected aftermarket part usage, it is the engine of choice for any Buick of that era. It looks 'right' under that massive hood. Curiously, there is no A/C equipment, but seriously, how many cars were so equipped in 1966?

Interior: A 13-piece assembly, which builds off of the floorpan, just, like a real car. The firewall is also heavily engraved, and the car has a separate steering box, and brake reservoir and booster. The interior side panels are deeply textured, and show off the switches and controls very well. The dashboard I s also well detailed, with a separate steering column w/shifter and turn signal stalk, and a 'chain link' steering wheel, which in my opinion, only belongs on a show car. The front seat is the optional Strato-back front seat, with the fold-down center armrest. On the real car, there was an option of bucket seats and a console, which, by the way, was featured on the annual kit. A full-width bench seat brings up the rear of this assembly. This is superior to the original kit in that the engraving of the new kit is much deeper, and therefore, more three-dimensional.

<u>Chassis:</u> An 11-piece unit, which includes AMT/ERTL's separate frame, radiator, exhaust system, and suspension systems, which is far more detailed than the pan type system in the annual kit. That thing had a positively bizarre axle attachment system!

Suspension: As in all of this manufacturer's Lowrider kits, there are parts included for the builder to display the model in various 'attitudes.' Fully lowered (my personal favorite!), fully raised, or a combination of raised and lowered in either the front or the rear. I am willing to bet that some enterprising modeler will do a side to side, or a partially raised or lowered suspension setup using these parts. The annual kit again featured that bizarre wheel mounting system with only one 'attitude.'

<u>Wheels/Tires:</u> A set of Goodyear Eagle GS-C 17"directional radial tires is provided which mount a gorgeous set of Wheels styled similarly to the *Colorado Custom "Valdez"*. The annual kit included the chrome Buick 5-spoke road wheel, American Torque Thrust D 5-spoke wheels, and the Buick finned wheel cover with 2-prong knockoff. The annual kit tire choices were limited to the standard whitewall tires, or low profile blackwall donuts.

Body: Separate windshield and rear windows mount onto the body, as well as the heater and radiator hoses, air cleaner, and mirrors, which round out this subassembly.

In the old days, the manufacturer gave the builder multiple versions of the car. In the case of the Riviera, we had multiple front and rear treatments, a second hood, and a heavily padded landau-style vinyl roof for the body. Additionally, three sets of wheels and two sets of tires for rolling stock, and an additional set of seats and a custom dashboard for the interior. We were then able to mix and match these parts, and create a truly unique model, as well as quite a few extra parts for another project. Today, the model manufacturers will issue a model with a single building version, or at best two (with an added wheel/tire combination), and, to be honest, that's just fine with me.

Included in this kit is a "Lowrider Bicycle", which is entirely chrome plated, with separate, clear spoke assemblies. The seat, wheels and tires must be detail painted, and the frame can be painted to match the car, or left chrome. This little jewel is worth the price of admission alone!!

The question remains, is this a good kit? *Yesssssss, no doubt about it!* AMT/ERTL has done an excellent job. If you are into the cars of that era, this kit is a must-have. Originally, I was going to convert my model into a Replica Stock 1966 Riviera GS, but as good as this one is, I am going to wait for that version from the manufacturer. I hope that they see fit to offer both the Buick chrome 5-spoke road wheels and the finned wheel covers with knockoffs!!
